## 22 Rural Accidents In Gray County During September

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 22 accidents on rural highways in Gray County during the month of September, according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and 17 injured persons.

The rural traffic summary for this county during the first nine months of 1972 shows a total of 182 accidents resulting in six persons killed and 94 persons injured.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows a total in September, 1972 of 561 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 335 persons injured as compared to the same month in 1971 with 449 accidents resulting in 33 persons killed and 268 persons injured. This was 62 more accidents, 12 less fatalities and 67 more injured in 1972 at the same period of time.

The Highway Patrol supervisor reminds you that speed is one of the main factors in accidents on the highway. Slow down a little and live a lot. Drive Friendly the Texas way!

The 21 deaths for the month of September, 1972 occurred in the following counties: Oldham, Knox, Lamb, Wise, Yoakum and Young, two each; Childress, Deaf Smith, Hartley, Potter, Randall, Wheeler, Palo Pinto, Terry and Wichita, one each.

## McLean Student Enrolls At O. S. U.

LaDona Anderson of McLean, an Education senior at Oklahoma State University, is among 18,213 students enrolled on the Stillwater campus this fall.

The total includes 11,520 men and 6,693 women students.

By colleges, arts and sciences leads with 5,521 students, followed by the graduate college with 2,941, business administration 2,800, education 1,766, agriculture 1,570, engineering 1,393, home economics 1,271, the school of technology 748 and veterinary medicine 213.

By classes there are 3,668 freshmen, 3,652 sophomores, 3,689 juniors, 4,183 seniors, 2,941 graduate students and 180 special and unclassified students.

Since the Memphis Classing Office was established in 1959, nearly 2-1/4 million bales have been classed for cotton producers in the counties served by that office.

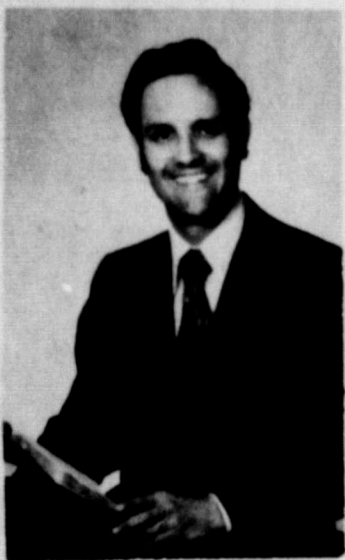

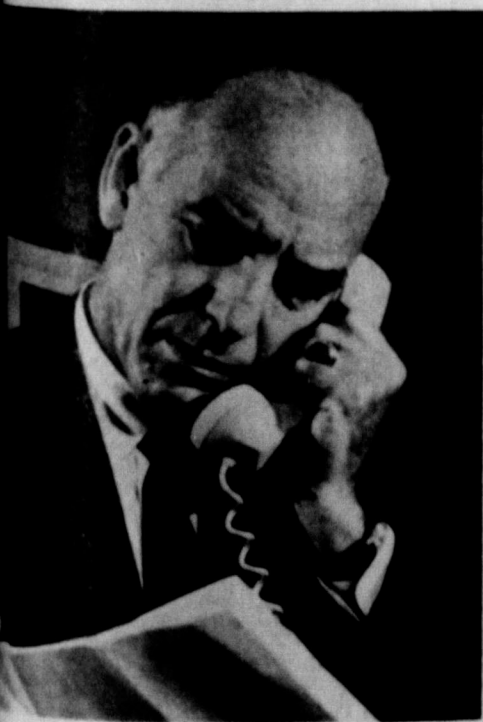

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Rising welfare costs will demand another \$60.9 million increase in the state budget during the next two years, the State Board of Public Welfare concluded last week.

The Board also approved a budget request asking an additional \$71.1 million in federal matching funds for the 1974-75 biennium.

State Welfare Commissioner Raymond Vowell blamed the

increase on congressional regulations and a two per cent cut in the federal government's share of welfare program costs for Texas.

Welfare Board member Louis Sarazan of Corpus Christi also pointed to increases in medical care for welfare beneficiaries.

Even with the increase recommended, benefits would be cut at least temporarily next fall. State funds for welfare totalled \$22.5 million in 1972 and \$267.8 million in 1973.

The Texas constitution limits money actually paid to welfare recipients (not including medical assistance, operating costs, special services, food stamps, counseling, child care and job training) to \$80 million a year.

Voters last year rejected a proposal to remove state aid to the aged, blind and disabled from the ceiling.

If President Nixon signs the revised welfare reform bill, only aid to families with dependent children would be left under the state ceiling by Jan. 1, 1974. The federal government would assume the cost of aid to the aged, blind and disabled, although the states would administer programs until July 1, 1975.

The federal act, if signed, would also phase back into the Medicaid program 13,000 old folks who lost their eligibility when social security benefits were raised October 1.

UNITARY PRIMARY URGED  
Secretary of State Bob Bullock recommended unitary primary elections to replace the old system of separate primaries for Democrats and Republicans.

At the same time, the state chief election officer advised a Senate election law study committee that unless the legislature enacts new legislation next year there will be no laws on the books for financing 1974 primaries.

Bullock estimated the state could save at least \$800,000

under the \$2.8 million spent on dual primaries this year if it uses the same polling places and officials for both major parties.

The Secretary recommends state and local officials, rather than county political party chairman, be designated to hold primaries. He also urged re-evaluating the whole Texas Election Code's provisions on political advertising and campaign expense-financing reporting.

He said the election code should be re-drafted.

### RATE STUDY ASKED

The House sponsor of competitive home and auto insurance rates in the recent special session announced he will ask the House speaker to direct a committee to make a rate study.

Rep. Don Cavness of Austin said he hopes his bill, which died in conference

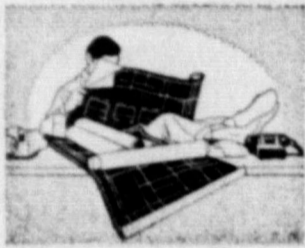
committee last month, will be revived by the 63rd Legislature next year.

Cavness said he does not think lawmakers received an accurate analysis of competitive rates from the State Board of Insurance. He said he hopes to obtain more nearly accurate facts on auto insurance costs. He said he also wants some meaningful comparisons on premiums for homeowners' rates, which

on routine examination appear extremely high.

ODOMETER 'BUSES HIT  
Fifteen hundred car dealers and leasing companies in Texas signed voluntary agreements not to "roll back" odometer (mileage indicator) on used cars in Texas, Attorney General Crawford Martin said.

Earlier, the attorney general's Consumer Protection Division obtained 39 permanent injunctions against El Paso

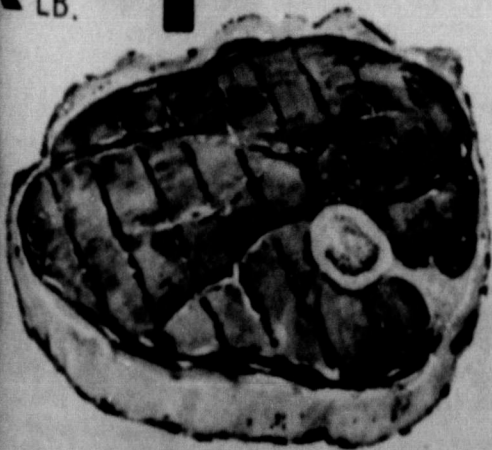
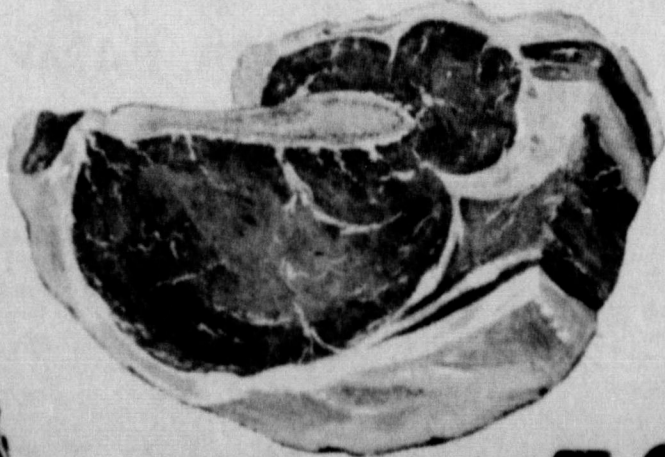
