precincts were accounted for before 8:30 p.m. some precincts reporting immediately after the 7 p.m. deadline.

Gray County voters rejected the first proposition by a margin of 313-284 votes were in favor of the amendment while 561 votes said "no.

Proposition 2 was defeated in the county by a 603 vote against, with 195 giving ap proval

Proposition 3 was turned down by a vote of 598 to 305. Gray County Voters rejected the only amendment passing approval in the state by a vote of 478 to 327. Precinct 1 at Lefors reported

56 voters casting ballots on the issues: and the Laketon box reported 18 voters. Precincts 2 and 7-14 were

combined at one polling place in the Courthouse and recorded 612 voters casting ballots.

Precinct 3 at Grandenew recorded 28 voters, and Precinct 4 at Alanreed recorded six voters

reported 69 voters with proposition 4 in that precinct giving the only favorable vote in the county. McLean voters voted 35 for and 34 against the Water Quality Bond issue.

#### Learn Skiing Basics Before You Get Wet

Like everything else, expertise in water skiing is the result learns faster and takes fewer of practice, but listening to the right advice can help the beginner before he gets wet, according to George Cook, di-rector of Water Safety Services for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

For example, the beginner can learn the basic vocabulary which passes between skier and driver. Since it would take a bull-horn to get a message past the roar of an outboard a system of hand signals has been devised. They are: Thumbs up -- boat faster.

Thumbs down -- boat slower Thumb and torefinger in shape of an "O" -- speed OK. Circle finger overhead and point - turn in direction indi-

Raise hand with fingers spread -- stop. Slap thigh with hand --

turn to dock or shore. Draw hand or finger across throat -- cut motor.

Clasp hands over head while treading water - I'm OK (after fall).

rope around any part of your body. It could cause a nasty and rather painful burn.

It is important for a skier to be relaxed. A relaxed skier spills.

Taking spills is part of water skiing, but it is surprising how a often a skier can avoid falling i if he fights to stay on top. Too often a skier feels he is going to fall and simply resigns himself to a dunking.

If you must fall there are some tricks to learn. Never fall forward. At speeds below 25 MPH, lean to the side or back when you feel yourself falling. When you release the towline you will fall in the direction of the lean.

As you fall cover your face w with your forearms to cushio n the impact and to protect your face. Never attempt to dive as you fall.

At speeds more than 25 MPH the skier sould somersault or roll with the fall. One way he c can do this is to tuck his head to his chest and roll into a ball. Roling not only controls the fall but blunts the impact as well. It is best to be relaxed when you fall.

After giving the "OK" sign with both hands clasped above your head, hold a ski vertically to let other boats know you are down.



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

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
