## McLean Schools Plan Extensive Self Study

The purposes of a self study are (1) to determine if the school is meeting the needs of the students and the community, (2) if the school is really doing what they say they are doing according to the school's philosophy, (3) to investigate all areas and phases of the school to discover the strengths and weaknesses of all the areas and phases of the school, (4) to provide information to the Board of Education, Administration, all school employees, and tax payers, that will give them knowledge about all of the facets of the school. A committee has been appointed to study each of the school programs. The different committees consist of teachers, students, and tax payers. Each committee member will receive a booklet that contains a list of questions about the area that their committee is studying. The committee will review all of the information, then give a rating from "poor to excellent", on each question that is asked on the booklet. In most instances the Administration and teachers do the self study and provide the ratings, but the experts in self studies support and recommend that students and tax payers be on the committees for several reasons, 1. to get a variety of ideas and points of view; (2) to inform students, teachers, and tax payers of the strengths and weaknesses of the schools; (3) to help determine more accurately whether or not the school is meeting the needs of the students and community. The different committees will meet Nov. 6, Jan. 15, Feb. 26, and March 19th. The study should be completed by April; and at that time a composite will be made available to all committee members, the Board of Education, school employees, and any organizations that wish to have a copy. 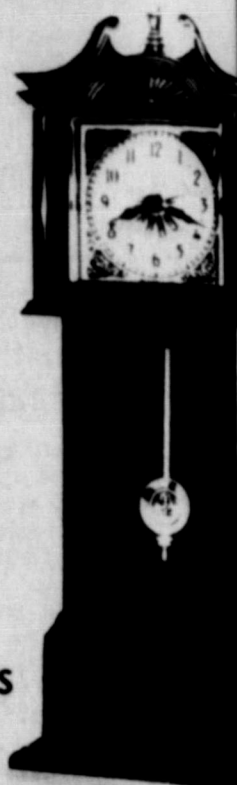

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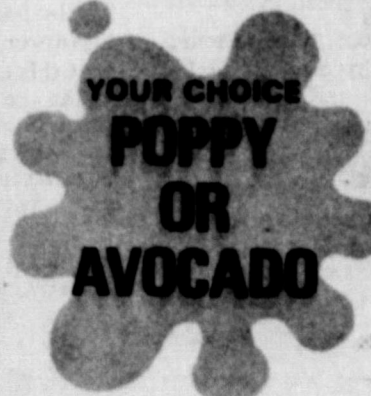

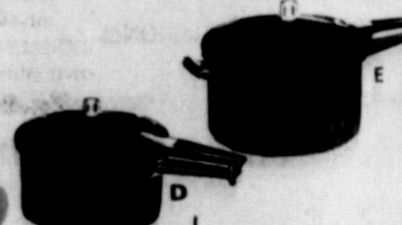

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## Question and Answers Of Interest About McLean Schools

Questions: Why can't parents buy a lunch ticket for their children when there is less than a full week of school?

Answer: Parents can buy a lunch ticket for their children when there is less than a full week of school. Lunch tickets are printed for five days or twenty days. Buying a ticket for less than five days or less than twenty days would implicate the book-keeper involved tremendously. The tickets are good for the number of days specified regardless of whether or not the ticket is used up at the end of a given week or a month. If there are some days left on the ticket they may be used the following week.

Question: Why can't the athletic boosters club buy blazers for the athletes?

Answer: Article XVI, Section 1 of the Constitution and Contest Rules of the University Interscholastic League states on page 29 "No member school of this

league shall be permitted to issue and no pupil shall be permitted to receive awards for participation in interschool competition in excess of \$20 (or the equivalent in value) during his high school enrollment in the same high school; except that additional symbolic awards not to exceed \$3 each may be presented for each additional interschool activity each year. This rule shall apply only to the following contests: baseball, basketball, bowling, volleyball, boxing, football, golf, rodeo events, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, weight lifting, wrestling, essay writing, speech events, mathematics, music events, journalism, one-act plays, shorthand, typewriting, and spelling. Penalty for violation of this rule shall be forfeiture of eligibility for one year. Enforcement of this rule shall rest with the State Executive Committee, and violation of the provisions herein may be used as grounds for suspension." "This section applies only to awards given by the school, or awards received by a pupil from any source for participating in interschool contests. Special awards may be accepted, as long as the total value of all awards from all sources (school, district committee, individual or organization) shall not exceed the maximum allowed.

Since most high school athletes have received an awards jacket at one time or another during their high school career, they would not be eligible to receive another major award such as a blazer.

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# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Gov. Preston Smith kept legislators guessing whether he would call them to work in another special session immediately after conclusion of the fourth called session.

Regardless of the outcome of deliberations on competitive rates for auto and home insurance, the session managed to pass a respectable number of the nearly 30 pieces of legislation submitted by the Governor.

Nearly a week before adjournment deadline, lawmakers handed the Governor bills he sought to restore some of his fiscal-budgetary authority. They gave him an emergency fund, authority to use it to head off fiscal crises and provided for some gubernatorial power to review need for budgeted spending.

These additional bills were among those finally passed and sent the Governor:

A \$13.5 million appropriation for medical school building at Texas Tech University, Lubbock, and the University of Texas medical school at Houston.

An \$8 million appropriation for a new school for the mentally retarded at Fort Worth.

A \$317,000 appropriation to pay leftover costs of May-June primary elections.

Exemption of aviation schools regulated by the Federal Aviation Agency from control by the Texas Education Agency under the new proprietary (private trade) school act.

Authority for Midland to disannex from the Odessa Junior college district.

Establishment of Texas Film Commission as a statutory permanent agency.

## COURTS SPEAK

The Third Court of Civil Appeals found H.D. Nicholson was qualified as a candidate for district judge in Navarro County though he had not had a law office for the last six years.

## AG OPINIONS

Third parties except the state and its agencies, whether individuals, associations or corporations, may legally contract for dental care of citizens only by complying with the non-profit corporation act, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held. Martin's opinion said the Department of Public Welfare and other state agencies can so contract under the medical assistance act.

In other recent opinions, Martin held:

House members cannot buy their old desk chairs, since state property must be disposed of according to statute.

A local salary bill for assistant school superintendents is unconstitutional because it applies only to one county.

**AWARDS PRESENTED**  
Cullen Luttrell of Sonora, maintenance supervisor for Sutton and Schleicher counties, received the third annual Lady Bird Johnson award for Highway beautification.

Luttrell's prize was \$1,000 presented by the former first lady.

Television personality Arthur Godfrey participated in the awards ceremony.

Finalists included Luttrell, Milton C. Campbell of Ralls, Herbert H. Smith of Rusk, Melvin E. Bayless of La Grange and Rinaldo Rivera of Falfurrias.

## AUTO TEST LOCATIONS PICKED

McAllen and Austin have been designated additional Texas test locations for the first official nationwide four-part General Automobile Mechanic test to be given November 21.

Other Texas test locations already approved by Education Testing Service of Princeton, N.J., are San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Amarillo, Beaumont, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston and Odessa.

Recertification tests every three years will assure mechanics they are keeping up with vehicle changes and servicing developments. The exams are available to nearly 800,000 mechanics in the U.S. on a voluntary basis.

**YOUNG OFFENDERS MAY BE FREED**  
An Austin district judge's ruling may lead to freedom for several hundred reform school inmates who had no attorneys when they were committed.

Judge Charles Mathews told the attorney general's office to find out by November 8 which of the juvenile offenders waived right to counsel. Mathews said a 1967 U.S. Supreme Court decision would require release of juveniles who had no lawyers and did not waive right to counsel. A Travis County legal aid official seeks release of 514 youngsters.

**FIRE ANT PROGRAM STARTS**  
A joint federal, state, local program designed to control imported fire ants in Fort Bend County is set to begin this month, Agriculture Commissioner John White said.

About 495,000 acres will be treated with Mirex ant bait which has approval of the Environmental Protection Agency.

Mirex is a slow-acting compound and takes 10-14 days to kill the ants. It is not toxic to fish, fowl, animal or humans, White said. The program is expected to last about three weeks.

**SHORT SNORTS**  
Texas Civil Judicial Council announced approval of a constitutional amendment to abolish the fee system for Justices of the Peace and require payments of salaries to J.P.'s.

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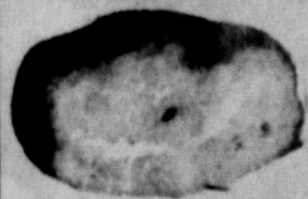

Texas agriculture continues to be punished by the screwworm, fire ant, citrus black fly, and cattle fever tick. Programs are underway to eradicate or control these pests. Screwworm eradication officials at Mission continue to urge livestock producers to check all livestock regularly, treat wounds on livestock for screwworm control, and submit suspected screwworm samples to the fly laboratory for verification. Plans are being made now for 1973 eradication program. Knowing the exact whereabouts of the screwworm and the intensity of its infestations will be a big help in mapping the sterile fly-drops for next year.

**CATTLE** fever center at Alice reports progress is being made in controlling the spread of that pest. Because of the reproductive ability of the fever tick, it could take two years before the pest is eradicated. Complete cooperation of cattle producers in the affected area-in South Texas-will be needed to eradicate the fever tick.

**PLANS** to combat the fire ant in Fort Bend County are now underway. State, federal, and county officials are working in a county-wide campaign against the fire ant.

Mirex ant bait is being used throughout the county on about 495,000 acres. All necessary precautions are being taken to assure safety. Federal and state officials will constantly check the progress of the program.

**CITRUS** black fly continues as a threat to the citrus industry in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. The pest has been centered in the Brownsville area in home orchards, but recently it was detected in Mission.

Infested trees are being sprayed in an effort to eradicate the pest.

**SIXTEEN, One, One, Twelve.** This is not a quarterback calling football signals. It is the rankings of Texas in various field crops for 1971 as compared with the rest of the nation. Texas, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service is:

First in rice production; first in grain sorghum production, second in hairy vetch seed production, third in peanut production, fourth in broomcorn production, twelfth in production of all hay, fourteenth in sugarbeet production, sixteenth in corn production, twenty-seventh in soybean production.

The top ten counties in grain sorghum production are Hale, Farmer, Swisher, Deaf Smith, Castro, Floyd, Lamb, Hidalgo, Nueces and Hansford. Top hay producing counties in the state are Grimes, Leon, Lamar, Hopkins, Red River, Wilbarger, Fannin, Cooke, Kaufman, Gaines.

Top peanut producing counties are Comanche, Frio, Eastland, Atascosa, Wilson, Erath, Mason, Fannin, Houston and Gaines.

If you want complete information on 1971 crop production in Texas, write to the Texas Department of Agriculture, Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711 and ask for 1971 Texas Field Crop Statistics.

**OCT. 22** is final date of the State Fair of Texas. And when you attend, be sure and visit the Food and Fiber Pavilion. More than 1.5 million Texans are expected to visit the pavilion this year. You'll see new ways in which Texas agricultural products are being promoted.

**OCT. 23** is final date for voting in the statewide pecan check-off referendum. Ballots may be obtained from your county agent. The referendum is being conducted by the Texas Pecan Growers Association.

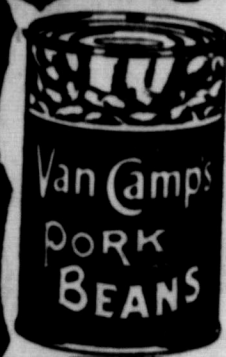

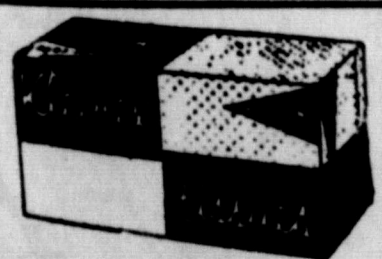

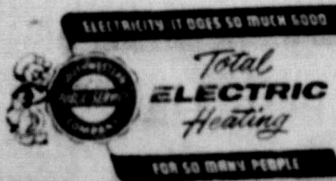

The dry weather is becoming more acute daily. Wheat planted in late August and early September has not had an effective rain since the wheat came up. Most of it has made good growth and would be excellent wheat pasture soon after it dried up from a two inch rain. If we have two more weeks of the same warm dry weather look out for a drastic drop in price of light weight calves. I'm not speaking of three or four dollars. I'm talking about \$8 to \$10. They are already way too high in relation to \$35.00 finished steers.

A good rain could turn them around and take the price to unheard of levels. Profit margin for the 1972-73 wheat pasturing year will fall far short of the record set in the 1971-72 wheat pasturing season. MILO HARVESTING.

Irrigates milo harvest is getting off to a very slow start. Yield are best in four years. You've heard of one producer that harvested over 8000# per acre most of it is yielding in the 7000# level. Price is \$2.15 at the elevator. We can't see much change in price from now to Spring-A slight rise due to storage and interest charges. Last year's big corn crop will still serve to hold a lid on run away prices. Everything points to an above average milo and corn crop for 1972. Exports should be of some help.

(Tuesday) tonight I am to give a program at Wellington to a group of farmers and ranchers on the topic of hedging cattle. I'm sure it might be a disappointment to the group I am to talk to when they learn that 600# choice steers placed into the feed lot would lose \$13.00 per head on an April hedge. Losses can be hedged the same as profits. The thing to do is watch for a situation when you can hedge a profit. If you buy 350# calves and carry them through the feed lot to 1000 lb. steers, usually there will be a number of time you can hedge a profit on them before you reach 1000 lbs. My honest opinion is that it will be impossible to hedge a profit into a 600# choice steer placed into the feed lot now or any time during your ownership of the animal.

## S. S. Leaflet Concerning Benefits Is Available

Copies of a new and expanded edition of the Medical Insurance Benefits Leaflet, "How to Get Medical Insurance Benefits," are available upon request from the Pampa Security Office, Howard L. Wealy, social security manager.

Weatherly said the new edition includes information on how Medicare determines the "reasonable charges" physicians' services. For elderly people signed up for the doctor bill insurance of Medicare, he noted, law provides payments of percent of the "reasonable charges," over and above annual deductible of \$5.

Under medicare law regulations, a charge is considered "reasonable" (1) if it is not higher than the doctor has been customarily charging all his patients for the particular service; and (2) if it is also no higher than the charges made for that service in three out of every four cases by the doctors in that locality.
