> Timing of wheat irrigation is of maximum importance in influencing the yield of wheat. At the Halfway Experiment Station the most profitable yield was secured when irrigated at jointing, boot, head and dough stages in 1965. This irrigation test produced 67.6 bushels per acre. The wheat was irrigated to a stand after planted. Irrigation at the jointing, boot and head stages produced 58.9 bushels per acre in 1965. This wheat was not watered in the dough stages. An extra February irrigation in 1965 was unprofitable as it reduced the yield to 48 bushels per acre.
