Plans are complete for the annual Top o' Texas Quarter Horse Show to be held in Pampa, Sunday, June 27, beginning at 9 a.m. in the main arena of the Top o' Texas grounds at Recreation Park.

The show is approved by the American Quarter Horse Association and is held under the sponsorship of the Top o' Texas Rodeo Association. Edward Vincent of Lefors is show manager and John T. Winters is show secretary. O.G. Bow, Jr. of Whitewright, Texas will judge all events.

All entries must be regis tered with the American Quarter Horse Association and shown away calf ropers. in the name of the owner as recorded. Entries in 4-H Club and FFA classes must present a signed statement from their 4-H leader or County Agent.

A Trophy Blanket will be awarded the high-point allaround horse in the show. To be eligible, an entry must show at Halter and in at least two Performance events. Cash prizes will be awarded in the fourteen Halter classes according to the number of entries in each class, with ribbons through six places. All entry fees will be jackpot in the eight Performance events, with \$10 added to the first place winnings in each event. Entry fees will be split 40%, 30%, 20% and 10%. Ribbons will be awarded through six places.

The AQHA All-Around Trophy will be awarded to the high-point youth exhibitor com peting in at least three of the ten youth events. Ribbons will be awarded through three places in all youth, 4-H Club
