





GRASSHOPPERS

For the past ten.days we have been working to put a government spray program together in the North eastern part of the county. It now appears there will be close to 25,000 areas involved. The area to be sprayed has the heaviest infestation of hoppers I ever saw. Representatives of the plant pest control branch of the U.S.D.A. says as many as forty hoppers per square yard are present.

Charlie Gatlin is chairman of the committee that is collecting 35¢ per acre for the hopper spray program. They now have several thousand dollars in a fund and by the time you are reading this the program will be put together. STATE 4-H CENTER

There is a thirty man committee working on the raising of \$4500.00 for the Gray County goal for the state 4-H Center which is to be built at Brownwood, Texas. The committee has confined most of its money raising activity toward soliciting wheat from farmers from this year's crop. Many farmers have signed checks or slips giving twenty and twenty five bushels. One farmer gave 100 bushels. These slips are taken to the elevator and payment is received directly from the elevator.

At this writing over \$3000.000 of the goal has been reached. I'm sure there are people in the McLean vicinity that would like to contribute to this very worthy cause. 


