with through the years. In September 1921 - after ing course in Denver, Colora do, I began teaching piano at the McLean Elementary school with very little experience and not too much in qualifications, but continued to improve in

Your support and co-operation has been most wonderful. Otherwise I could not have made it through the 50 years.

I have a class picture of 28 students in 1922. That number increased year by year until the last years of the depression and then followed by the peak years in the late 1930's and early 1940's when I taught from 8 a.m. till 6 p.m. Students were permitted to come to lessons during school, but that could not go on forever. For health's sake I had to reduce my number and began teaching at home where I have maintained my studio since with a good size class and closed the 50th year with a recital by 20 students - with an average. I would judge of 25 plus a year for the 50 years. What more could I ask?

Many have come and gone in that short time and some for years of continued study. There have been some come for the second generation and the Morse and Noel families have kept students coming for 3 generations,

Occasionally I hear complaints that I expect too much of students. I would like to tell you a little secret. In September 1921, Rev. Roberts, pastor of the First Presbyterian church in his address to the school assembly remarks that all some teachers seem to be interested in is to draw their breath and draw their salary. I resolved not to be in that category so if I have expected too much of any, lay it to his charge and not to mine. I will say this, if I have been

unliked, unfair or inconsiderate at any time, please forgive as I don't want to harm or hurt anyone. Some have wanted to help me celebrate the Golden Year but for reasons not best publicized I had to decline. All

the celebration I want is to say "Thank You" to as many as I can for seeing me safely through. You have kept me going for many years past what is considered the retirement age and I know that shorter hours and less strenuous work are better for health if not for wealth, I want to express my appreciation for being placed in the semi-retirement rather than complete retirement and though we are not so great in numbers we will still try to keep our quality high.

I close with a big THANK YOU to all who have contributed to my support in any way, Even to the "Well Wishes" on the side line and to the Good Lord above for giving me health and grit and grace to carry on at the same old stand for half a century. Yours in Love and Apprecia-


