## State Capital News

Texas is going to have liquor - the drink -- and faster than anybody expected. Legislature completed action on the bill last week, spelling out the machinery for legalized sale of drinks in open bars, and Gov. Preston Smith promptly signed it into law.

Smith said the measure will have "tremendous impact on the economy of our state" through increasing tourism.

Secretary of State Martin Jones Jr. has sent out instructions to local officials, noting particularly that the bill provides for mandatory local option elections on the drinks issue in all counties on May 18.

Counties which must schedule referendums in their "all or nothing" areas in connection with the May constitutional amendments vote are those which at November approved lifting the open saloons ban and which contain cities or precincts where package sale of distilled spirits already is legal.

Dies cautioned judges and clerks of those counties that they must call local option elections prior to April 28 to insure 20 days' notice. Elections will be held only in areas (precincts and cities) of the 46 counties where sale of all alcoholic beverages is legal. Only in counties where sale of all alcoholic beverages is legal county-wide will the May 18 vote be held throughout the county.

These are the counties which will have liquor-by-the-drink referendums on their May 18 ballots:

Abilene, Austin, Bandera, Bexar, Brazoria, Calhoun, Cameron, Colorado, Comal, Dallas, DeWitt, Duval, El Paso, Fayette, Fort Bend, Galveston, Gillespie, Goliad, Guadalupe, Harris, Hidalgo, Judson, Jefferson, Kerr, Kinney, Kleberg, LaSalle, Lavaca, Loving, Maverick, Midland, Montgomery, Pecos, Presidio, San Antonio, Starr, Sutton, Tarrant, Travis, Val Verde, Victoria, Washington, Webb, Wharton, Wilson and Zapata.

It is a relief to have this issue settled in Texas once and for all, commented Smith.

Later elections can be called in other partially-wet counties by the standard petition route.

**CRIME FUNDS DISTRIBUTED**

More than \$1.5 million in criminal justice action grants have been approved for 34 projects to combat crime.

Six of the projects are for police training. They include heart of Texas Council of Governments, Waco, \$29,690; Southwestern Legal Foundation, Dallas, \$24,000; Tarrant County Junior College district, \$33,477 for law enforcement supervisory personnel program in Dallas; City of Tyler, \$2,732 to continue operating a career development program through Tyler Law Enforcement Academy; Houston-Galveston Area Council, \$39,935 for regional law enforcement training center; and North Central Texas COG, Arlington, \$5,126 to send 30 officers to an armed robbery conference.

Texas Criminal Justice Council received \$30,000 to hire an organized crime prevention council coordinator and staff.

City of Amarillo received \$17,000 for its community relations police unit and City of Austin, \$115,771 to establish police community relations program. Dallas County received \$370,401 to computerize a criminal justice information system. Corpus Christi got \$8,104 to establish a microfilm storage and retrieval system. Capital Area Council got \$6,656; \$7,020 for planning criminal justice system. Capital Area Council got \$6,656; Alamo Area COG, \$11,796; and Middle Rio Grande Valley Development Council, \$4,537 to combine information networks into an improved teletype loop.

**COURTS SPEAK**

Following U.S. Supreme Court approval of massive bus order to achieve racial balance, federal court at Tyler ordered

three all-black school districts dissolved and told the state to eliminate any racially-separate unit.

Fourth Court of Civil Appeals in a Toyah school district case held that it is illegal to conduct public business in closed meetings with the public barred. Actions taken in illegal meetings are illegal and void, Court held. Decision reversed a lower court.

State Supreme Court said Abilene police needed no search warrants to search the pockets of a man suspected of being about to sell marijuana.

**HOSPITAL AID ALLOCATED**

State Board of Health has allocated \$8.9 million in federal Hill-Burton funds for health facilities construction.

Funds were drastically reduced by the federal administration, particularly for new general hospital construction. Texas received only \$300,000 for new hospital construction. Hill-Burton pays up to 50% of cost of construction or modernization of health facilities in areas of critical need. Of recent allocations, rehabilitation received \$612,000; out-patient facilities \$4.1 million; long term care, \$1.4 million; modernization, \$2.5 million and new construction, \$200,000.

Individual projects included Scott and White Memorial Hospital, Temple, \$612,000; Houston West End Public Health Center, \$400,000; M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, Houston, \$3 million; Lubbock Methodist Hospital, \$858,000; Marshall Memorial Hospital, \$150,000; Memorial Hospital of Garland, \$600,000; Lutheran Community Hospital, \$775,000; Lubbock Methodist Hospital, \$142,000; Methodist Home for Older Adults, Hereford, \$110,000; Medical Center Memorial Hospital, Big Spring, \$666,156; West End Public Health Center, Houston, \$100,000 and Medical Center Memorial Hospital, Big Spring, \$100,000.

**INSPECTION PROGRAM APPROVED**

Texas meat inspection program finally has received Accreditation of the Texas State Health Department-conducted program was based on a recently-completed survey of the state's 800 meat processing plants and slaughter houses and finding that they had met standards equal to those of the federal government.

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture last February caused concern by advising the Health Department that federal standards were not met. New Texas Meat and Poultry Act went into effect Sept. 2, 1969, giving authority for an inspection program to the division of veterinary public health of the State Health Department. New school was established to train inspectors to meet the federal guidelines.

Purpose of the program is to give added protection to the consumer, according to State Health Commissioner Dr. James E. Peavy.

**LAND BOARD MEET RESET**

School land Board reset its oil and gas lease sale for July 6 after learning that the U.S. Corps of Engineers apparently will permit drilling in coastal waters.

May 4 sale of submerged leases on state lands has been cancelled after the Corps declared a moratorium on offshore drilling pending draft of an environmental impact statement.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the Corps will issue permits while a statement on environment is being drawn.

County judges and commissioners from 134 Texas counties will gather in El Paso May 5-7 for the 42nd annual conference of the West Texas County Judges' and Commissioners' Association. The association was first organized in Lubbock on October 16, 1929.

Headquarters for the conference will be the Holiday Inn Downtown, according to Rodrick Shaw, Lubbock County Judge and president of the association. Registration will be from 1 to 6 p.m. on Wednesday, May 5, and from 8 a.m. to 12 noon on May 6. Shaw will call the conference to order at 9 a.m. on Thursday.

Keynote addresses during the morning session will be delivered by the Honorable Preston Smith, governor of Texas, and the Honorable J.C. Davis, assistant attorney general of the state.

Welcome messages will be extended by El Paso County Judge T. Udel Moore, El Paso Mayor Bert Williams and Sr. Ing. Bernardo Norzagaray A., mayor of Juarez, Mexico. Greetings will also be given by the presidents of the State, North and East Texas and South Texas County Judges' and Commissioners' Association and the Texas Association of Counties.

Thursday's session will adjourn at 11:55 a.m. A buffet dinner is scheduled for 7 p.m. followed by a Western dance.

The Friday morning session will be called to order at 9:30 a.m. by C.L. Abernethy, former Hale County judge and vice-president of the association. Featured speakers at this session will include the Honorable Fritz Lanham, director of the Division of State-Local Relations, Office of the Governor; the Honorable Earl Scott, chief attorney, Texas State Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation; and the Honorable Bernie Hillenbrand, executive director of the National Association of Counties.

Concho County Commissioner Charles J. Dankworth, secretary-treasurer of the association, will preside at the afternoon program on Friday. Highlighting this session will be an address by the Honorable Ben Barnes, lieutenant governor of Texas. A business meeting will also be held which will include the treasurer's report and reports from the Resolutions Committee, Conference City Committee and Nominating Committee.

The three-day conference will conclude with an installation dinner and dance Friday evening at 7 o'clock. New officers and directors will be appointed for the association.

**BALLOTS ON WHEAT ELECTION AVAILABLE AT EXTENSION OFFICE** - Wheat producers in Gray County who desire to vote absentee in the upcoming wheat referendum and producer board election will be able to do so at the County Extension Office beginning April 27, according to County Agricultural Agent Foster Whaley.

"We will have ballots available for any producers who want to vote absentee in the election between April 27 and May 19," says Whaley. "On May 11 the Texas Wheat Producers Association will hold an election over a 34-county area to determine whether or not to assess producers not more than five mills per bushel on all wheat produced for purposes of research and promotion. At the same time, producers will have an opportunity to elect a nine-man producers board to administer funds for such a research and promotion program."

Gray County producers who do not vote absentee are encouraged to vote in the election on May 11 at Court House Annex, east of Pampa. Paul Appleton will be in charge of conducting the referendum and election.

Whaley points out that the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture has certified the TWPA to hold such a referendum and election and that a two-thirds favorable vote will be required to enact the self-assessment program. If the program is approved, the nine-man producers board will have total authority for the collection, use and accounting of all funds and the implementation of programs designed to strengthen wheat growers income.

## Increased Price For Natural Gas Sought By Group

Fred Attaya, who represents a group of oil and gas operations in this area, has scheduled a series of local meetings to discuss the possibility of getting the Texas Railroad Commission to approve the raising of the price of gas in the Panhandle.

Mr. Attaya's notice of these meetings, directed to mineral royalty and leasehold owners, oil and gas operators, is quoted below.

"The price of natural gas at the well head in the Panhandle will be discussed at several locations during the next week.

"Recent rulings by the Federal Power Commission and hearings by the Texas Railroad Commission to be held on May 4 in Austin, could result in substantial increases in prices for gas at the well head in the Panhandle.

"Please attend this local meeting and support action to raise the price of gas in the Panhandle."

## Highland General School Of Nursing Taking Applications

Applications will be taken Monday, May 3, 1971 through Friday May 14, for the 1971-72 class of Vocational Nurses. A \$10.00 application fee is required but, if the applicant is not accepted, the fee is returned. The total cost of the program is approximately \$325.00. This includes the tuition fee, uniforms, textbooks and graduation expenses. An L.V.N. can expect to earn between \$4,500, and \$5,000 per year, after graduation.

Highland General Hospital School of Vocational Nursing is a State accredited school. This means the school is one that has met the requirements established by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners. Highland Hospital School has had sixty-five graduates and presently has nine students who will graduate in August, and will be eligible to take the exam given by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners. Upon successful completion of this exam the student becomes an L.V.N.

The purpose of this program is to train men and women as Vocational Nurses, to give nursing care under the supervision of professional registered nurses or a physician. The length of the school is 50 hours per week for twelve months, and the applicant must be between the ages of 18 and 55 years of age; have completed the tenth grade or the equivalent; be a U.S. Citizen; be in good physical and mental health; and be able to pass the Texas Employment Commission Test. ## What IRS Does The Rest Of The Year

A common question of Internal Revenue employees is "What do you do after you get all the tax returns filed?" Of course, the inquirer visualizes the IRS job as being a big one every April 15. A good answer would be -- "We go ahead working on the tax returns that came in last year and the year before, and in some cases, 10 years ago. We have dozens of filing periods and a lot of other deadlines besides the income tax deadline...."

When you have 79 or 80 million individual tax returns from about 115 million taxpayers (including joint returns) and you have to work with them on how much each individual owes out of the total of \$200 billion, you don't run out of problems right after April 15. ## March Savings Bond Sales Total \$40,797

United States Savings Bond sales for the first three months of 1971 in Gray County totaled \$137,540. Of this amount \$40,797 were purchased in March, according to a report released by Mr. George B. Cree, Chairman of the County Savings Bonds Committee.

Sales in Texas for the first quarter amounted to \$51,858, 897, which represents 29 percent of the state's goal of \$181.9 million. March sales were \$17,170,080 compared to \$14,317,669 during March 1970 -- an increase of 19.9 percent.

Nationally, sales for the month since January 1963. Sales for the first quarter were \$1,374 million -- 28.6 percent of the 1971 goal of \$4.8 billion.

## Check Labels Before You Purchase

Which is bigger--bargain, giant, or family sized? How about economy or large economy size?

As any shopper knows, there's usually no rhyme or reason to the size names manufacturers give their product. And some large sizes cost more per unit than their smaller brothers and sisters, observe: Miss Jimmie Lou Waincott, Gray County Home Demonstration agent.

To clear up the confusion and deception in packaging, the Federal Trade Commission has proposed a new rule that would apply to manufacturers using such terms as "jumbo," "economy," "giant."

In order to use such a term, the manufacturer must offer the same brand in at least one other size so comparisons can be made. Miss Waincott explains. Each term must refer to a specific size within a particular brand. In other words, there can only be one "economy" size of Brand X.

Is a size labeled "economy," it must truly be an economy, at a per unit price substantially reduced from the regular price of all other packages of the same brand.

## Credit By Exam Program At LCC

Lubbock Christian College, a private, liberal arts senior college, will offer a broad program of "credit by examination" beginning with the fall semester of this year. There are five ways a student may obtain credit for courses without actually taking the courses.

- (1) Acceptance of Advanced Placement Examination credit as received from the College Entrance Examination Board.
- (2) Placement and Achievement tests in specific areas whereby students may bypass courses or receive credit in them.
- (3) Subject examination in many areas under the College Level Examination Program.
- (4) "End-of-course" examinations in many departments.
- (5) Credit for appropriate educational experience in the Armed Services as approved by the American Council on Education.

The program will enable a student to accelerate his college program by having courses waived or by receiving credit in them, thus avoiding the regular tuition charge. A student may also gain additional elective credit to broaden his college curriculum. Both current and incoming students may avail themselves of a wide spectrum of credit opportunities not previously available to LCC students.

The Credit by Examinations program becomes effective during the 1971 fall semester orientation period. Students desiring information should contact Robert A. Hawkins, registrar of the college.

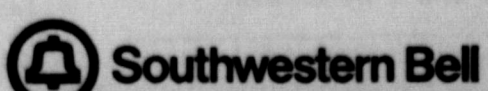
