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State Capital NEWS

The 1972 political campaigns are beginning to shape up -- 11 months before primary election dates.

William P. Hobby, president and executive editor of the Houston Post, is the first announced candidate for lieutenant governor. State Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall is expected to enter the race soon.

Gov. Ben Barnes is seeking advice of supporters on how he should run his race for governor. Barnes announced last month he will be a candidate, and has been busy traveling most of the time since.

Uvalde rancher-banker Dolph Hance moved quietly ahead with plans for a gubernatorial campaign in spite of Barnes' entry. Briscoe reportedly has a preliminary campaign event (a youth rally) scheduled for Uvalde July 23-24.

Gov. Preston Smith keeps insisting he may seek a third term, and a lot of folks are convinced he means it.

Former Sen. Ralph Yarborough says frankly he is considering running either for governor or the U.S. Senate. Republican Sen. John Tower has no hope of escaping Democratic opposition in a re-election campaign. Others mentioned as possible Democratic opponents for Tower include Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, state Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso and Houston attorney John L. Hill.

Top Democrats cite the need for a strong united party effort, particularly for the November presidential campaign, convention nominations battles and the U.S. Senate race. That's why they are keeping a close eye on naming a successor to state Democratic Chairman Dr. Elmer C. Baum of Austin.

Baum denied a published report he already had resigned but didn't rule out the possibility he may step aside soon.

Two aids to the Governor have been working on selection of a replacement chairman.

COURTS SPEAK

Texas Supreme Court overturned a lower court decision that a Tarrant County Charitable Institution (YMCA) is not liable for damages to a boy who lost an eye in a camp accident, and ordered a new trial.

In other recent actions, the High Court:

- Directed Austin trial court not to issue any more orders to prevent service by the new Southwest Airlines between San Antonio, Houston and Dallas.
- Held Fort Worth and Waco prosecutors must go ahead with pending cases involving Sunday closing laws before they file any more injunction suits.
- Sent back to intermediate court for further consideration Zavala County widow's suit against a butane gas supplier as the result of the accidental death of her husband in an explosion and fire.
- Set a July 21 hearing in Humble Oil and Refining Company's appeal from lower court findings that it must pay to the state \$92,788 in taxes on oil taken from lease on Corpus Christi Naval Air Station, federal property.
- Set a July 21 hearing on a case involving whether corporations can claim exemption from the penalty provision of state security laws. Two Lubbock men brought the case.
- Held Exchange Bank and Trust Company of Dallas must pay to a construction concern \$25,725 on forged company checks which it cashed by mistake.

APPOINTMENTS

Governor Smith named Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. of Lubbock chief justice of the 14th Court of Civil Appeals in Beaumont. Appointment removed Dies from speculation as a possible candidate for U.S. senator, lieutenant governor or congressman.

Smith appointed former state Rep. Jack Ray McLaughlin of Fort Worth as commissioner of labor statistics, succeeding Tommy V. Smith.

Other Smith appointees during the past week include Bow-

County Criminal District Attorney Guy E. Jones of Texarkana as judge of the new 202nd district court; N. L. Cooksey of Texarkana as criminal district attorney succeeding Jones in Bowie County, Bell County Court-at-Law Judge Donald L. Busby of Belton as 146th district judge; Dr. William Kenneth Thurmond of Fort Worth and Dr. Charles Max Cole of Dallas (re-appointed) to State Board of Health.

Curtis C. Gunn of San Antonio and Jack C. McKenzie of Corpus Christi are chairman and vice-chairman of the new Texas Motor Vehicle Commission to police auto dealers.

Other members are H. G. Andrews Jr. of Stamford, Dick McClain of Houston, Fenner Tubbs Sr. of Lubbock and W. O. Baniston of Dallas.

Richard Keahey, native of San Angelo, was appointed executive director of Texas Veterans Land Program succeeding W. W. Glass who held the job eight years.

Jack Banner of Wichita Falls, Robert L. Templeton of Amarillo and Morgan K. Talbot of McAllen are chairman, vice-chairman and secretary of Texas Bar Foundation.

BANK DEPOSITS, INTEREST UP

A recent statewide survey showed bank deposits steadily increasing -- some to record levels at mid-year.

Mid-year records are considered unusual, and the boom is regarded as proof of the basic economic strength in spite of drought, unemployment and other problems.

At the same time, major Texas banks went along with eastern institutions and raised prime interest rates. Increase was from 5.5% to six per cent for prime loans to quality borrowers.

Eastern banks also raised interest rates on time accounts which may attract even more deposits in savings accounts in the next quarter of 1971.

SAFETY PROGRAM STEPPED UP

Governor Smith approved three Texas Alcohol Safety Action projects designed to control abusive drinker-drivers, regarded as the number one traffic safety menace in Texas.

Applications went to National Highway Traffic Safety Administration for federal funding approval.

Projects are in Harris County (\$311,200), Dallas (\$239,300) and Central Texas (Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Mills, and Mills counties, \$300,700).

Aim is to identify problem drinker-drivers, apply a variety of possible solutions and evaluate results as to the overall effectiveness.

GAME FISH RULES CHANGED

Ten county commissioners courts have voted to amend 1971-72 game and fish regulations proposed by Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Legislature this year authorized five more counties to reject proclamations passed by PWC. Similar authority had been given 18 counties, subject to vote of commissioners courts.

Ten counties which disapproved portions of proclamations are Edwards, Dimmit, Hays, Kendall, Kimble, Medina, Real, Robertson, Sutton and Uvalde. Banders, Coke, Crockett, Frio, Kerr, Kinney, Lampasas, Menard, Reagan, San Saba, Schleicher, Val Verde and Zavala counties approved laws as submitted.

BANKING BOARD TO MEET

State Banking Board scheduled a Thursday (July 14) meeting, charter applications which may be ready for vote, and requests by banks for changes in business locations. Meeting will be the first since Dr. Elmer Baum resigned last May. James Lindsey of College Station was named to the Board to succeed Baum.

Air Force planes began spraying last week to halt the spread of Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, a mosquito-spread disease.

Commissioner And City Council Discuss Problems

The Gray County commissioners heard reports on financial difficulties of several concerns operating in the county at their meeting Monday. Among these was a report by Creed Lamb, operator of Lamb Funeral Home in McLean.

Lamb asked commissioners to consider the problem of his company providing ambulance service in the McLean area. Lamb and Jim Kelso, Wellington funeral director, outlined problems of ambulance service provision.

Lamb told the court that he would not offer the county an ultimatum, but that he hoped some method of easing the operating costs of ambulance service could be instigated.

The funeral director listed specific cases of failure to collect payment for services, problems in collecting from Medicare, and cases of insurance companies and individuals failing to acknowledge statements for service. Lamb said failure to collect for services rendered plus added government regulations during the past five years had forced him to consider seeking methods to relieve part of the problem.

Kelso advised that his business was identical to those in Collingsworth County.

The problem also was discussed at a McLean City Council meeting Tuesday night in an effort to find a way the city might help solve the problem. Turning the ambulance service over to the McLean Volunteer Fire Department has been considered.

Frank Phillips College Will Soon Celebrate Their 23rd Anniversary

Frank Phillips College, Borger, Texas opened for the reception of students on September 6, 1948. During the opening month of Texas State Department of Education recognized Frank Phillips College as a standard two year institution. In April of 1949 the Association of Texas Colleges recognized the institution and gave it a first class rating by granting full membership.

In December of 1958 Frank Phillips College was approved and accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

In 1959 the college district voted a \$650,000, 00 bond issue for an additional building and other improvements.

In August of 1960 a new Fine Arts Building and Student Center was completed. Three new laboratories were added, and the Physical Education Building was enlarged with a foyer and two large dressing rooms.

In November of 1965 the college district voted overwhelmingly to raise the tax rate and give authority to issue \$600,000 in bonds for construction of a new library.

The old library area in the north wing of the administration building has been changed into a modern business administration department.

In the fall of 1966, 5 1/2 acres were purchased which brought the total campus acreage to about 61 acres.

The college campus is located in the southwest part of the city. It is one of the highest parts of the local terrain and affords a beautiful view of the city. The buildings are located on the western slope of the campus. They are designed in the low western style of architecture with open corridors.

The Fine Arts Building on the South campus has 36,000 square feet of area. This building has ten classrooms, five music practice rooms, seven instructors offices and a beautiful auditorium with a seating capacity of 500. Adjoining the Fine Arts Building is a Student Center, with a spacious cafeteria, student lounge and the college Cookstore. These additions are air-conditioned.

LIBRARY

The James W. Dillard Library was completed in the spring of 1967. This building houses the library as well as nine classrooms, the President's office, a general business office. It is located in the center of the campus, its lower and height overlook the other buildings on the campus.

The library has a seating capacity of 266, which includes study carrels, individual study tables, regular reading tables and lounge areas. The James W. Dillard Library contains a total collection of over 30,000 items, of which over 20,000 volumes are books and bound periodicals. The remaining items in the collection include unbound periodicals, pamphlets, newspapers, pictures and maps and microfilms. Books are purchased primarily for courses offered. Library users have

In an executive session of the McLean Independent School District Board of Trustees Monday night, Jack R. Riley superintendent, and Mrs. Wheeler Carter, school business manager, resigned their position in the school system. David Woods, board member, followed their action by resigning his position on the board.

The resignations came during the closed session of the board after all other business was finished in an open meeting.

Board member Dick Everett expressed his opinion that he felt that he could speak for the majority of the board that it would be in the best interest of the school district if Riley and Mrs. Carter both resigned. One reason given was "lack of co-operation."

Carter and Riley each resigned. Board member James Ellison made a motion to accept the two resignations, with member Leslie Darsey seconding. The vote was unanimous in favor of acceptance of the resignations, which will be effective August 1. However, member Creed Lamb had left just before the vote.

Also, David Woods turned in his resignation. Woods said he resigned "Due to recent developments and in order to promote harmony on the McLean school board."

Ellison made a motion to accept Woods' resignation. The motion was seconded by member Bob Sherrod, and the vote again was unanimous. The meeting was adjourned at 1:15 a. m.

Earlier in the meeting, school board members met with members of the Board of Equalization, with representatives of the oil and gas industry, and with representatives of the Thomas Y. Pickett Co., tax evaluation engineers, to discuss industrial and local tax rates. Further discussion on this subject will be made Friday morning at 9 a. m. at the City Hall.

In other action, the school board hired Daie Westfall as a high school commercial teacher, agreed to have repairs done in the girls' dressing room of the gym and minor roof repairs done on the high school, and voted to renew the school's contract with the Thomas Y. Pickett Co.

Dry, windy, hot weather has dried all the grass brown after had a brief spell of being green. A slow three-inch rain would solve a lot of problems now. The dry weather has created a rash of drilling new irrigation wells on the High Plains. These wells are expensive but pay off when managed properly. A few new wells in the McLean vicinity have been drilled. Some are in the planning stage. Most of the irrigation wells in the McLean vicinity will be used for irrigating alfalfa. There will be an excellent market for

Alfalfa hay for years to come. A lot of alfalfa is required to take care of the commercial feed lots which now have almost one-and three-quarter million head on feed in the Panhandle.
 There is much area in the McLean area that is undeveloped. We think you will see more of it come under sprinkler irrigation within the next few years.
PRAIRIE DOGS
 We are beginning to get a few prairie dogs back into the County after having them pretty well eradicated a few years back. One place West of Pampa is as bad as I've ever seen. One of the best ways to get rid of a few dens is by using regular or drip gasoline. Place a funnel in a rubber hose about six foot long and pour about one gallon of gasoline per den. Place a piece of sod over the hole and round up with loss dirt.

Poisoning with strychnine grain is effective in winter months if prebaiting is done with clean untreated grain.
 Let me encourage you to stamp out these pesky and destructive rodents before they get a big start on you. I would be glad to advise you as to where you can obtain poison grain.
ELM LEAF BEETLE
 If an insect has been eating the green part of your leaves and this causes the leaf to have a transparent look, there is an excellent chance you have elm leaf beetles. A combination of two insecticides are used. They are Sevin and Dieldrin. Malathion can be substituted for Sevin. These insects are very migratory and chances are they will invade you again. Encourage your neighbors to spray. This will help greatly. A good power spray that will go to the top of your trees is essential.
