February Savings
Bonds Sales
Total \$58,120

Series E and H United States Savings Bond sales in Gray County during February totaled \$58,120 according to County Bond Chairman George B. Cree. Sales for the first two months were \$96,743 -- 23% of the 1971 sales goal of \$420,000.

Treasury figures show that Texans purchased \$17,302,962 in Savings Bonds during February compared to 1970 sales for the same period totaling \$16,678,196 -- an increase of \$624,766 or 3.7%. Sales for the two-month period were \$34,678,727 for 19% of the state's goal of 181.9 million.

Nationally, sales of E and H Bonds were \$431 million -- an 110 year peak for February. Sales for the first two months totaled \$861 million -- 12.8% above 1970. Redemptions were 22% below 1970 for the lowest February in five years.

GRASSHOPPERS
Henry Dickerson with the Plant Pest Protection Division, Agricultural Research Service, USDA, Amarillo, was by our office this week and left maps showing the potential for an infestation of grasshoppers for the coming summer. Part of Gray County in the Back community was listed as being a potential threat having eight or more grasshoppers per square yard. This is a heavy infestation. Other parts of the county showed a grasshopper threat of having three to seven grasshoppers per square yard which is considered a moderate infestation. We thought you might want to be on the alert for grasshoppers because control measures should be carried while the hoppers are young to be effective.

AGRICULTURAL CHEMICALS
Recently I received from the National Agricultural Chemical Association a newsletter that brought new and encouraging information on some of the hearings that have been held by the Environmental Protection Agency and the Agricultural Committee in Congress.

It seems that a great many people are looking at things in a more rational manner and are not so much in an emotional manner. One of the rumors mentioned in this report was the fact that 2, 4, 5-T will continue with us and farmers and ranchers will be able to use this excellent chemical for woody plant control. The Saratoga County Farmer Bureau in New York State has suggested that throughout the United States farmers should reserve one acre and not use insecticides, herbicides, and fertilizers on these acres. This would be a demonstration on what would happen to quantity produced as well as quality produced. It has been estimated we would have a food shortage in the U. S. if we dropped the use of all Agricultural Chemicals. There is little doubt in this matter.

I quote from a part of this newsletter: "Ecology is Severe On Man," says Dr. Earl Butz of Purdie. Speaking at a recent dinner of the Foundation For American Agriculture, Dr. Butz observed: "The plain truth is that the ecology of nature is pretty severe on man, and man is constantly trying to modify it."

Let's be honest: God put the worm in the apple; man took it out. God put the potato bug on the potato; man took it off. God put the termite in the timber; man took it out. God put the malaria-laden mosquito in the backyard; man took it out. God put the mildew on the rose; man took it off. God put the parasite in the pork; man took it out.

How far back to Nature do our ecologists want to go? Or, if they are honest with themselves, do they really want to go at all. Let's be honest about it.

Something to think about.

Frank Phillips College
To Have ACT Tests

ACT Tests (American College Testing) will be administered at Frank Phillips College on April 24, beginning promptly at 8:00 a. m. High School students registered to take the tests should bring completed Profile forms. The ACT tests require approximately four hours.

Frank Phillips College does not have a cutting score as do larger schools and universities. At FPC, the scores are used only for counseling.

Since Frank Phillips College has no cutting score, and one neither passes nor fails the tests, adults who have been out of school, need not fear taking the tests.

A student who feels that he has not done well on the tests may still enter Frank Phillips College and prove himself.

Frank Phillips College accepts either SAT scores or ACT scores, but prefers ACT scores. There is no charge to students taking the ACT or GED Tests at Frank Phillips College. This is a public service of FPC.

Minimum Wage
Rate Unchanged
For Ag Workers

The minimum wage rate for farm workers has remained at \$1.30 per hour since it reached that level on February 1, 1969, according to James I. Mallett, farm management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Wage rates for many occupations increased on February 1, he notes, but new legislation will be needed before the legal minimum can be raised for agricultural workers. Competition with other industries tends to increase farm wage rates and most farm employers are paying well above the minimum wage rate, he adds.

Agricultural employers who hired more than 500 man days of farm labor during any calendar quarter in 1970, must pay at least the minimum wage rate during 1971. Farm employers who are paying more than the minimum wage should keep adequate employee records as specified by the minimum wage law, points out Mallett.

The minimum wage law also included child labor regulations which forbid the employment of children 16 years of age and under, except on their own farm during school hours. Children under 16 years of age may not be employed in agriculture in what is classed as hazardous work. However, children 14 to 16 years of age may acquire an exemption certificate which will permit them to be hired for hazardous work when they have been adequately trained and qualified to perform these jobs.

To do this, Texas must act, and it needs to act now, to establish 0.10% blood-alcohol concentration as a presumption of intoxication.

McLEAN -- McLean voters selected Leslie Darsey, James Ellison and Creed Lamb as three new school board trustees in Saturday's election here.

Other school candidates were Johnny M. Haynes, Harold (Casper) Smith and Carey Don Smith, a write-in candidate.

Darsey received 391 votes; Ellison, 352; Lamb, 388; Haynes, 161; H. Smith, 134; and C. Smith, 129.

Gov. Preston Smith has called on President Nixon to declare 60 Texas counties eligible for drought disaster relief and requested initial allocation of \$5 million in federal aid.

All the counties, said Smith, received less than 1.5 inches of accumulated rainfall in the past six months, creating a critical drought condition which adversely affects ranches, farms, businesses and employment throughout the entire state.

Smith said he would not call for emergency disaster legislation from the state legislature because of the "extremely critical" state financial problem, state and local health, employment, agriculture and welfare agencies, the Governor stated, are performing emergency disaster duties as required.

Governor asked an initial allocation of \$5 million. In addition, he urged that the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Department of Labor, Health, Education and Welfare and Small Business Administration representatives be assigned to collaborate with state and local officials in inspections, cost estimates and technical guidance.

WELFARE CUT AVERTED?
Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes announced a way has been found to prevent the sharp cut on May 1 aid to needy families with dependent children.

Legislation has been introduced to permit the Welfare Department to transfer and spend AFDC necessary sums not to exceed \$6.8 million for the rest of this fiscal year ending August 31.

Barnes said about \$5 million available in a contingency fund of the Welfare Department, and an additional \$1 million or more will come from federal matching-money.

A comptroller's office representative said there is no question but what funds can be used to avert the scheduled AFDC reduction. Welfare Board on March 22 ordered the May cut which would bring the average AFDC family grant down from \$118 a month to \$80 and eliminate some 4,500 families from the rolls entirely.

APPOINTMENTS
Governor Smith named T. Louis Austin Jr. of Dallas to Texas Board of Corrections, succeeding Walter Pfluger of San Angelo on the key agency which supervises the state prison system policy.

Smith reappointed Reagan Houston III of San Antonio as a member of the Board of Regents of Texas Woman's University and also named John Shivers of Austin and Mrs. Marcella Berry of Houston as new members of the TWU Board.

Douglas Bergman and Walter Todd of Dallas were reappointed to the Stephen F. Austin University Board, and Robert C. Gray of Austin was added.

H. J. Shands Sr. of Lufkin will replace Arthur Temple Jr. of Diboll on the Board of Directors of the Neches River Conservation District.

COURTS SPEAK
Third Court of Civil Appeals ruled that welfare applicants who are turned down by the Welfare Department for aid have no right to appeal to state courts since assistance is not a "vested property right."

Court of Criminal Appeals in a Coryell County case held that a district judge has no power to credit a prisoner's time in county jail while he is appealing his conviction toward his eventual prison sentence.

State Supreme Court concluded that a man who built a cabin on an otherwise unoccupied island in Galveston Bay and camped there off-and-on for 10 years did not gain title to it by adverse possession. Court said possession must continue through a 10-year period to take title under adverse possession.

AG OPINIONS
A compact of water districts and river authorities may act for the state in getting \$40 million in federal funds which the state might otherwise lose for 1970-71, Atty. Gen Crawford Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:
* An independent school district may solicit bids from classing manufacturers and grant exclusive privilege to one such manufacturer to service voluntary student purchases of rings. Whether grant can extend for five years is a question before federal courts.

* Section of a bill pertaining to abandonment of mineral estate without notice or hearing is unconstitutional, but balance of legislation is not.

TRAFFIC TOLL
Gov. Smith expressed "deep concern and disappointment" over the 1970 Texas traffic toll.

Smith noted an increase of nine in fatalities -- a rise to 3560 in 1970 -- over 1969 and an economic loss toll over \$1 billion.

Governor said his only encouragement is that, with nearly 500,000 more drivers and a billion more miles traveled over the preceding year, the official death rate per-mile-traveled remained the same as 1969.

Smith pledged aid through news campaigns and called for public support of legislation, police concentration on traffic offenses and forceful treatment of violators by judges.

SCHOOL SANCTIONS URGED
Texas Classroom Teachers Association's professional rights and responsibilities commission will recommend to the TCTA executive board that sanctions be invoked against Crystal City Independent School District.

If sanctions are ordered, state and national accrediting agencies will be notified of unsatisfactory conditions for both students and teachers in the district. Teachers will be encouraged not to accept employment in the school system. Some eight or nine teachers will not be rehired, according to a TCTA attorney after an investigation.

TRAVEL GUIDE OUT
Texas looks better than ever, boasts the new "Texas, Land of Contrast," travel guide just released by the Texas Highway Dept.

Combining tourist information about 371 cities and towns, the 200 page publication also lists state parks, major lakes, national forests, national recreation areas, Big Bend National Park, Padre Island, National Seashore, campground guide and basic hunting and fishing facts.

Book will be distributed at highway department tourist bureaus and by mail in response to out-of-state inquiries. It contains nearly 4,000 times of tourist and travel information and 500 color photographs.

Federal Truth In Lending Law

The Federal Truth in Lending Law went into effect July 1, 1969. According to this law creditors must let borrowers know the cost of credit. The law is important in that it will allow consumers to:

1. Decide for themselves whether the finance charge is reasonable. (In each situation in which credit is used, a consumer is able to ask himself, "Is buying this particular good or service now worth the extra money I shall have to pay for the finance charge?")

2. Compare the cost of credit among different sources of credit.

The most important provisions of the law are as follows:

1. The lender must show the borrower the exact amount of the finance charge in dollars and cents before the borrower signs an agreement. (Finance charge is defined to include all charges imposed by the lender as a condition of extending credit.)

The one exception to stating the finance charge in dollar and cents is in the financing of a house or dwelling. Mortgage lenders feared that many people would be shocked out of buying a home if they knew how much was being paid for the finance charge. For example, on a \$20,000 loan at seven per cent, interest alone over 20 years would come to more than \$22,000.

2. The lender must express the finance charge as an annual percentage rate.

The exception to this is when A. The amount financed is not more than \$75 and the finance charge is not more than \$5 or B. The amount financed is more than \$75, but the finance charge is not more than \$7.50.

In general, what "Truth in Lending" does is to say that the lender must let the borrower know the credit cost and credit terms. It does not set rates for credit costs or credit terms. It is the Texas Credit Code which sets rates for credit cost.

A credit contract is legally binding once it is signed. However, the Truth in Lending Law allows one exception to this - this is when a home or residence is used three days if the loan involves his house as security. (A first mortgage to finance the purchase of a residence carries no right to cancel. This provision applies to cases where there is a first mortgage for any other purpose other than financing the purchase of a home and to cases where there is a second mortgage on the home.)

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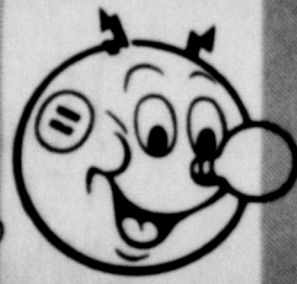

Cereals Popular For Breakfast Ever wonder about the breakfast habits of the folks next door, or the down street? Chances are they are having ready-to-eat cereal, says Miss Sally Springer, Extension foods and nutrition specialist at Texas A&M.

According to a recent survey by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, three-fourths of the nation's families do eat such breakfast cereals during the week.

Children were found to be the biggest users of the ready-to-eat breakfast cereals, Miss Springer reports. In fact, they eat at least twice as much per person as their parents. The survey also revealed that boys consumed more than girls, and that men ate more than women of the same age.

Breakfast cereals account for 1.3% of the food money spent by U.S. families, the specialist says. Nutritionally, Miss Springer adds, chief contributions of the

Cotton Stars In Spring Fashions

The cotton fabrics, which dye beautifully, are splashed with clear bright colors, as well as with soft, dusty shades this spring. Designs range from plain and homespun to striped and patterned jacquards.

Cotton knits, hottest item in the spring market, provide fashion at moderate prices. Cotton knits come in a wide range of textures, including boucle, raschel, rib, mesh, jacquard, and jersey knits.

When selecting a cotton knit, always check labels and hangtags before purchasing. If the labels say "mercerized" and "wrinkle-resistant," the fabric is less likely to shrink and stretch. Shrinkage-resistance is important for all cottons, but beware of shrinkage controlled or preshrunk claims that do not state the percentage of shrinkage. Such cottons may shrink up to 5%, possibly making the garment too small to wear.

Most cotton knits are washable--some by machine and others by hand. If knits are labeled as "hand washable" yet percentage of shrinkage is not included, it is best to wash them in cool water with little agitation to prevent distortion of the garment's construction.

Before washing, outline the garment's shape on paper, using the paper silhouette for blocking when drying. Knits usually dry better on a flat surface; when hung, the weight of the water can pull the fabric out of shape.

Hints On Decorating Easter Eggs

For centuries, families throughout the world have dabbled in the ancient art of decorating Easter eggs.

Our present-day custom of decorating and giving Easter Eggs is a symbol of the Resurrection. However, the custom originated in pre-Christian times.

In China as early as 722 B.C. the practice was already established. Messengers in the State of King-tu-oo were sent to the countryside to proclaim that all fires were to be put out for three days during the great Spring festival. One provident chieftain accumulated supplies of painted eggs, and set the fashion of dispensing them as gifts.

The early Christians adopted a similar custom. In the British Isles, after eggs were blessed by a priest, they became holy gifts benefiting both the giver and receiver.

But today's designer of Easter eggs may have some new tricks up his sleeve, reports Jimmie Wainscott, county home demonstration agent.

Easter eggs taste and look best when hard cooked instead of hard boiled. Cooking below the boiling temperature means more tender egg whites, less dark coloring around the yolk and less cracking of shells during cooking.

To hard cook eggs, cover a pan of water and bring to a boil. Remove from heat, and carefully lower eggs into the boiling water. Let stand for about 20 minutes and immerse cooked eggs immediately into cold water.

To prevent dye from staining the egg white, use eggs that have no cracks, and keep the dye water warmer than the egg. If a warm egg is left in cool water, the dye may seep through the pores of the shell.

When selecting eggs for coloring, check appearance and shell color. Brown shelled eggs color just as well as white ones. Brown shells yield bright, vivid colors; white shells are best for pastels.

Before dyeing, wipe shells thoroughly with a moist cloth, then allow to dry. Eggs that have limy shells will dye with tiny white spots.

Eggs dye best when hot, plus hot water dyes are fastest. Prepare dye according to the manufacturer's instructions. Immerse eggs until they become the shade desired. Let eggs dry, then use your imagination.

Hard cooked dyed eggs may be eaten, but within a day or so, the agent adds.

Changes In Livestock Marketing Noted

Auction markets and terminals are still the major sources of slaughter calves for packers, but the feedlot is providing most of their fed cattle in the west and southwest.

The 1969 report of the packers and Stockyards Administration of the USDA indicated that Texas and California alone accounted for more than one-third of the cattle fed by packers.

In 1969, packers fed or had fed 1.6 million head of cattle and calves (seven percent of fed cattle marketings.) The concentrated feeding areas in the West and southwest make markets and terminals relatively unimportant in

states such as Arizona, California, Colorado, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Texas.

About 12% of the total commercial slaughter of sheep and lambs were packer fed even though only 15 firms were involved in lamb feeding in 1969, Dr. Ed Uvacek pointed out.

More than half of the fed lambs come from Colorado, Utah, and South Dakota.

Packer feeding of hogs remained relatively unimportant as less than one percent of the total slaughter was packer fed.

The recently released report also indicated that in areas where auctions and terminals were important sources of cattle for packers the country points were leading sources of cattle, hogs, sheep, and

lamb.

He added that the smaller packers used the auctions and terminals to a greater extent for all livestock than the larger packer.

Dr. Uvacek noted that the numbers of livestock purchased by packers on a carcass basis showed upward trends. Almost 20% of the cattle bought by packers were on a carcass basis.

Four percent of the calves and seven percent of the sheep and lamb purchases were on carcass basis. Carcass purchases of hogs amounted to four percent of the total purchases.

Corporation Tax Estimate Due

Calendar year corporations whose 1972 income tax liability for 1971 is expected to be at least \$5,550 will generally have to pay estimated taxes by April 15, 1971.

Although no declaration is required to be filed with the Internal Revenue Service, a worksheet may be obtained

from IRS offices for use in computing the estimated tax. The worksheet, Form 1120-W, "U.S. Corporation Worksheet for Computation of Estimated Income Tax," should not be filed with the IRS.

Installments of corporation estimated tax must be deposited in a Federal Reserve bank or an authorized commercial bank using Federal Tax Deposit Form 503.

Publication 542, "Corporation," is available from the IRS.
