## Rains Stay On; Twister Sighted

Wet weather continues in McLean, with 2.33 inches of rain falling during the past week—and the prospects for more today.

Tornadoes came closer to the city shortly after midnight Saturday than they have in sometime.

Mr. and Mrs. Bob Patton, who live south of town, reported watching a white tornado bounce down and back up into a heavy black cloud about 1:30 a.m. Sunday.

Patton said he didn't see the funnel touch the ground, but they watched for several minutes as the swirling cloud moved back and forth southeast of McLean.

Another twister was reported sighted near Alamo, but it, too, apparently stayed too high to cause any damage.

Both tornadoes moved across the area in a severe electrical storm.

#### Alarm Sounded

The city sirens sounded the tornado alarm, but most residents slept through the danger period.

Rain was recorded on six of the seven days of the past week, totaling 2.33 inches.

This increased the amount of moisture McLean has received in 1965 to 13.04 inches, compared to 11.34 to this date last year.

June has been unusually wet, with 8.32 inches measured through half of the month.

Temperatures were warm, reaching a sultry 84 degrees for the week's high. The low was 58 on Tuesday.

## DIRECTORIES ARE COMING

Copies of the McLean telephone directory will be mailed to customers next Monday, George Newberry, manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. said Wednesday.

The cover will be of white stock, overprinted in blue ink. There will be 12 "white" or alphabetical pages and 16 classified or Yellow Pages.

Newberry said that almost 1,500 copies of the new directory have been printed but that not all of them will be mailed to customers at this time.

He explained that additional copies are always printed to have on hand for new customers moving to this area and as replacements for books in heavily used locations like public telephone booths.

#### Dispose of old ones

Customers should throw their old directories away when the new ones are received.

Newberry cautioned customers to check them carefully for address and out-of-town number lists as well as other valuable papers before consigning them to the wastebasket.

"Quite often," he said, "customers will keep lists, valuable papers and even pictures between the pages of the telephone directory. Then when the new ones arrive, they throw the old ones away without checking them and things that they wanted to keep are lost forever."

## THREE INJURED IN ACCIDENT WEST OF CITY

Three persons were injured early today in a three-vehicle accident at the fog-shrouded intersection of Highway 66 and SH 70 some 19 miles west of McLean.

The mishap occurred when Marcus Siler of Childress drove his 1960 Ford truck and busane trailer onto Highway 66 from the south.

A 1964 International truck driven by James Gier of Plainview struck the rear of Siler's vehicle, and moments later a 1955 Chevrolet stationwagon driven by Alice Parks of Oklahoma City rammed into the rear of the Gier truck.

Highway Patrolman R. C. Parker said Mrs. Parks' husband, Cecil, and two children, Danny, 13, and Connie, 10, were taken to the Groom Hospital.

The extent of their injuries was not known at noon.

#### 2 Hurt Saturday

Two persons were hurt at 4:05 p.m. Saturday when a 1962 Volkswagen struck a telephone pole at East Railroad and Rowe Streets in McLean.

Bess P. Tucker of San Gabriel, Calif., and her son, Bryan, 19, were driving east when the mishap occurred.

Highway Patrolman Charles Henderson said the youth went to sleep at the wheel of the car. The force of the impact splintered the telephone pole.

Both of the injured were admitted to McLean Hospital. Mrs. Tucker was transferred to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo for further treatment, and her son was released from the local hospital on Tuesday.

Henderson said no one was hurt at 3:30 a.m. Saturday when a 1960 Chevrolet pickup overturned 8.8 miles west of McLean on Highway 66.

Floyd Oran Bailey of Belen, N. M., went to sleep while driving east. The pickup slide slipped to the left across the highway median and overturned in the west-bound lanes.

The pickup came to rest on its top.

### BINDWEED

We have had numerous calls about how to eradicate bindweed in town. Frank Redwine is very concerned about them being in the highway right-of-way next to his place.

The Highway Department has to be very cautious about using 2,4-D in town because of the hazard it presents to other desirable plants.

Last winter we had a representative of the Highway Department meet with some 90 to 100 Gray County farmers at the Bushland Experiment Station.

The Highway Department official stated that the policy of the department would be to treat the bindweed in their right-of-way if the farmer treated his land next to

the right-of-way.

We advised farmers of this in a letter and fixed up some blank statement forms whereby farmers could sign that they had treated their bindweed. They have had quite a long list of farmers to sign up.

The Highway Department has been spraying with 2,4-D this year. It is hoped the department will spray next year with a soil sterilant.

We were a little late in advising the Highway Department on how much area and who had signed. They have to budget this sometime in advance. Soil sterilants are rather expensive.

### RAINS

There are a few stalks of cotton here and there over in the McLean area.

It appears every field will have to be planted over in the McLean area. Last year, Dewey Pennington planted four times.

It looks like he will surpass his record this year.

### JOHNSON GRASS CONTROL

I believe Bryan McPherson got better than a 90-per cent kill on his Johnson grass west of town. He used a new chemical called Declimate.

Henry Lowrance, McLean Gin manager, said they have had excellent results with this chemical farther east.

As a demonstration, I put out some sample material on Bryan's place for bindweed control. Bryan also sprayed it with the Johnson chemical.

A beautiful kill was obtained, and what do you suppose? Bryan is telling the Johnson grass chemical is what did the job.

### THIS AND THAT

Henry Lowrance, gin manager, and a construction crew are doing a complete remodeling job on the McLean Gin. We are happy that they are going ahead with this project in spite of the setbacks we have had on getting our cotton up and going.

We still have plenty of time to get cotton up and make from one-half to a bale per acre. I've seen it happen many times in this area.

When things look worst, they soon get to looking much better. I remember in 1960 we got hail on Aug. 18. Most people thought their cotton was ruined.

Some of this was plowed up and later cotton alongside it made a half-bale per acre.

Jinks Shaw and Truitt Johnson have a beautiful patch of oats and alfalfa hay.

Dick Everett has one of the prettiest fields of alfalfa I've seen in a long time.

I know where you can buy 1,000 bales of good alfalfa hay at 70 cents per bale in the field two weeks hence.

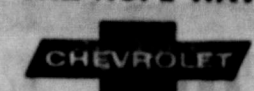

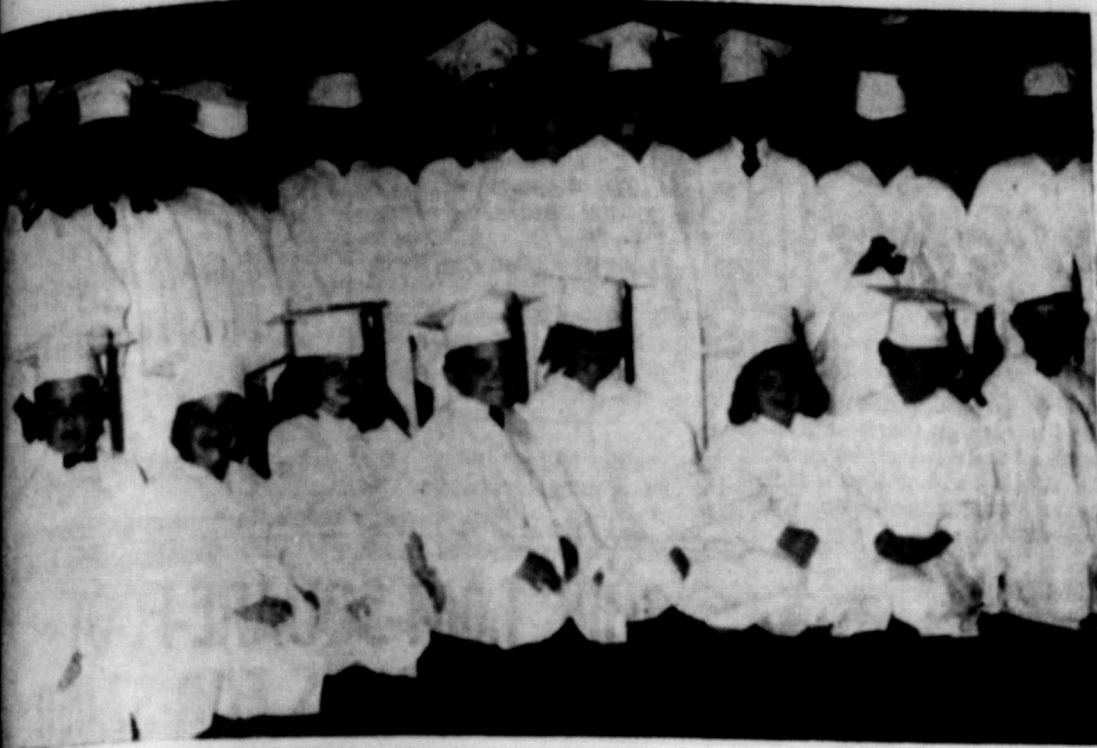

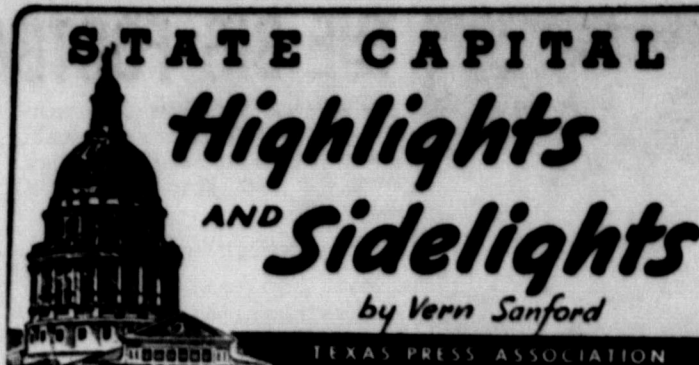

AUSTIN—(Special)—Political and Legislative history have been written in the 59th law-making session just ended.

Highlights: A \$3,600,000,000 budget providing for expanded services in every area of state government and affecting every citizen.

Record improvements in higher education, including creation of the powerful coordinating board for Texas colleges and universities. A \$101,000,000 salary raise for school teachers, \$70,000,000 of which will be paid by the state.

A sweeping overhaul in the entire system of state mental hospital and tuberculosis control administration.

Major public welfare expansions, including a proposed constitutional amendment to permit full state participation in the new federal medical care program for the aged, blind and disabled. A provision of the amendment would qualify non-citizens who have lived in the state for 25 years or more.

Overhaul and extension of the state's program for water control and development.

Congressional and legislative redistricting which will change the makeup and complexion of future Legislatures, shifting the balance of power from rural to urban areas.

If the voters approve proposed constitutional amendments, the Senate will be changed from 31 to 39 members and terms of the governor and other statewide-elected officials now limited to two years, as well as those of state representatives, will be extended to four years.

Gov. John Connally emerged as the most powerful governor in modern Texas history.

**WHAT IT WILL COST**—Despite its record achievements, the 59th session handed a relatively-modest tax bill to Texas citizens.

Cigarette smokers will bear virtually the entire share of the cost. Tax was increased from eight to 11 cents a pack—the nation's highest state rate. This will raise \$70,000,000 to \$73,400,000 in new money during the coming biennium.

A one-time gain of \$6,000,000 will be achieved by setting of a 15 months-from-date-of-death limitation on payment of the inheritance tax.

Teacher pay raise also will require financing at the local level. Present estimate is that the owner of a \$15,000 home will pay \$2.52 more in annual property taxes to school districts.

**BILLS PASSED**—Among the new laws passed during the final days of the regular session of the 59th Legislature were:

Asking members of Congress from Texas to vote for keeping the section of the Taft-Hartley Law which permits Texas to outlaw closed union shops.

Prohibition of the use of 22-caliber rimfire ammunition to hunt deer, elk, antelope and wild sheep in counties not regulated by the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Prevention of city councils from making residence within the city limits a condition of employment.

Legislation of free games on pin-ball machines.

Requirement for testing of all babies born in Texas for phenylketonuria (PKU), an inborn error in system which, if uncorrected, causes brain damage.

Parents liability up to \$5,000 for malicious and wanton damage by their children.

### SHORT SNORTS

President Johnson was a legislative visitor for the unveiling of his portrait on the east wall of the state Senate chamber.

A filibuster by Sen. Bill Moore of Bryan during the critical final days of the session kept from passage a bill by Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress, which would have directed the Texas A and M University regents to turn down applications for admission by women, other than members of the faculty and students and women who want to take courses not offered elsewhere.

Killed in the Senate was the bill which would have required that county tax assessor-collector collect a property tax on automobiles and prohibiting license plates from being issued until the tax was paid.

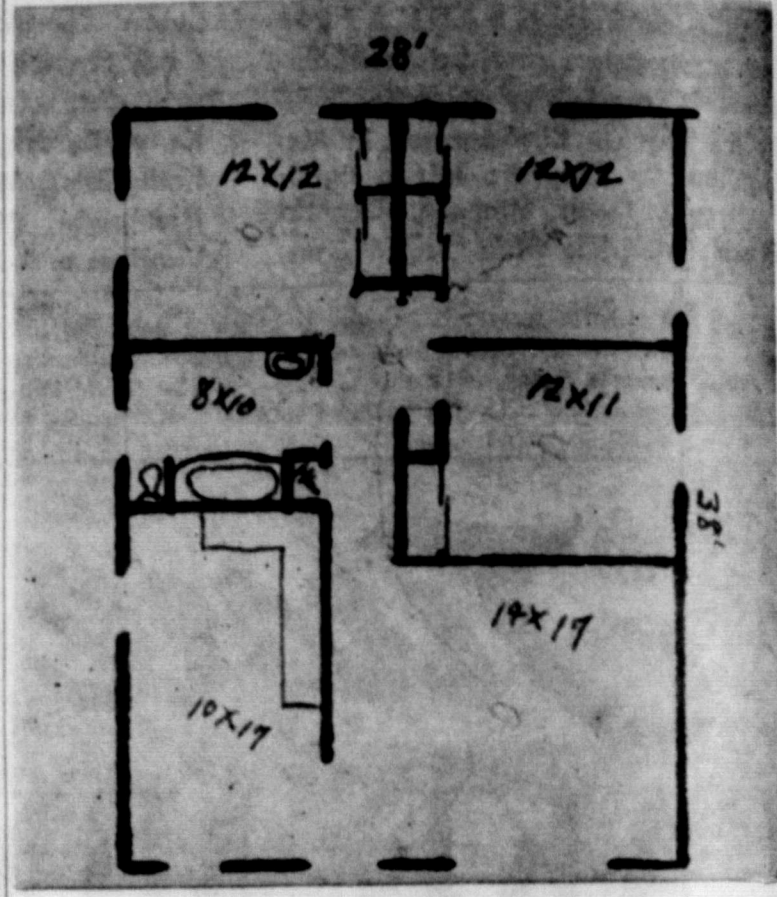

Mrs. Boyett announced that she will continue teaching through June and July.

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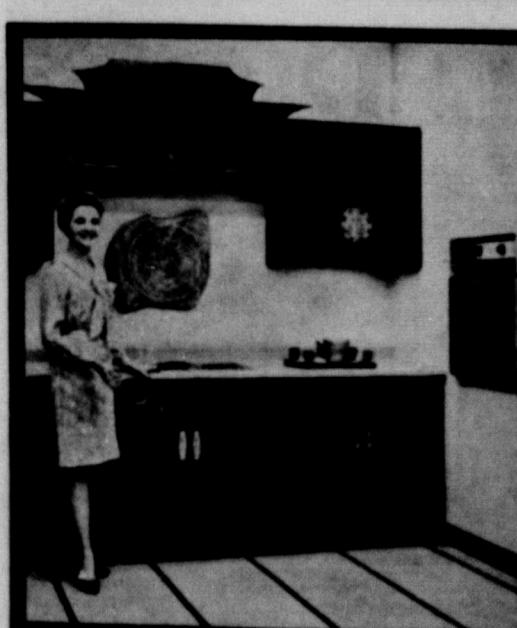

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

This was the last club meeting of the year.

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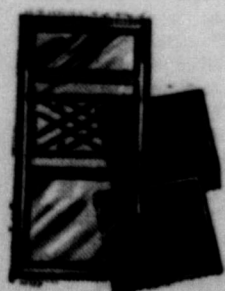
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
