Plan Your Range Deferment Now

Rangeland deferment provides a feed reserve for fall and winter grazing. Now is an opportune time for planning range deferment. Determining which pastures need a growing season rest this year should be of primary concern to all grassland managers, reports Rodney Hyatt, soil conservationist. All native grassland needs approximately 90 days rest, about every 3 years, to improve forage condition. Periodic resting of native grassland is an excellent way to improve vigor of the forage stand. Deferment also permits grass plants to produce a seed crop, states Hyatt.

Healthier grasses manufacture more forage, resulting in more grass per acre and fewer acres needed to maintain an animal.

Bonus benefits of improved moisture penetration and reduced soil loss are obtained when pastures receive periodic rest. Accumulated grass litter breaks the fall of raindrops and holds water on the land longer to allow better moisture penetration into the plant root zone.

According to Hyatt, best results are witnessed from pastures rested during the late spring and early summer months, when warm season grasses are dominant. Practically all native grassland areas in Gray County are composed of warm season grasses.

If pasture deferment will not fit into your schedule for this year, start planning ahead for possible rest periods

Motorists Reminded To Stop For School Buses

A reminder on the State law about motorists stopping for school buses was issued today by Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Speir said the law, which applies on city streets as well as rural highways requires motorists moving in either direction on the same roadway or street with a school bus to stop and remain stopped as long as the flashing top red lights on the bus are in operation.

He said the problem is becoming more serious in cities due to increased use of school buses in urban school districts.

There are only two exceptions to the law on stopping for loading or unloading a school bus: Those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway (divided by median or physical barrier) are not required to stop, and stops are not required if the bus has stopped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

Speir said the problem of school bus accidents is of concern to law enforcement officials and educators throughout Texas. Only a few weeks ago, the Travis County Grand Jury urged the news media to publicize the law about stopping and not passing a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

The grand jury noted that serious criminal charges might result if a motorist disregards this law.

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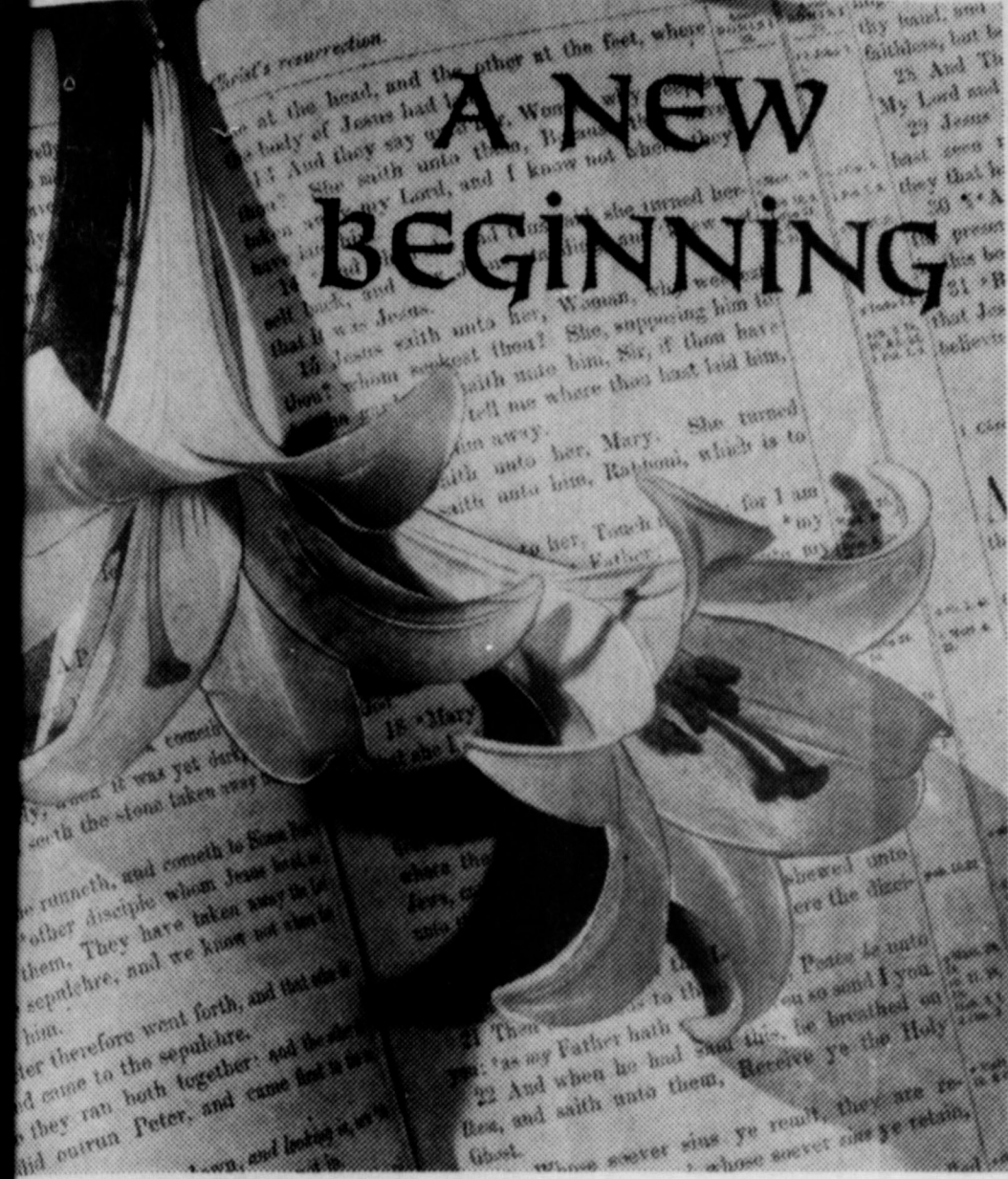

She enjoys the News and misses her friends in McLean and Alanreed, the whole Panhandle for that matter.

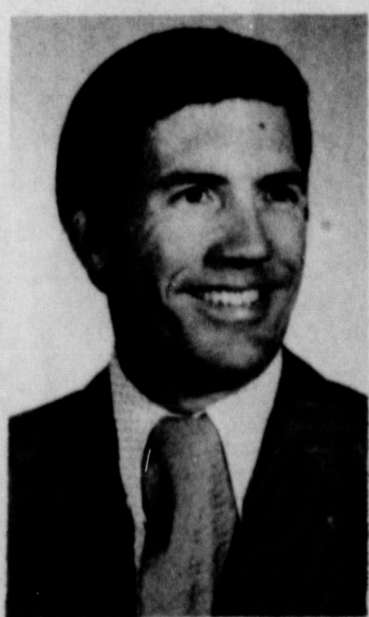

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Car and home owners had encouraging promises of lower insurance rates from higher level sources last week.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe threw his weight behind a modified form of competitive auto insurance rating, subject of an unsuccessful special legislative session last year.

The State Board of Insurance issued new rules and regulations which it pledged would bring lower rates for fire, homeowners and extended coverage policies.

Basically, what both plans would do is permit companies to deviate from the standard rates issued annually by the board.

A bill introduced in the House and Senate undertook to permit the auto deviations either below or above the standard rate on showing that companies could make the change without endangering their solvency.

Companies would apply to the board for deviated rates, and reductions (or increases) would be permitted if they meet tests of fairness to customers and financial stability for the companies.

While Briscoe expressed confidence the bill, if enacted, would mean substantial rate cuts, some remained skeptical that the so-called high-risk driver wouldn't pay more under it.

Rate deviations on property insurance are permissible under state law and can be implemented by the Board's regulations.

Meanwhile, the House occurred in Senate amendments and sent to Briscoe HB 143 which would authorize \$2,500 medical payment and loss-of-income coverage for auto passengers. The coverage would be included in all liability policies unless specifically rejected. Whether the new law would help lower or raise rates was a subject of debate.

MEETINGS LAW SIGNED

Governor Briscoe signed into law legislation (HB 3) to strengthen open meetings and predicted it will bring more "responsiveness and openness" to government. Stiffer fines and a jail term are provided for violators.

The newsman's shield bill to protect confidential sources of information went to conference committee, expected, and an attorney general's opinion concluded parts of the Senate revision are unconstitutional.

A senate committee version of a new lobby control act was tamped by House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. as a "step backward" and by "Common Cause," the people's lobby, as "a joke." Changes were predicted after critics said the Senate panel bill is weaker than the 1957 act.

The Senate, meanwhile, passed another of Daniel's so-called reform bills prohibiting "legislative bribery" in exchange for support of a candidate for speaker.

JOB DISCRIMINATION REPORTED

Minority group members who work for the state generally hold lower-paying jobs,

even though their employment level has improved somewhat, Texas Legislative Council reported in a new survey on ethnic groups in government.

The Council found the percentage of Negroes working for the state has risen from 9.02 per cent of the total number of employees five years ago to 10.09 per cent, and the percentage of state employees with Spanish surnames from 7.8 per cent in 1968 to 9.02 per cent in 1972. Blacks comprise about 12.5 per cent of the state population and Mexican-Americans more than 18 per cent.

A group of legislators, responding to the report, scheduled a series of meetings with state agencies which they claimed demonstrate "discriminatory employment practices" directed against blacks, Mexican-Americans and women.

Department of Public Safety officials told the legislators they may begin recruiting women law enforcement officers and that they are doing their best to hire qualified minority group members.

COURTS SPEAK

A Tyler youth fined after being arrested in a nude swimming incident won a reversal in the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The same Court reversed the conviction of a Dallas underground newspaper editor on charges of interfering with a policeman during a park disturbance.

The Supreme Court held a Silverton man is entitled to \$3,000 damages for tornado loss of household goods though the insurance policy on the house he resided in was in the name of his employer.

The Court of Criminal Appeals ordered a new trial for a Dallas house wife who shot her husband to death because of a confession should not have been admitted as evidence.

POLLUTION BILL PASSED

A bill to allow local units of government to issue revenue bonds to finance air pollution control facilities for lease to industry have approval of both houses.

Cities, counties, villages, river authorities and other special districts could issue the bonds. Facilities would not be exempt from property taxation.

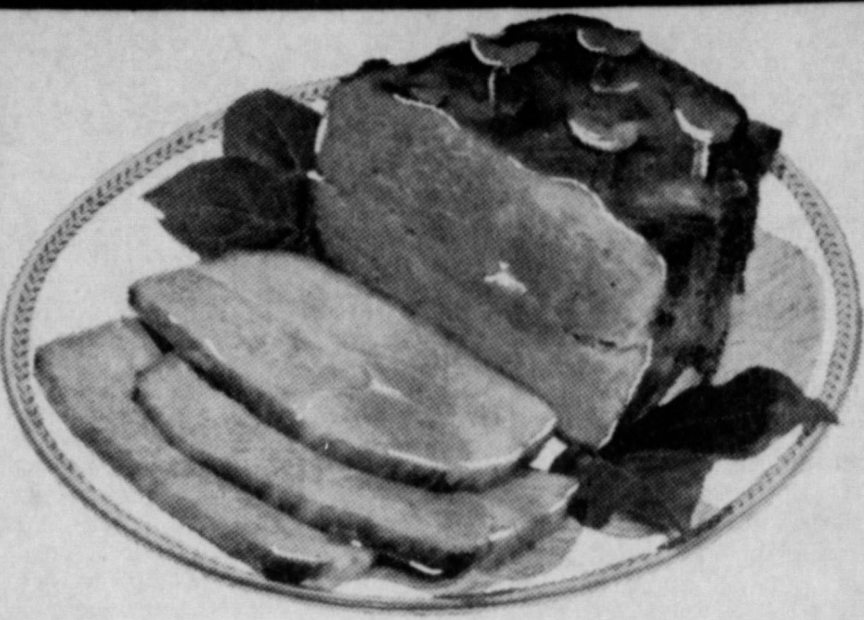
Texas, meanwhile, was faced with an April 15 deadline set by the federal government for implementation of its clean air plan. No restrictions on autos were found necessary by the Air Control Board.

Riley, a Junior, was chosen by secret ballot of McLean High School Faculty on consideration of leadership, citizenship, achievement and academic qualities.

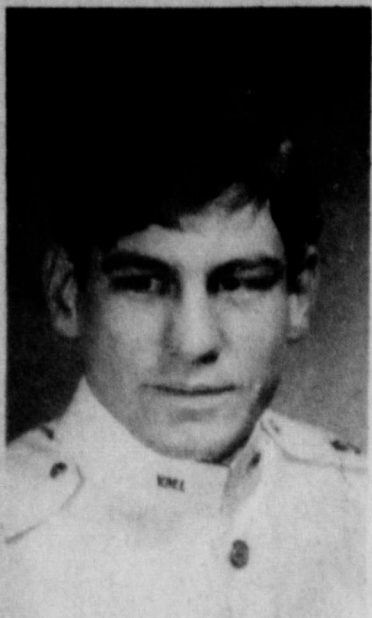
He is involved in High School activities of Football, basketball, track, tennis, and student council and maintains a grade point in the top 1/4 of his class.

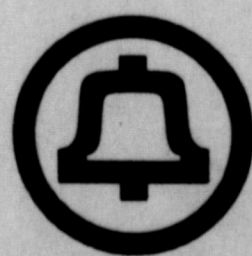

Easter Feast Without Cost Crunch

Festive--yet economical--
Easter meals promise success
in spite of higher costs of
many foods.

"It will take wise selection
from among foods currently
on the market," Mrs. Gwen-
dolyne Clyatt, consumer
marketing specialist with the
Texas Agricultural Extension
Service, Texas A&M Univer-
sity, said this week.

Wise advance planning of
the Easter meals will make
possible menus with meats,
fruits, vegetables and other
foods--best buys nutritional-
ly and economically.

Prices of many meat cuts
are relatively high, but th-
rifty food shoppers can lo-
cate less expensive cuts, such
as recent specials on turkey
parts.

Consumers also can make
good use of some of the meat
alternates--eggs are versatile
and economical, and milk
and cheese are high-quality
protein foods.

One pint of milk, two
ounces of American cheese
or one-quarter pound of cot-
tage cheese have the protein
value of a quarter pound of
lean beef.

Dry beans and peanut but-
ter are good protein sources;
however the protein is not as
high quality as that found in
animal foods.

Menus having dry beans or
peanut butter as a main dish
should be supplemented with
bits of meat, cheese, milk
or eggs.

Ways to make this year's
Easter dinner a real feast with-
out disrupting the family food
budget is to plan menus early
and select items in plentiful
supply.

This will provide the ne-
cessary nutrition, flavor and
attractiveness of a holiday
dinner.

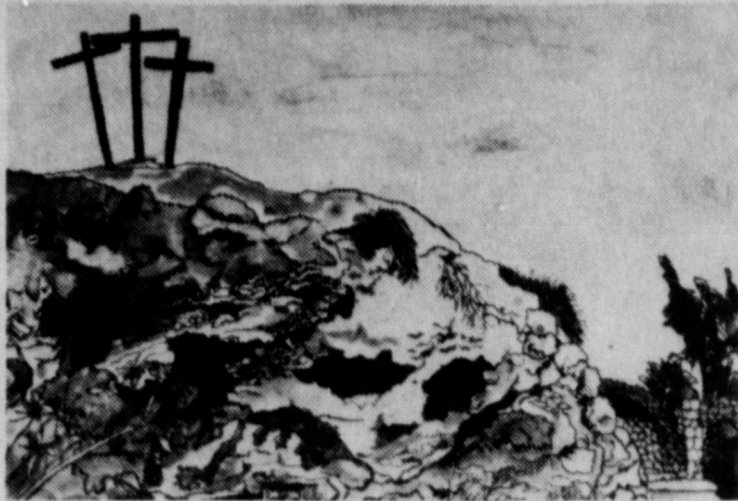

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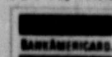
