## State Capital NEWS

Major changes in election laws for voters and candidates are approved by the 62nd Legislature. All are contained in final federal court action upholding lower court decisions invalidating old requirements.

Gov. Preston Smith has signed into law a new voter registration act and filing fee bill. Earlier the Texas Legislature enacted a resolution ratifying a federal constitutional amendment extending full voting rights to 18-year-olds. Federal amendment may not be finally cleared in time for the 1972 elections, but young voters can participate in presidential and congressional voting and the national nominating convention series.

New voter registration provides for year-around sign-up with temporary cutoff 30 days before any election and automatic renewal for three years by voting in any primary or general election. First registration under the new system will begin October 1. March 1972, is the earliest voters can file for new registrations. Voters will continue using present registration certificates for elections through next February.

A federal court invalidated the old Texas annual registration requirement, which was unique in the nation. Texas' new automatic registration law would be repealed if appellate courts reinstate annual registration.

Under a bill passed by the 62nd Legislature, in response to another federal ruling that present filing fees are excessive, candidates would pay a maximum of four percent of the term of office salaries to get on the ballot.

Bill also permits "filing by affidavit" stating that the candidate cannot pay the prescribed fee, or by a "petition" signed by 10% of the voters in the last general election within the area (state, county, precinct) served by the office sought. If the Supreme Court invalidates this act, a special legislative session may be necessary to provide a method of paying primary election costs in 1972.

**IMMUNIZATION REQUIRED**  
Texas students must begin an immunization program by Jan. 1, 1972, under legislation just signed into law, says the Texas Department of Health.

Students will be allowed to enter schools during the summer and fall terms with provision that their immunizations against at least one of six diseases will be started by Jan. 1 and completed as soon as medically possible.

Required immunization for grade school level youngsters includes diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, rubella and smallpox. Measles immunization is not required if there is a history of measles illness.

Exceptions may be granted on religious grounds or to those who may be harmed by immunization (on written certification by a physician). However, exemptions would not be permitted in a time of emergency or epidemic, the Health Department adds.

**AUTO RATE HEARINGS SET**  
Hearings are set for 9 a. m. June 30 in Austin to consider new auto rates to replace the controversial schedule put into effect January 1.

State Board of Insurance is expected to hear usual cross-recommendations to raise and lower rates. Hearing will be conducted in the State Highway Department auditorium on casualty and physical damage rates, rating plans and rules.

All those who wish to have subject matter placed on the agenda were advised by the Board to contact its automobile office here by June 23 and provide written statements in quadruplicate.

Rate revisions will be effective on and after September 1 under present indications.

## 14 Rural Accidents Reported In May

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 14 accidents on rural highways in Gray County during the month of May, according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and eight persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1971 shows a total of 76 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 41 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for May, 1971 shows a total of 543 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 354 persons injured. This was 89 more accidents, six more fatalities, and 78 more injured than during April.

The 23 traffic deaths for the month of May, 1971 occurred in the following counties: Montague and Parker with three each; Archer, Palo Pinto and Oldham with two each; Dickens, Haskell, Hockley, Wise, Young, Armstrong, Cottle, Deaf Smith, Gray, Potter and Randall with one each.

**David Haynes To Attend National FBLA Conference**

David Haynes, state vice-president of the Future Business Leaders of America and member of the McLean High School Chapter, will leave the Amarillo airport Friday, June 18, for Miami Beach, Florida, to attend the twentieth annual FBLA National Leadership Conference.

David, son of Mr. and Mrs. John M. Haynes of McLean, will campaign for the office of national regional vice-president at the three-day meeting. If successful, he would represent Texas and several other southwestern states as a national officer.

## Plans Are Complete For Top O' Texas Quarter Horse Show

Plans are complete for the annual Top o' Texas Quarter Horse Show to be held in Pampa, Sunday, June 27, beginning at 9 a. m. in the main arena of the Top o' Texas grounds at Recreation Park.

The show is approved by the American Quarter Horse Association and is held under the sponsorship of the Top o' Texas Rodeo Association. Edward Vincent of Lefors is show manager and John T. Winters is show secretary. O. G. Bow, Jr. of Whitehouse, Texas will judge all events.

All entries must be registered with the American Quarter Horse Association and shown in the name of the owner as recorded. Entries in 4-H Club and FFA classes must present a signed statement from their 4-H leader or County Agent.

A Trophy Blanket will be awarded the high-point all-around horse in the show. To be eligible, an entry must show at Halter and in at least two Performance events. Cash prizes will be awarded in the fourteen Halter classes according to the number of entries in each class, with ribbons through six places. All entry fees will be jackpot in the eight Performance events, with \$10 added to the first place winnings in each event. Entry fees will be split 40%, 30%, 20% and 10%. Ribbons will be awarded through six places.

The AQHA All-Around Trophy will be awarded to the high-point youth exhibitor competing in at least three of the ten youth events. Ribbons will be awarded through three places in all youth, 4-H Club and FFA events.

## McLean 66 Rodeo Is Big Success

Threatening weather conditions failed to scare away the rodeo fans June 3, 4, and 5. They were all out for some of that good ole McLean 66 Round-up Rodeo excitement, and of course they got it. Besides the rain, they were treated with a portion of the Old West's finer Traditions.

The rodeo brought 322 contestants competing for \$6050 in prize money. Thirty-five of these were Bareback-bronc riders, 50 were bull riders, 12 were saddle-bronc riders, 14 were bulldoggers, 61 calf ropers, 21 barrel racers, and an overwhelming 107 head end healers. In the Junior Division, 14 steer riders and 8 break-away calf ropers.

Of course the most exciting event to the young and old, was the stick horse race. Craig Morris, age 4, of Clarendon, captured the Stake, by half a link.

### Glass Trends In Home Building

The 70's have brought about an explosion in home designing-especially with glass, says Jan Slabaugh, Extension housing and home furnishings specialist.

Proof that a house can be open to beauty, the newest designs feature extensive applications of glass enhancing and extending the living areas to a walled-in or fenced-in patio. One exciting innovation is the patio kitchen, a design in which the counters face outward and extend through the window wall, Mrs. Slabaugh reports.

Another idea is the garden bath, where bath and garden are separated only by a wall

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of glass. For this application, the specialist recommends safety glass.

An entrance door flanked with glass on both sides, called the open foyer, provides a natural transition from outdoors to indoors. Or, consider the cathedral ceiling. Vaulted windows used in this design add horizontal spaciousness to a room, she explains.

To use more glass in home designing, many builders are enclosing the entire lot behind a perimeter wall. The wall provides privacy in a limited space, and permits extension of popular indoor-outdoor leisure living.

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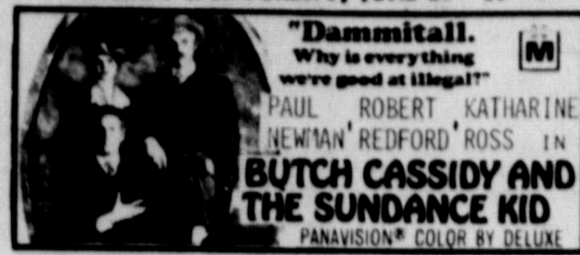

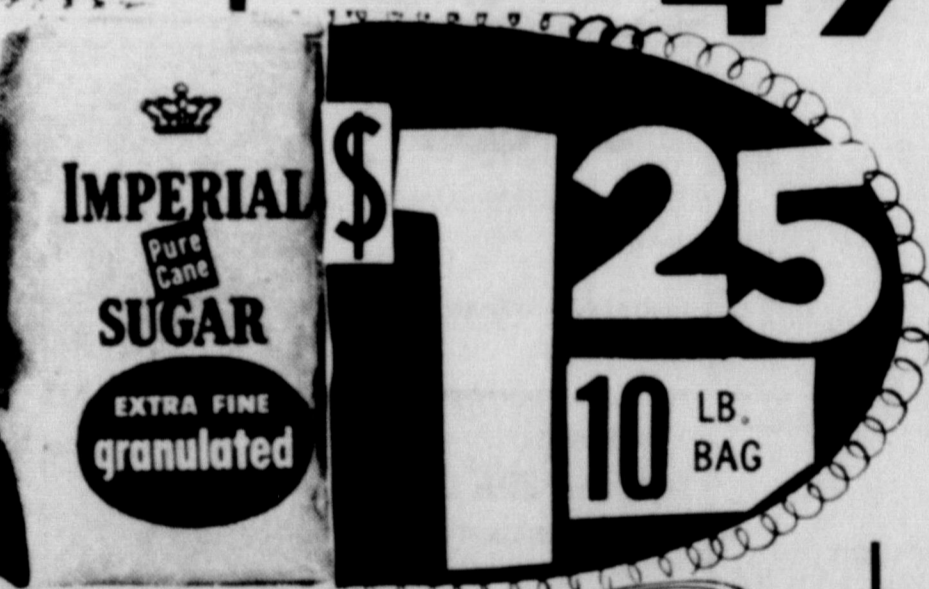
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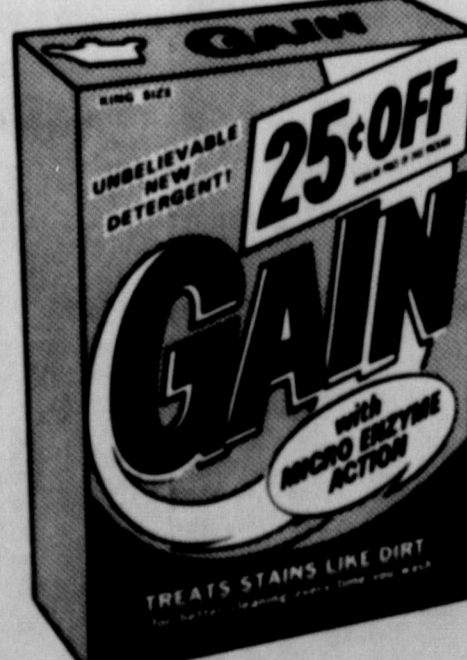
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
