Charles W. Smith District Engineer To Retire Oct. 31

Charles W. "Chili" Smith, district engineer of the Texas Highway Department in Amarillo, will retire October 31, State Highway Engineer Luther DeBerry announced today. Smith will be succeeded by Alvie L. McKee, presently district maintenance engineer at Abilene.

Smith's retirement will close a 42-year career with the Highway Department, all of which was spent in the Panhandle region. After a variety of engineering assignments, Smith became assistant district engineer at Amarillo in 1945. In 1956 he became district engineer, in charge of construction, maintenance and operation of highways in Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Deaf Smith, Randall and Armstrong counties.

"Weather extremes post special problems in Chili Smith's district," DeBerry said. "The high standards of construction, maintenance and availability to traffic of a balanced network of highways in the Panhandle attest to his ability as an engineer and an administrator."

McKee, who will become district engineer on November 1, is a native of Faxon, Oklahoma. He attended public schools in Potosi and Wylie, Texas and graduated with a degree in civil engineering from the University of Texas in 1950.

In the same year, he joined the Texas Highway Department in the Abilene district. He became district maintenance engineer in 1965. He and his wife, Frances have two children, a son and a daughter.

September Is "Better Breakfast Month"

Breakfast begins a new day so start our right.

September is "Better Breakfast Month" and the ideal time to get into the habit of eating a good breakfast, Frances Reasonover, foods and nutrition specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, said.

It's important to every family member--especially youngsters starting back to school. Generally, students make better grades and learn more when they eat breakfast.

Breakfast is exactly what the name indicates--ending the fast from the night before.

However, it doesn't have to consist of bacon, eggs, cereal or toast--any nutritious food will do if it furnishes one-fourth of the day's needs.

Try hot dogs, hamburgers, cheese, beans, peanut butter, and jelly sandwiches, soup, macaroni and cheese, creamed meat or fish over potatoes, or cottage cheese and fruit.

Through imagination and planning, children can be well-fed at breakfast--even if the mother works away from home and has limited time for food preparation.

Such working mothers can prepare foods the evening before and refrigerate them. Then family members can grab these breakfast foods before rushing off to work or school.

Some examples include sandwich makings, reconstituted fruit juice, nutritious cookies or meat pies.

Mince meat, oatmeal-raisin or other nutritious cookies make ideal quickie breakfast foods that can be eaten on the run--so keep plenty on hand.

Another possibility involves having pancake batter made up and the skillet ready to use. This way, a child just turns on the heat and pours batter onto the hot skillet.

It takes only a few minutes and a little effort on the child's part--to have piping hot pancakes and syrup.

Accent on Health

An individual with chronic kidney disease has two means available for maintaining his life. He may undergo hemodialysis, that is, have his blood purified by means of a dialysis machine, or he can undergo a kidney transplantation.

A patient who requires the use of a dialysis machine in the hospital can expect to pay approximately \$12,000 each year. A home dialysis unit would cost about \$6,000 per year. A kidney transplant operation can cost a family literally thousands of dollars. Few people can withstand

such staggering financial burdens.

Recognizing that chronic kidney disease patients face financial crises for lack of personal financial resources to pay for the expensive equipment and care necessary for their survival, the 63rd Legislature passed SB 386 (VCS 4477-20), the Texas Kidney Health Care Act. As a result of that act, the Division of Kidney Health Care has been created within the Texas State Department of Health to provide the care and treatment of chronic kidney disease.

The program provided by the act is designed to bring to bear all possible resources of the State and to coordinate the efforts of the State in the matter of renal disease.

Most important, however, is that the act provides for treatment services to chronic kidney disease patients for a fraction of the cost such patients would normally have to pay. The Texas Kidney Health Care Act has given a new lease on life to some 500 Texans afflicted by chronic kidney disease each year.

Environmental related aspects of health are the focus of several interim Senate committees created before the end of the legislative session to investigate the need for additional health legislation in the 1975 session.

One committee was created to study all aspects of solid waste, while another will seek to determine the adequacy and enforcement of environmental laws.

The House Environmental Affairs subcommittee on pollution control was directed to study the effectiveness of air and water pollution control efforts, while still another committee will examine ways

in which state agencies can improve their programs of maintaining the environment, maintaining the environment.

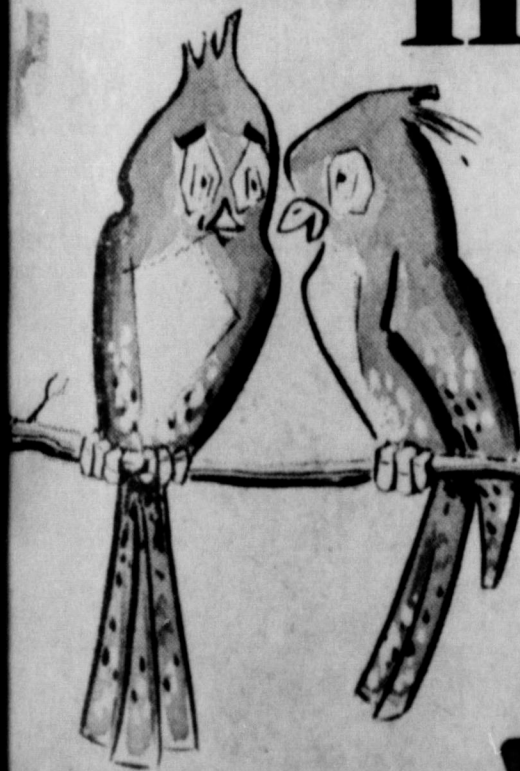

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

An executive order has been issued by Gov. Dolph Briscoe creating the Division of Rural Community Services in the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Governor Briscoe, who has listed rural development as one of the priorities of his administration, created the new division in response to what he termed "the urgent needs of rural areas."

In announcing the new rural services office, Governor Briscoe said the role of the Texas Department of Community Affairs is to make all state resources available and accessible to local communities as they strive to help themselves.

The Rural Community Services Division will provide information and technical assistance to rural communities and will assist in development of a state policy for rural development, the Governor said.

The new office will serve as a clearing house and will be a central state office that rural communities can go to for help, said Briscoe.

Raymond L. Prewett, executive director of the Texas Rural Development Commission, has been named to head up the Division of Rural Community Services.

A major part of his new duties, said the Governor, will be to assist rural communities in their relations with state and federal agencies and to direct communities with specific problems to the appropriate agencies.

Along the same line, the Governor has acted to expand the Texas Industrial Commission to include three members from rural areas. In the past, membership on the Commission has been two employees of labor, two employees or laborers and five members from the general public.

The Texas Industrial Commission is responsible for planning, organizing and operating a program for attracting and locating new industries and to promote the expansion of existing industries in Texas.

New rural members of the TIC are James Hunt of Sonora, president of Stockman's Feed Company; James B. Bond of Navasota, an attorney and director of the Navasota Industrial Foundation; and William A. Porter of Terrell, a farmer and businessman.

REVISION COMMISSION REVERSES ITSELF -- The Texas Constitutional Revision Commission reversed its August 25 decision -- that the Texas

Legislature should meet annually -- and voted that the proposed new Constitution should require the legislature to meet once every two years. But the time and duration of session or sessions would be set by the lawmakers themselves.

POT LAW RULING DUE -- The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals is expected to rule later this fall on an amendment to the state's criminal code to allow resentencing of persons previously convicted of possession of marijuana.

Travis County Dist. Atty. Bob Smith, who argues against implementation of the resentencing provision, claims it amounts to commutation of sentence, a power which the constitution gives only to the governor.

"Just because you call a horse a cow doesn't make it a cow," Smith told the Criminal Appeals Court. "Just because they (the Legislature) call it a resentence doesn't mean it's not a commutation," said Smith.

Lawyers on the other side of the question claim the resentencing provision is an authorization for the courts to review sentences, upon request from the defendant, and amend them, if justified.

About 800 persons serving terms in Texas could be affected by the outcome of the ruling. Conviction of possession of marijuana carried possible sentence of up to life imprisonment prior to revision by the 63rd Legislature to reduce first-possession penalties.

AG OPINIONS -- Present county commissioners may serve out their terms of office without residing in the new districts established by redistricting, Attorney General John Hill held.

Areas affected by redistricting will retain their wet or dry status enjoyed prior to any redistricting of the commissioners court -- until an election is called to change the county from wet to dry or vice versa, Hill held in the same opinion.

In other recent opinions Hill ruled:

* The Commissioners Court of Navarro County may pay the district judge no more and no less than \$4,000 per year for performing the duties of judge of the juvenile court.

* A court may direct the payment of a probation fee of a misdemeanor defendant who has been placed on probation

Truth In Insurance

Filling out an application for life insurance, Edwards came to a question about his health. He said he had a clear record, failing to mention that a doctor had once given him aspirin for a cold.

After Edwards died, his family put in a claim for the insurance. But the company refused to pay off, charging that he had not told the whole truth in his application. And in a court test, the judge agreed with the company that the policy was null and void. The family didn't collect a cent.



Plainly, that was a harsh decision. But it was handed down almost a century ago. It is hard to imagine a court today throwing out a family's life insurance on such flimsy grounds. While you are still expected to tell the truth in an insurance application, modern courts would judge your answers more reasonably.

In a recent case, an applicant for life insurance was asked whether he used liquor to the point of intoxication. The man said he did not. Actually, however, he had been somewhat intoxicated on two occasions during the previous five years.

Was his answer wrong enough to invalidate the policy? No, ruled a court, ordering the company to pay the family's claim. "An occasional use of intoxicating liquor," said the court, "does not (make) a man in-temperate."

Moreover, most life insurance policies now include an "incontestability clause" to further protect the beneficiaries. Under this clause, the insurance company has only a limited period—usually, two years—to quarrel with answers in the application. After that time the validity of the policy is beyond challenge.

Still, even the incontestability clause won't help if the fraud is extreme. One man, sickly himself, sent a healthy friend to take his insurance examination for him. This fraud, discovered after the man's death, was held so basic that not even the incontestability clause could save the policy.

PUBLIC NOTICE

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to: provide for regular sessions of the Legislature. The regular session each odd-numbered year shall be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days; provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each regular or special session; provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenues rather than biennial estimates. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to: include within the scope of homestead protection the property of a single person which meets other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses. Presently a single adult is not entitled to a homestead exemption and a married man cannot a family homestead without the consent of his wife. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to: Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which: Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to: Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which: Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million;

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who served after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified.

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."

Market Report

Despite lower prices this week, watch for fluctuations in poultry supplies and prices during the weeks ahead.

This advice comes from Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Buy a whole chicken and cut it up yourself--then pocket the savings.

Turning to other meats, the specialist predicted uncertainty over beef prices after the freeze lifts on Sept. 12.

Although supplies will be somewhat larger, prices will likely go up.

So, careful shopping and creative cooking continue important.

One way of making food dollars go further involves planning meals with less meat. But this isn't easy--and usually requires additional shopping and preparation time.

Casseroles, meat loaves and sausage-vegetable combinations make a little meat go a long way.

Or, a small portion of meat served with milk, cooked beans, peas or lentils provides necessary protein at less cost than a large serving of meat.

The specialist noted that several varieties of fresh plums decorate market fruit sections--including attractively priced purple prunes.

Cantaloupes and watermelons remain plentiful and of excellent quality. Peaches, on the other hand, are prices high.
