## State Capital News

Gov. Preston Smith surrises Texas lawmakers by announcing he would veto the \$10 million tax bill passed by the House and Senate unless it "cut out the fat." He contended that this measure provided \$300 million more than was needed. After an anxious 24 hours, compromise began to emerge and the House and Senate passed the Governor by knocking out a \$287 million gasoline raise (two cents on the gallon). Smith found that feature "most repulsive" in the revenue-raising measure. Governor said he would sign the bill without the gasoline increase. With this problem once more peacefully resolved lawmakers turned to a hurry-up job of completing major mandatory items and hundreds of minor items before the May 13 adjournment date.

Gov. Ben Barnes expressed confidence that the tough legislative job can be accomplished in two weeks. Other pending business, given high priority by federal action invalidating state laws, includes passage of a voter registration act and amending political filing fees. Legislators plan to add other revenue with a \$40 million beer and wine tax, \$22 million additional gallonage levy on liquor and a \$3 million increase in out-of-state college tuition.

Lawmakers, already having set a quick-time march to meet the adjournment deadline. Most of the bills introduced since the opening-day ceremony will clear during the next 10 days.

### TO HELP MAKE RAIN

Federal aid through weather modification experiments aimed at bringing rain for bone dry areas of Texas has been promised, Governor Smith announced.

Operational details of a cloud-seeding project will be coordinated with the U.S. Department of Defense, the Bureau of Reclamation of the Interior Department and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. Smith said he is hopeful that this step may bring President Nixon to realize the "magic extent of the drought disaster in Texas." He pointed out that half of the wheat crop ready for harvest has been lost to drought and that agricultural production income loss would be more than half a billion dollars if the drought were broken immediately.

### BONDS SOLD

Veterans Land Board sold \$2.5 million in bonds to continue financing the veterans' program of low-interest, long-term farm-ranch loans. Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the sale will enable the 3,000 Texas veterans to get loans under the revived program.

Bonds were sold just under the constitutional interest rate ceiling -- at 4.4992% -- with a 4.5% buy-in included. The Harris Trust and Savings Bank, Bankers Trust Company, Southern Trust Company, Chase Manhattan Bank N.S., Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company, First National Bank in Dallas and 41 others.

Armstrong said that there are three other bids of \$30 million in bonds offered for sale. Buyers represented all 45 states of the country.

### REPORT GRANT RECEIVED

Federal Aviation Administration approved a \$419,974 grant to Texas for a comprehensive study of future airport development needs.

Funds, together with \$209,000 in state money, will be used to develop an airport system plan for Texas. Grant funds development of a plan that can be used to forecast regional and statewide demands for air transportation.

### COURTS SPEAK

State Supreme Court in a recent County case held that signing by an injured person of a release settling a damage claim is valid only for that person and no other involved in the dispute.

High Court told four contractors for San Antonio's HemisFair '68 that they couldn't collect on deferred payment certificates and unsold tickets which they received for partial payment of their services. Firms sued City of San Antonio, San Antonio Fair Inc. and San Antonio Urban Renewal Agency.

Austin District Judge Herman Jones enjoined the sale of historical (1755-1846) documents, "The Laredo Archives," to which the state lays claim. Value is estimated from \$350,000 to \$1 million.

One who kills with a weapon not generally classed as deadly must be permitted to testify as to intent, Court of Criminal Appeals ruled.

Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld the 1968 Railroad Commission turn-down of an application by Southern Pacific Transportation Company to transfer the company railroad agency from Elsa to Edinburg.

### AG OPINIONS

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held that the Parks and Wildlife Commission and similar state agencies can be increased in size by adding new members without abolishing present boards.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

- A school board may contract with a teacher whose first cousin has been elected to the board but has not taken oath. Contract remains valid after the relative qualifies for office.
- A pupil promoted to a high school grade not taught in the home district can transfer to any other accredited high school, and the resident district must pay the receiving district's legally-imposed high school tuition fee.
- Houston Independent School District has the option of selecting procedures available to it in establishing a junior college district.
- Abill to permit an individual to petition for leave to file out warrant proceedings without the suit being brought by the state attorney general, district or county attorney is unconstitutional.
- Monthly salary of state employees whose salary is budgeted on an annual basis is determined by dividing the annual figure by 12. Opinion also sets a standard method of determining weekly or hourly pay for such employees.
- Money collected as admission fees and concessions profits at state properties may be spent for maintenance and repair of property.
- A notary public can legally use a rubber stamp seal and India ink.
- County employees are entitled to retain jury fees for jury service.

### SHORT SNORTS

An increase in state unemployment benefits from \$45 to about \$77 a week has been approved by the Senate, but the proposal is heading for conference committee. House approved a \$60 figure.

Both House and Senate committees have advanced a bill to provide for 100% state financing of the minimum foundation school program.

Texas Aeronautics Commission turned down requests by Braniff and Texas International Airways to reopen a case against the Southwest Airlines authority to fly between San Antonio, Houston and Dallas/Fort Worth.

Governor Smith has signed a bill to provide for more flexibility in student loan programs.

President Nixon and Vice President Agnew will attend the dedication of the Lyndon B. Johnson Library here (Austin) May 22.

The U.S. Supreme Court in George Washington's administration was composed of a chief justice and five associate justices.

**NEWS** from County Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service By FOSTER WHALEY

**Alert For Screwworms:**

The recent rains and humid weather could be a factor in the spread of screwworm flies. During April 13 cases were confirmed in Texas, compared to only one case for the same month a year ago. Livestock producers should continue to check animals for possible worm cases. When intestines are found, a sample of the worms should be collected and mailed to the Mission Laboratory for possible identification. Local county agents have collection kits available.

Fat cattle prices are getting stronger day by day. We heard one fellow remark "This is the first time I've seen fat steers higher than replacement steers in many a year." Here's the situation. A finished steer weighing in the 1000 to 1150 lb. weight will bring from \$33.50 to \$34.00. If you will shop you can buy a replacement of some quality from \$32.50 to \$33.00. Why do we have such a situation. Many feeders are backing off for several reasons. For the last five years we have had high prices in spring or Fat Cattle and then low prices in the fall. Replacement steers each spring were costing \$2.00 to \$3.00 more than fat cattle were bringing. This resulted in most feeders taking a loss in fall from \$15.00 to \$30.00 per head. In my opinion when this happens about five times in a row, it causes feeders to get tender-footed. The other important reason, milo prices to the feedlots have been jumping by leaps and bounds lately. Right now it will cost \$2.75 per CWT to have milo delivered to a feedlot. This increased cost of milo will add \$2.50 per CWT to the gain cost of a 650 lb steer. Feeders are backing off on account of this. Keep in mind that over a long pull, high feed brings on high fat cattle prices. For this reason, I'm optimistic in the face of higher feed cost. The added cost of milo today over the cost last fall means you will have about a dollar per CWT more in the steer you feed from 650# to 1050#.

So far the drought has had little affect on the price of cattle. Should the drought continue on up into the summer it is bound to have a detrimental affect on the prices of stocker cattle.

17 Accidents In Gray County During April

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 17 accidents on rural highways in Gray County during the month of April, according to Sergeant J.L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol supervisor in this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and eight persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1971 shows a total of 62 accidents resulting in one person killed and 33 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for April, 1971 shows a total of 454 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 276 persons injured.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of April, 1971 occurred in the following counties: Lubbock, 5; Potter, 3; Cochran, Palo Pinto, and Castro 2 each; Archer, Hockley, King and Walbarger with one each.

MARKET REPORT

Learn Skiing Basics Before You Get Wet

Like everything else, expertise in water skiing is the result of practice, but listening to the right advice can help the beginner before he gets wet, according to George Cook, director of Water Safety Services for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

For example, the beginner can learn the basic vocabulary which passes between skier and driver. Since it would take a bull-horn to get a message past the roar of an outboard, a system of hand signals has been devised. They are:

Thumbs up -- boat faster.
Thumbs down -- boat slower.
Thumb and forefinger in shape of an "O" -- speed OK.
Circle finger overhead and point -- turn in direction indicated.

Raise hand with fingers spread -- stop.
Slap thigh with hand -- return to dock or shore.
Draw hand or finger across throat -- cut motor.
Clasp hands over head while treading water -- I'm OK (after fall).

Two audible signals required by skiers -- "In gear" when you want the slack taken out of the rope and "Hit it," when you are ready for the boat operator to open the throttle.

There are several common sense procedures which are ignored by some. One is wearing a ski belt or life jacket while skiing. Even for experts it is difficult to recover skis and rope and prepare to get up again after a fall while one is sinking.

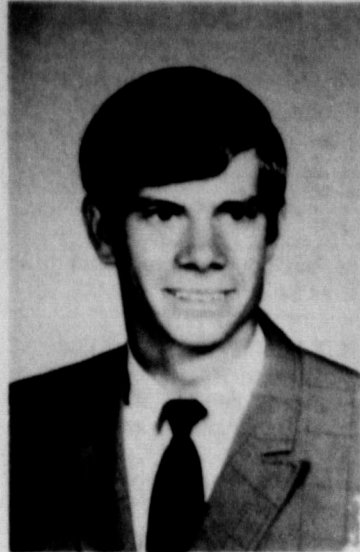
