Prairie Chicken Hunters Have Good Success

The hunters who braved the elements during the two-day prairie chicken season in the Permian Basin and Panhandle really earned their birds.

High winds, hard rains and in some areas, hail, didn't stop the shotgunners from downing 189 chickens in the Panhandle and 201 birds in the Permian Basin.

The object of the hunt, the lesser prairie chicken, was once a disappearing species, but improved management practices have brought the population of prairie chickens back to huntable numbers.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists who monitored the chicken hunts this year said they were of the opinion that it was highly successful.

Soil Erosion May Occur After Rains

When rain falls or water from any source runs downhill on bare soils, it moves soil particles, organic matter, and nutrients needed by plants, according to Rodney Hyatt, soil conservationist. Soil erosion may occur anytime we receive enough moisture to cause runoff.

To avoid erosion on soils which are not structures which are not reasonably flat there must be permanent cover of mechanical structures.

Terraces, diversions, and waterways are structures most commonly used to control erosion by water, stated Hyatt. Waterways are natural or man made water-course protected against erosion by a grass cover. They can also serve as safe outlets for terraces and diversions. Water that enters a farm from other land can be safely carried off that land by use of a waterway. In many cases a waterway may be installed on the edge of a place where a diversion can be constructed to carry the runoff safely to the protected area.

Wouldn't it be better to put up with a small inconvenience now than to be blocked later by a gully.

On cultivated land, the prevention of excessive erosion is a major conservation objective. Positive steps to improve the soil and use it efficiently are a part of modern soil conservation. But without protection from erosion, soil improvement effort fail.

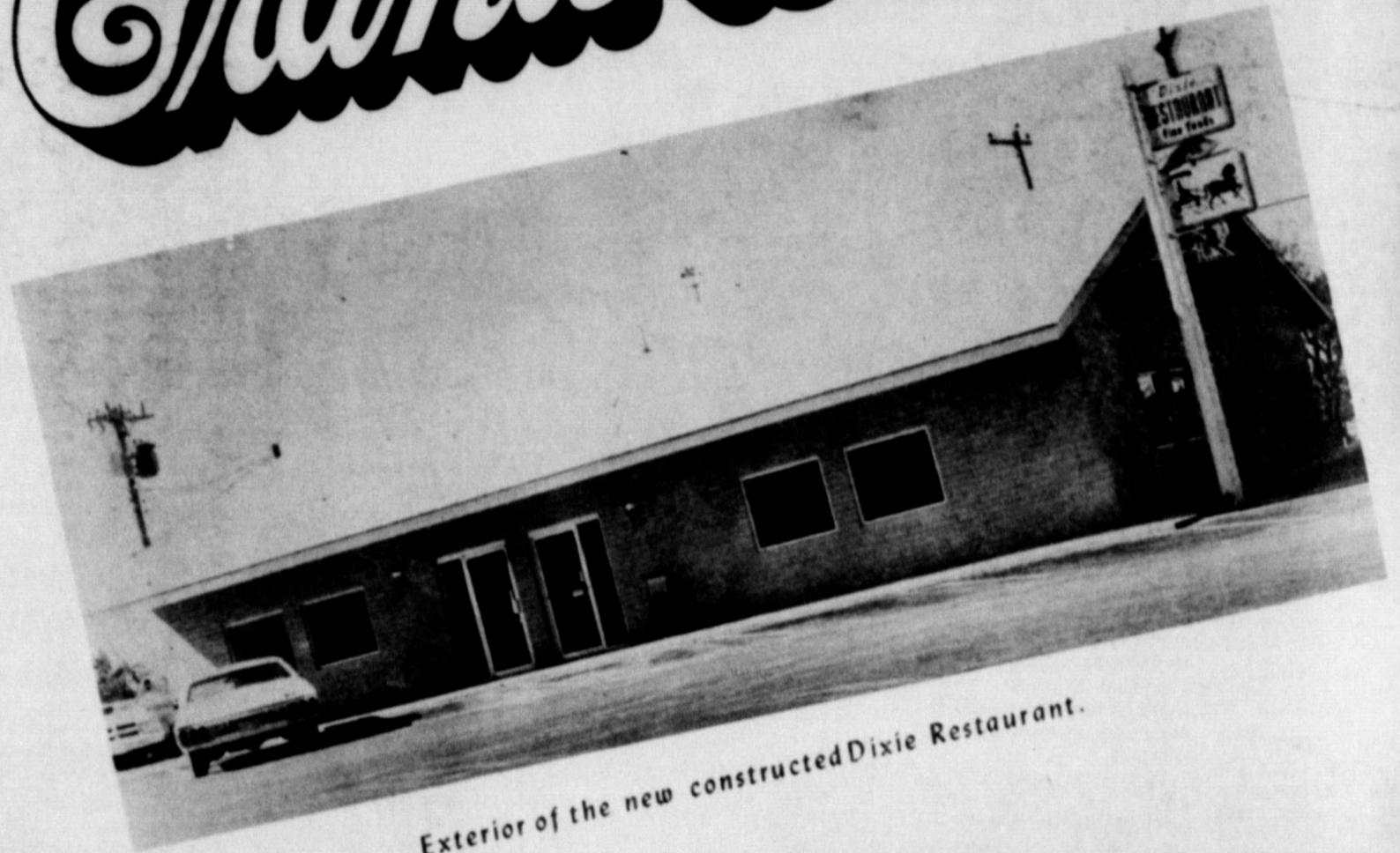
Erosion control requires the attention of each landuser to his land on each acre. It also requires cooperation between owners on adjoining land, because water knows no property boundaries.

If water is eroding your land, take steps for needed control. For assistance contact the soil Conservation service at the Pampa Court House Annex.

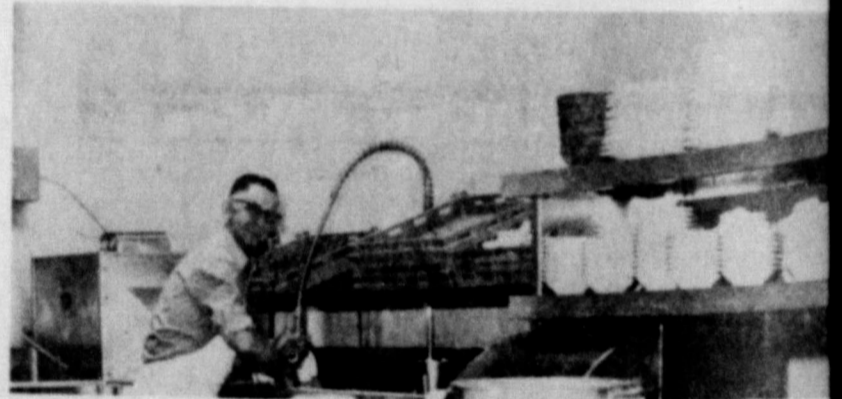

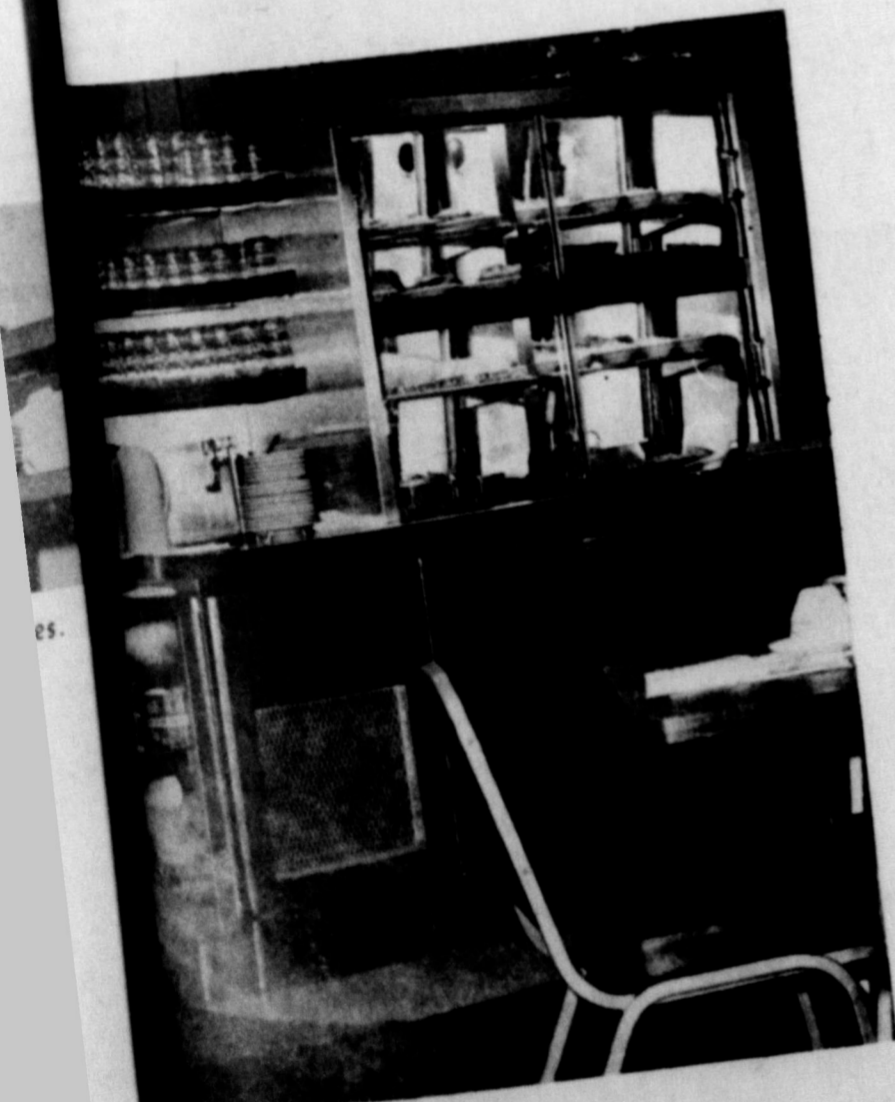

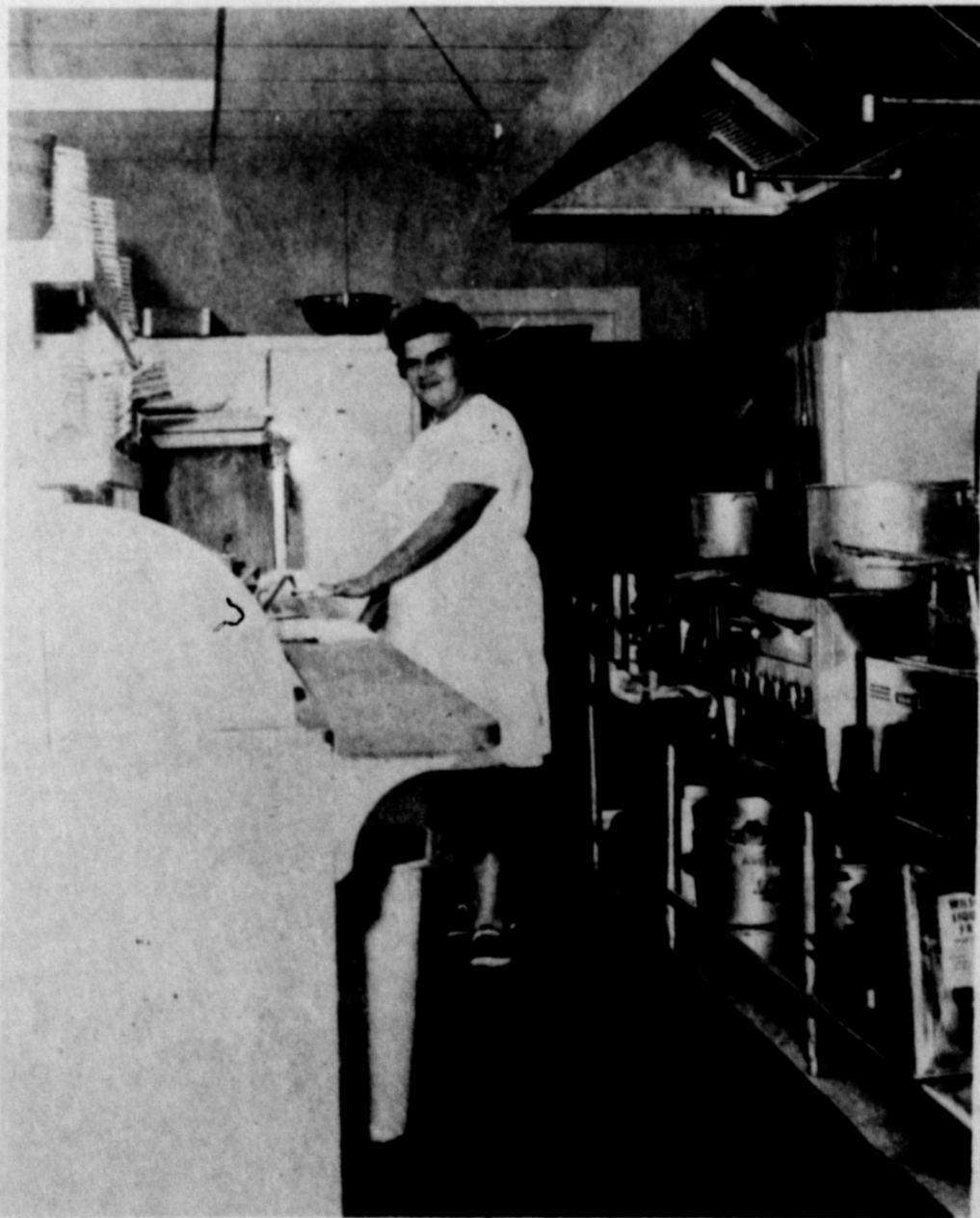

Cotton Producers To Have Annual Meet

The Directors of the Greenbelt Cotton Producers, Inc. announce that the annual meeting of the organization will be held on November 11. The meeting will convene at 2:00 p.m. at the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Memphis. Mr. Wiley Cain, the officer in charge of the Memphis Cotton Classing office will also be on hand.

The Memphis Classing Office began receiving samples on November 1. There were 144,396 cotton samples classed last season.

82% Savings Bond Goal Reached

According to a report received from County Bond Chairman George B. Cree, sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Gray County during September totaled \$35,082. Sales for the nine-month period were \$346,480 for 82% of the 1972 goal of \$420,000.

Sales in Texas during the month were \$18,357,152 compared to \$15,465,128 during September 1971. The January-September sales totaled \$189,190,679 with 81% of the sales goal of \$197.5 million achieved.

Nationwide, September purchases of Series E and H Bonds amounted to \$472 million--13.8% above 1971 sales of \$415 million. Sales for the first nine months totaled \$4,774 million--14.4% above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for new Series H Bonds amounting to \$254 million were reported for the nine-month period--29% above the \$197 million exchange in 1971.

SCS To Have Seminar And Field Day

Anyone interested is invited to attend a seminar and field trip to discuss establishment and management of weeping lovegrass, reported Mickey Black, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service. The tour will be conducted in Wheeler County, (Friday) November 17, 1972. The tour will start at 9:15 a.m. with an assembly on the north side of the Wheeler County Courthouse.

The morning will consist of visiting the C. O. Killingsworth farm, the Floyd Davidson farm, the Vernon Smith farm, and the Gordon Whiteaker farm. At each stop, the farmer will be on hand to talk to the group about his experiences with and the use of weeping lovegrass. After lunch, a slide talk and program will be given by Max Hatter, Wheeler County Agent; and Bill Brooks, District Conservationist-SCS, on information gathered on the varieties, establishment, management and returns of weeping lovegrass in Wheeler County.

This seminar and field trip is being sponsored by the North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Area of which Gray County is a member. It has been set up

to inform landusers and ers of the value of Weep Lovegrass and its potential for development, stated Black.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

"There were 55,000 criminal trials pending in district courts and 216,000 civil cases pending on dockets in Texas at the beginning of 1972," former Texas Chief Justice Robert Calvert told those attending the Governor's fourth annual Traffic Safety Public Support Conference in Austin.

This "Crisis in our courts" has been caused by the constitutional restrictions on the Judicial Article, Judge Calvert explained.

The "crisis is approaching a judicial scandal" he quoted Judge Truman Roberts of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals as saying.

Judge Calvert outlined problems in the present judicial system in Texas--explaining that they were analyzed by the 1972 Chief Justice's Task Force for Court Improvement.

The major problems are (1) docket congestion and trial delay; (2) proper administration and (3) proper election of judges.

Proposals for complete reorganization of Texas Courts will be presented to the 1973 Texas Legislature," the former Chief Justice continued. "Opposition will come from elected officials who are afraid it will affect their jobs.

"Judicial reform is doomed for this generation if public support does not overcome the opposition to these proposed changes in the Judicial Article of the Texas Constitution," he concluded.

A citizen's conference to gain support for the proposed judicial reform will be held in Austin on November 17--at which time specific legislative proposals will be outlined for the public and press.

REVENUE SHARING COUNCIL FORMED

The Texas Department of Community Affairs has been designated as the agency to provide information and aid to local governments in federal revenue sharing implementation.

Designation of the agency for liaison between state-federal and local government was agreed on at a meeting of the new Texas Revenue Sharing Council.

Texas is expected to receive about \$245 million during 1972 under the new federal revenue sharing program. About \$163 million of that will go to local governments, and \$81.5 million to state government.

The council, said Gov. Preston Smith, is not to interfere with individual decisions of local governments. Its purpose is to assist the local units with legal constraints and federal rules and regulations.

Council members directed the Department of Community Affairs to establish and man an Office of Revenue Sharing Assistance to local governments. The department, Texas Municipal League and Texas Association of Counties will assist the Treasury Department in completing lists of eligible governments and their officials.

The Department of Community Affairs was further ordered to plan a statewide workshop on revenue sharing for local officials.

Texas was termed "best prepared" of any state to begin implementation of revenue sharing.

Ben Barnes, House Speaker Rayford Price, Seguin Mayor Al Koebig, Houston Mayor Louie Welch, Victoria Mayor Kemp Williams Jr., Nueces County Judge Bob Barnes, Ector County Commissioner Kellus Turner and Bexar County Commissioner Frank Vaughan Jr.

COURTS SPEAK

The court of Criminal Appeals scheduled a December 12 hearing on the appeal of former State Rep. Walter Knapp of Amarillo from a four-year prison sentence for theft by false pretext.

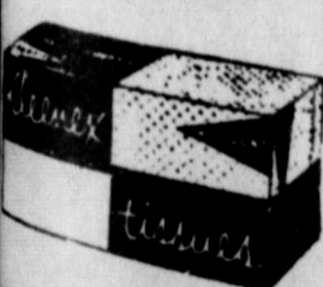

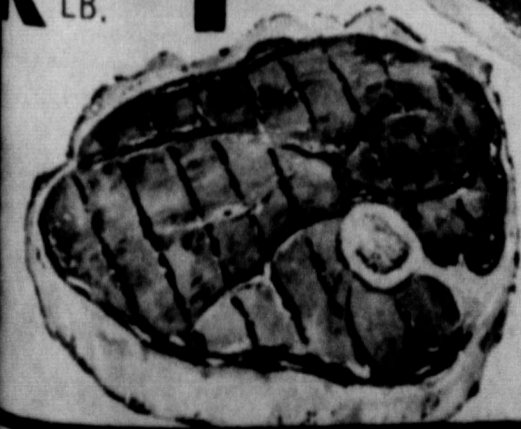

check littering on highways. DPS has created a specialized task force to coordinate a statewide effort against auto theft. The 15-member group will investigate thefts of auto boats, motorcycles, heavy equipment, mobil homes, travel trailers and boat power units. Members will be stationed at strategic locations over the state.

DPS patrolmen in all uniformed services, meanwhile, have been ordered to watch closely for motorists and others who throw litter on the highways or right-of-ways. Fines from \$25 to \$200 may be assessed for littering arrests in 1971 as compared with 225 in 1960.

After 50,000 motor vehicles were stolen in Texas last year, an increase of 17 per cent over 1970. Losses were estimated at \$35 million.

MINERAL VALUE UP Texas mineral production rose 6.3 per cent last year to a value of \$6.8 billion. Texas was the country's leading producer of petroleum, natural gas, natural gas liquids, natural graphite, magnesium metal and recovered sulphur.

Large quantities of helium, Frasch sulphur, lime, gypsum clays, sand and gravel, salt, metallic sodium and uranium ore were also produced. Value of mineral fuels amounted to \$6.3 billion, more than 93 per cent of the total value of Texas minerals.

PERMANENT RIGHTS COMMISSION URGED The Governor's Committee on Human Relations urged establishment of a permanent commission to investigate alleged discrimination in employment, education, housing and other areas.

A report to Governor Smith and the Legislature noted Texas will be left without a formal agency to fight discrimination and improve human relations after next February unless action is taken before that time.

QUESTIONS and ANSWERS CONCERNING McLEAN SCHOOLS

Questions: Why don't all band members get to march or perform on Friday nights and at marching contest?

Answer: There are only certain numbers of people that can fit into a particular block formation. Each rank (line across the front) and each file (lines down the side) must be of uniform size. For example, if a band marched six ranks and six files, there would be 36 marchers. If there were 38 people in the band, two of them would not get to march.

Also, if a student does not attend rehearsals regularly and does not learn the music that he was assigned, he would not be of any benefit to the band as a whole. A few people who do not really know what they are supposed to be doing out on the marching field can ruin a performance for the rest of the people who have worked hard attending rehearsals and learning their parts of the music.

Question: What happens if one or more band members are unable to attend a performance of the band?

Answer: If these people miss a band performance and do not have a legitimate excuse they are expelled from the band. If there has been an illness or a family emergency or something of that nature, the student would not be expelled. If a student misses a performance at a Friday night football game, the band has to march with one or more vacancies. This is not a good practice because on occasion the maneuvers performed by some people in the band result from the maneuvers performed by other people. Marching with vacancies makes it very difficult to march a precise half-time show.

In an ideal situation there would always be some alternates, (people who do not march regularly) so that there would be someone available to march in the event that one or more of the regular marchers would be unable to attend the performance. These alternates, in themselves, would have to be excellent marchers because usually they would not have much time to learn the show and their maneuver. However, in our situation, when we march on Friday night every single person in the band, with the exception of the varsity football players who are band members, marches. When people are absent from the performance we have no alternative but to march with vacancies simply because of the small number of people in the band.

Question: How many band members are there? How many band boosters are there? How many band boosters attend meetings? What are the functions of the Band Boosters?

Answer: There are 42 band members. Fifteen eighth graders march with the band for Friday night football game. There are 24 members in the Band Boosters' Club. Usually from six to eight members attend Band Boosters' meetings, and there has been as many as ten.

The Band Boosters' Club annually furnishes a band banquet in the spring for band members and the general public. They annually sponsor an end-of-school picnic for the members of the junior high band. They annually buy a film of the marching

contest performance of the band which is filmed at the actual contest. The band boosters' club is always ready to undertake any other project which the band director and the school and the club members feel would be of benefit to the band and to the band's representation of McLean and McLean High School.

Question: How many football players are also bandmen? How does the band march on Friday night if the football players are playing football?

Answer: There are seven bandmen on the varsity football team. There are five bandmen on the junior varsity team. The bandmen who play on the varsity football team are excused from marching on Friday nights and from all rehearsals connected with those Friday night performances, but they are not excused from contest and rehearsals for contest. The band marches with its remaining members. Bandmen who are on the junior varsity football team are expected to march because it does not interfere with their games, which are usually on Thursday night.

Question: How many days before contest should a band start getting their show ready?

Answer: This is somewhat of an ambiguous question because a good, sharp band that works hard can prepare a contest show in a very short length of time; whereas when a band is just the opposite no amount of time will suffice to make the show what it should be. A band should start their contest show early enough so that they can reach their peak performance level for that particular show on that particular contest day. If the band begins too early they will become tired of the show by contest time and will reach their peak performance level too early and their show too late, it will not be worked up to the desired level by contest time. For an average band the contest show should be started about 20 rehearsal days before the scheduled contest.
