Parks & Wildlife Com. Adopts New Game & Fish Law

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved a variety of changes for the state's game and fish laws.

Among the changes which should be of interest to many Texas outdoorsmen are bag and minimum size limits on catfish, prohibition of snagging as a method for taking fish, and the closing of the season on game animals, game birds or fur-bearing animals in state-owned river beds and railroad rights-of-way.

The commission approved 10 statewide law changes and a lengthy list of changes for specific regulatory counties.

The commission did not act on quail seasons or bag limits, in order to give field personnel additional time to assess bird population and conditions around the state.

The new changes will be included in the department's Hunting Guide and Fishing Guide, both to be available to the public before the hunting seasons open. The following are the statewide changes adopted by the commission:

Except for migratory waterfowl, there shall be no open season on game animals, game birds, or fur-bearing animals in state-owned river beds and railroad rights-of-way.

The taking or shooting of turkeys from the roost by any means is unlawful.

Language added to read: There shall be, however, an open season on fish, game animals, game birds and fur-bearing animals on National Wildlife Refugees to the extent that state and federal laws, rules or regulations as now exist or amended in the future may permit open season thereon.

The possession limit of channel, blue and flathead catfish is 50 and it is unlawful to possess any such catfish less than 11 inches in length.

Snagging or jerking fish (a method of taking fish by means of one or more hooks attached to a line and periodically jerking said line) is specifically defined as an illegal method for taking fish; artificial lures not included.

Added new language making it unlawful to have in possession or on board any boat or in any vehicle, any fish, other than rough fish (and catfish where applicable) as defined, while fishing with or possession of a hoop net, trammel net or gill net.

The section dealing with alligators was removed from all proclamations since it is regulated by statute.

All freshwater trotlines shall be identified by a legible tag bearing the name and address of the fisherman and the date the line was placed in the water.

The three-shell capacity restriction on shotguns is removed except where applicable in the taking of migratory game birds. Statewide limit on mule deer is one.

In the Panhandle Regulatory District, a change was authorized making it lawful to shoot game animals and game birds with a rifle, shotgun, or other legal firearm except it shall be unlawful to shoot migratory game birds and prairie chickens with a rifle.

Western Electric Co. Large Purchaser Of Texas Goods

Western Electric Company, the manufacturing and supply unit of the Bell System, purchased more than \$103.5 million worth of goods and services from Texas businesses during 1970, according to figures released by Southwestern Bell.

The amount represented an increase of more than \$28 million over Western's 1969 Texas expenditures.

Western paid a total of \$103,505,486 to 1,740 suppliers in more than a hundred Texas towns and cities during the year. More than 87% of these Texas firms were categorized as small businesses.

The cities where Western's expenditures were greatest included Dallas, Houston, Austin, Lubbock and San Antonio.

Payments to individual suppliers ranged from more than \$12.5 million down to several payments of \$2 each.

The expenditures were part of nationwide purchases totaling more than \$2.5 billion in the United States last year, and did not include Western's \$37.4 million payroll in the state.

As reflected in its Texas expenditures, Western not only purchases material to be used in production, but is also buys manufactured articles for use by the system's operating companies, such as Southwestern Bell which serves more than 89% of the telephones in the state.

About ten couples of the younger set went out to the W.B. Upham home Wednesday and spent a very enjoyable evening.

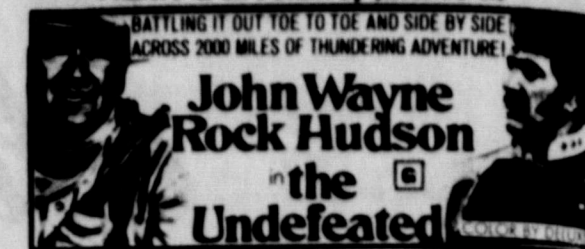
CATTLE ON FEED REPORT

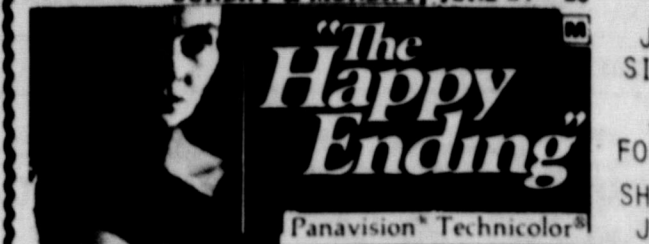

Cleaning Hints

Who's to blame when your best dress is returned from the dry cleaner's unfit to wear? Of three choices--the dry cleaner, the dress manufacturer, or you--the natural tendency is to blame the dry cleaner. But if you compare the number of clothes satisfactorily cleaned each year with the number of complaints, it's obvious that dry cleaners know what they are doing. Yet some mistakes are bound to happen.

Sometimes the trouble really is at the source--the garment or textile manufacturer. The dye might fade or streak no matter how well the item may be cared for. Buttons, plastic and vinyl pipping, special trims, linings, and facings can all pose problems for both the dry cleaner and you. Spots, stains, rips, and tears are your responsibility. Always tell the dry cleaner where the stains are and, if possible, what they are. Also, take the stained clothing to be cleaned while the stains are fresh. The longer you wait, the harder the stains are to remove. In some cases, long-standing spots or stains may weaken the fibers and become holes.

The two most important points for good dry-cleaning results are: Purchase quality merchandise. Use a reliable dry cleaner.

THE FAMILY LAWYER**Theft from Your Car**

Ethel, visiting at a friend's house, was positive she had left her car locked. Yet, when she returned to the car, she found a front door ajar. Sure enough, a gold bracelet placed in the glove compartment had vanished.



The next day she put in a claim under her homeowner's insurance policy. But the company refused to pay off, on the ground that the car showed no "visible marks" of burglary, as required by her policy.

Undeterred, Ethel filed suit. "It is true there were no marks on the car door," she said in court. "Probably the thief got in with a master key or a coat hanger. But the fact remains that my bracelet was stolen. The company is trying to hide behind a technicality."

Nevertheless, the court turned down her claim. The judge said an insurance company has the right to put reasonable limitations into its policy, adding: "A person gets what he pays for, whether it be insurance protection or anything else."

The requirement of "visible marks" is common in burglary insurance. One purpose is to lessen the chance of an "inside job," in which a policyholder reports a theft that never really happened.

On the other hand, a policy may provide coverage even for an unlocked car, provided it is not left "unattended." In one case, a TV set was stolen from an unlocked car, which the owner had left at the curb for only about five minutes.

Trying later to collect insurance, he argued that this was too brief a time to make the car "unattended." But again, a court denied the claim. The court said even five minutes of opportunity is enough to tempt a thief.

Similar problems of interpretation may arise in the burglary of a building. One case involved the picking of a lock on a grocery store. To meet the requirement of "visible marks," the grocer pointed out that scratches on the lock, made by burglar's tools, could be seen microscopically.

Were such marks "visible"? A court decided they were indeed, and made the insurance company pay for the loss. The judge said "visible" meant able to be seen rather than actually seen. The microscope, he said, merely made clearer what was already there.

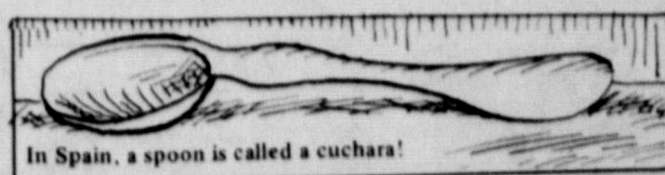
