Charlie Carpenter Long-time Resident Buried Today

Charles Marvin Carpenter, a pioneer of the McLean area, passed away at 2 p.m. Tuesday, July 11 in a Lubbock Nursing Home. Funeral services for him were held Thursday (today) at 2 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church in McLean.

Rev. Jack Riley, pastor of Trinity Methodist Church in Amarillo, officiated. Burial was in the Hillcrest Cemetery by Lamb Funeral Home.

Mr. Carpenter served as a Gray County Commissioner for a number of years, was a rancher in the McLean area from 1901 to 1955 when he retired and had been a resident of a Lubbock nursing home since August 1971.

A member of the Masonic Lodge 889, he was active in the local Lions Club, and served on the board of stewards of the Methodist Church for a number of years.

Mr. Carpenter came to the McLean area from Hays County. He was a native of Buda and was married to the former Laura Grace McMurtry.

He was active in the Panhandle Hereford Breeders Association. Mr. Carpenter, who was known as "Charlie" to everyone, loved this community and the people here, and will long be remembered.

His survivors include his wife, Laura Grace of the Lubbock Nursing Home; a son Dr. James W. Carpenter of Lubbock; two daughters, Mrs. Charles Finley of Lubbock and Mrs. Frank Winsett of Amarillo; one brother, Fred Carpenter of Buda; six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.


LCC To Have A Music Camp

ToT Rodeo Scheduled Aug. 2-5

The 26th annual Top O' Texas Rodeo is scheduled in Pampa Aug. 2-5 in an all new grandstand and pens built recently following a tornado of two years ago.

Pampa has not had a rodeo for the past two years due to the tornado in 1970 and the VEE quarantine of last year, which made necessary the cancellation for two years in a row.

Directors of the Association report all plans finalized and an all-time record number of entries are expected for the rodeo, which has been in operation here since 1945.

A street parade is scheduled for Wednesday afternoon, Aug. 2, at 4 p.m. to get the rodeo underway, with nightly performances at 8 p.m.

Tommy and Beverly Steiner of Austin will produce this year's rodeo, featuring some of the top specialty acts on the rodeo circuit, including the Kajun Kid, popular rodeo clown.

Helen Taylor and her all-girl show band direct from Las Vegas will be featured at all rodeo performances and will play for dancing in the National Guard Armory Wednesday through Saturday nights.

All of the regular RCA events will be included, with cowboys and cowgirls competing for an estimated purse of \$10,000. An amateur bareback riding contest, with a purse of \$200 plus entry fees, is scheduled in order that all amateurs in this area may participate.

Tom Hadley of Kerrville will be the announcer. Hadley has gained a national reputation as a rodeo announcer and has worked with Steiner for many years. He has had extensive experience in the national finals and national televised rodeos.

Holly Gray, president of the Top O' Texas Rodeo Association, said that ample free parking will be available. Ticket reservations may be secured by writing the Top O' Texas Rodeo Office, P. O. Box 1942, Pampa, Texas 79065.

The Kid Pony Show, which is a miniature rodeo for ages 5 through 15, will be held Tuesday, Aug. 1, with both afternoon and evening performances. Practice nights will be July 26 and 28.



GRASSHOPPERS

Grasshoppers are locally heavy in some parts of the county. Glen Hodges, who lives S.E. of Laketon said he had seen a number of very severe hot spots. Check your fence rows closely. The best time to get them is before they leave the area where they were hatched. It's a very simple job to kill them in a fence row when they are small. Malathion is the main chemical used to control them. This is an excellent insecticide to use around and in your garden. Follow directions carefully.

READ THOSE LABELS

It has become increasingly important to read and follow labeled instructions more carefully. There is more surveillance on chemical residue now than ever before. Last week a representative of the environmental protection agency from New Mexico was in my office. The purpose of his visit to Pampa was to

make a report on the last of fifteen head of calves out of twenty seven head. The owner had not followed labeled instruction. He fed lawn clippings that had been treated some two weeks earlier with Pax-A Crab grass killer. Pax contains arsenic.

COTTON CONDITION

We have had some calls on the condition of our cotton crop. We plan to inspect a few fields of cotton soon after this writing and make a determination. Some have reported trouble with thrips. They will prevent the setting of fruit until too late to make. Spraying is essential some years. Research work at Lubbock some years earlier showed a tremendous advantage to spraying.

We have had ideal weather for both insects and plant disease. More on this later. Most cotton farmers have obtained good stands.

CATTLE PRICES

Last week I saw a load of cattle that came out of New Port, Tenn. They were steer and bull calves (mostly bulls) Their weight was 353 pounds They were mostly number one Okie with a sprinkle of number twos. The cost was \$48. - 14 per cwt. I thought this was high.

The following day I saw a load of straight # 1 steer and bull calves that weighed 393.

The cost was 49.09 per cwt. How high can they get? Don't ask me I've missed it a mile. I was optimistic last fall but not this much. Today we talked to the buyer in Tenn. He said the same steers would cost a \$1.50 more than last week.







Local Farmers Now Cashing Farm Set-Aside Payments

Approximately 320 farmers in Gray County are scheduled to receive farm set-aside program payments during the next week, according to Evelyn Mason, County Executive Director, Gray County ASCS.

By the end of the month, the total will be about 450 farmers. All those who report the grain sorghum and cotton by the middle of the

month should receive payment by the end of the month. It will take about two weeks after reporting to receive the payment.

Nationwide, approximately 750,000 cotton, feed grain and wheat producers were mailed a total of \$850 million in expedited preliminary payments in time for the checks to arrive by this time.

Payments under the set-aside programs are made to farmers who agree to set aside part of their land from production in order to meet a national objective of bal-

ancing supply and demand in certain commodities. These payments help to off-set the less of returns from cropland that otherwise would be used for income-yielding production, and on which the farmer is obliged to continue to pay taxes and apply needed conservation steps, according to officials of the United States Department of Agriculture. Payments to producers are limited to \$55,000 per person for each of the three crops--feed grains, wheat, and cotton. Under the Agricultural Act of 1970.

Nationally total payments are expected to be about \$3.7 billion total 1972 farm set-aside program will be made when reported.

Feed grain producers in the nation ultimately will receive about \$1.9 billion, cotton producers about \$825 million, and wheat producers about \$1 billion. Preliminary payments to wheat producers are limited by the law to 75 percent of final payments. Final wheat certificates payments will be made after December 1. Feed grain and cotton farmers may or may not get a final payment, depending on market conditions.

The expedited farm program payments are made possible by streamlined procedures inaugurated in 1970

and 1971 program six to eight weeks earlier than ever before.

These early payments help many producers reduce their need for long-term credit and cut the amount of interest paid. The flow of cash at this time will again be of major significance to rural communities and the United States agricultural economy. USDA officials have announced.

Screwworm Total Hits Weekly High

Last week was the worst in the history in the 10-year old Screwworm Program, Mission Lab officials gloomily announced Tuesday.

Texas was hit with a soaring 3,879 cases, nearly 900 more than the previous record of 3,023 established the first week of July, 1962.

Texas' 1972 total is now 16,196, second only to the 49,484 cases of 1972.

The voracious fly struck in seven new counties to raise that count to 162. The newcomers were Childress, Crane, McLennan, Oldham, Palo Pinto, Swisher, and Wichita.

The five-state figure through last Friday (June 23) rests at 16,391 cases, the lab reported.
