Plainview Farmers Say USDA Misled Cotton Farmers

Plainview farmer Frank Moore says cotton farmers were misled by the U.S. Department of Agriculture last spring when they were advised to plant more cot-ton. "The farmers followed recommendations of the US-DA in the spring of this year and increased their acres of cotton considerably. Now they are blessed with a bumper crop but cursed by low prices. And after this recommendation had been followed by farmers, the Nixon administration is doing nothing to relieve the disastrous price situation." The price on some cotton has dropped to 12 cents per pound since the record crop was announced.

Moore is co-chairman of Rural Texans for McGovern Shriver. He said, "I see where Red Woodsom, Farm Bureau President, is trying to talk Secretary Butz into authorizing a price support program for cotton seed. Not only is the price for cotton very low this year, but also, the price on seed is way down. Texas farmers are only receiving 52.6 per cent parity on their cotton seed. This is a particularly harsh blow because of the low price of fiber this year,"

Moore said he thought farmers would be less likely to listen to the USDA in the future in light of the bad advice given on cotton and because of the wheat scandal "They will certainly not want to listen to anyone in the Nixon administration for advice on their farms," Moore concluded.

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

CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Ten members of a 12member jury can decide civil cases under new rules of civil.litigation procedures adopted last week by the State Supreme Court.

Unanimous verdicts are now required of juries, and the change is regarded as one of the most far-reaching in many years.

An effort in the last Legislature to authorize 10-2 jury verdicts fell under weight of defense attorney opposition.

Retiring : Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert Called the revised rules "The greatest reform measure during my term (22 years) on the court,

Rules deal with appeal motions, depositions, evidenc discovery motions, and

other matters. Calvert said changes would do away with some elements of adversary system and open up evidence. Rules will take effect Feb. 1, 1973.

Unanimous verdicts still will be required in criminal cases, but in civil litigation 10 or more jurors can decide a case. Five-to-one verdicts will be permitted in municipal, justice of peace and county courts at law where six-man juries now decide cases.

Some attorneys said the key rules change would eliminate hung juries in civil cases, speed up trials and ease the backlog of civil cases jamming metropolitan courts. Others said the changes in discovery of evidence will reduce the number of actual trials. The latter change will allow all parties to a case to see what both sides have as evidence.

Another change would allow the State Supreme Court to reverse or modify a lower court finding or entering a new decision without awaiting less than 1968 and 1970. formal arguments of contesting parties.

AGENDA GROWS AND GROWS Gov. Preston Smith con-

tinued to open the special session call to new subject matter before any final action was taken on competitive insurance rates or gubematerial fiscal powers.

Last Tuesday he dropped 16 more bill proposals on lawmakers for attention in a session dur to wind up Oc tober 17. Among them were the following:

An \$8 million appropriation for a Fort Worth school for the mentally retarded, changing hunting and fishing license fees, allowing bond financing of voting machines in counties over one million population, allowing subdivisions to issue bonds for air control facilities and lease the facilities to private interests, amend-

ing retirement statutes to allow credit for certain military, state employment and judicial services, allow-ing the State Board of Control to make purchases for political subdivisions and defining "child" under juvenile court procedures as one over 10 and under 17

years of age. Key legislators began to question whether the variety of subjects permitted to focus of legislative and public attention on insurance reform which Smith claimed he wanted.

SUPERPORT COMING

Texas may be getting a net offloading terminal for super-tankers whether the Legislature approves a state commission to plan and construct one or not.

Oil company spokesman told a joint House-Senate committee they propose to have their own facility (Known as "seadock") operative by 1975 or 1976 and feel there is no need for a state expenditure.

A bill submitted by Governor Smith to create a state authority to formulate plans for the offshore terminal won support of many witnesses claimed a vital segment of the Texas economy depends on a superport's being con-

structed along the coast.

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

About three days after they have cleaned up the last of the good oats place about a tablespoon of the treated oats around each den. In about a week you should be able to tell whethe your kill is satisfactory or not. Now I'm going to tell you how to keep down and further invasions if you happen to get a 100 percent kill. Take a heavy duty blade on the backend of your tractor and knock down all the mounds and fill in the holes. Soon after the first hard rain go over the town again and repeat this step. Then reseed over every place where the soil has been disturbed. An old dog town is an open invitation to wandering prairie dogs that find the popula tion too thick where they came from, ir aren't going to follow up on this one. Most people don't, but you will have another infestation soon if you don't Drip gasoline is an excellent





Question and Answers Of Interest About McLean Schools

Question: What is the procedure used for selection of: Mr. and Miss M.H.S.. most popular, most courteous, most handsome, most beautiful, football queen, band king and queen, best all-around boy and girl, best citizen, and senior boy and girl leader?

Answer: Each class selects person from their own class for each of these catagories: Most popular, most courteous, most handsome, and most beautiful. Mr. and Miss M. H. S. are selected by popular vote of the entire student body. The football queen is selected by popular vote of the football players. Band king and queen are selected by popular vote of the band members Best all-around boy and girl. best citizen, and senior boy and girl leader are selected by secret vote of the faculty members.

Question: Why aren't the results known immediately the same as the cheerleader and projectte tryouts?

Answer: The results from the selection of Mr. and Miss M.H.S., most popular most courteous, most handsome, most beautiful, and band king and queen are revealed as soon as the votes have been counted. Football queen is traditionally announce d at the football game. Best all-around boy and girl best citizen, and senior boy and girl leader are selected by the faculty just before the awards assembly at the end of the school year and are announced at that awards assembly.

Ouestion: How many students are there in the band? Answer: There are 42

high school band members. This number is augmented by 15 eight graders who march with them at football

Question: When will the new band uniforms be here? Answer: The uniforms

should be delivered on or before the 29th of October. 1972. Sixty band uniforms will be included in the delivery.

Question: What will the new band uniforms cost?

Answer: The cost for each tem of the uniform is as follows: hat-\$11.15; plume. 3.15; coat-47.15; shield-8.05; trousers-20.50; belt 2.25; shoulder cords - 2.75. The total cost of one complete uniform is \$95,00. Total cost for the entire 60 uniforms will be \$5700.

Question: If we have 57 people in the marching band, why do we order 60 uniforms,

Answer: The Instrumentalist Company, in 1966, initiated a study of band uni.forms. It was their finding that about 12% of the uni-forms owned by a band should be held in reserve each year to insure good uniforms and proper fits for the students from year to year. Also, there is also the possibility that one or two new students may move to McLean during the school year and join the band. We would need to have uniforms available for these students.

Question: Why is the eigh-th grade included in the high school band this year?

Answer: The eighth graders are not actually included in the high school band. They are marching at the football games with the high school band because if they did not, there would not be enough people to pre-sent a good half time show. An extremely small hand is

handicapped to some extens as to what they can do on the field ans as to the music they can play. Since many of the high school band members play on the varsity football team, there would not be enough people left to present a good performance. Thus, the eight graders are helping to fill out the band. They do not go to contest or have class with the high school band.

phen F. Austin Areas; deer and javelins on th Chaparral Area.

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
