## Residents May Vote Absentee May 24, 28

Mrs. Wanda Carter, county clerk will be in McLean on Friday, May 24 and Tuesday, May 28, for those who wish to vote in the run-off primary election by absentee.

She will be at the city hall building from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. and 1 to 5 p.m. on those days. If you will not be here on June 1st when the election will be held you may go down on one of these two days and vote.

A new state law passed in 1972 requires that a poll must have a hundred or more registered voters to have election held there. This law will require that the voters in Alanreed will have to vote in McLean.

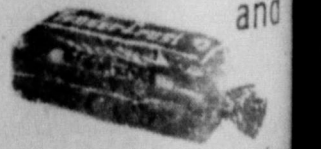

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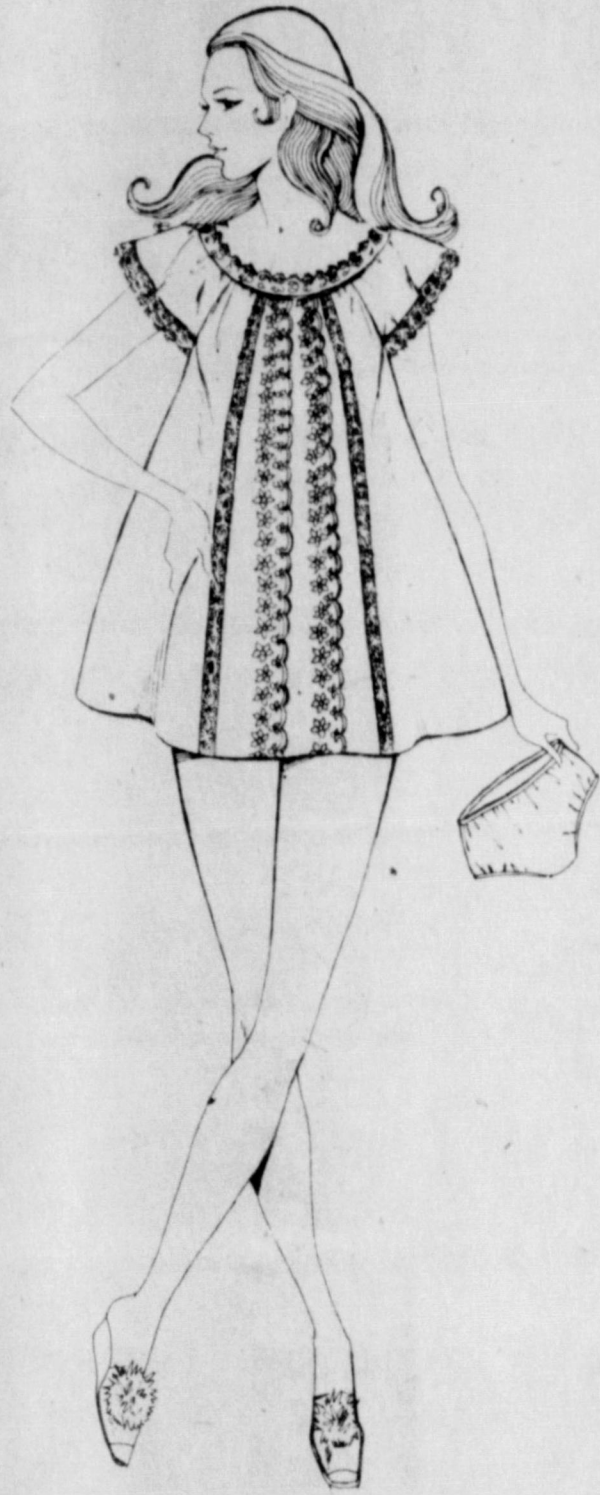

We have outgrown our building and must expand or refuse to take another item, regardless of how full of history it is.

What did our forefathers do when their family outgrew the old home? They built another room! The Alanreed-McLean Area Museum must have more wall and floor space if we are to preserve our area history.

For this reason the Museum Board met Friday night, May 16, and made plans to purchase the Joe D. Smith Building directly in front of our present location and just south of Bob Massey's Cafe.

In 1969 when we began to establish the museum at the present location, with less than \$20.00 in the bank, some of you said it couldn't be done. Some people thought we were either over-optimistic or had lost our marbles. We made it and everybody agrees we have been rewarded for our hard work - not from just a few but from many of our good citizens or former citizens.

So many things of great historical value and interest are coming our way and we can't turn them down. Now we will have room for the old Fire truck - the first motorized fire engine the city ever had. We will have a ceiling tall enough to allow us to display Chuck Cooke's big bear rug, the story of which will be available for our visitors to read.

Already we have a new bride's dress on display in the same case as Nida Rippey Green. Good old Nida! She was glad to move over and make room for the 1900 bridal dress worn by Harriet Caperton when she was married to Tilden J. Patts, a long-time employee of Alfred Rowe. This beautiful gown was presented to the museum by the couple's daughter, Mrs. R. M. Barkley and Dr. Barkley of Shamrock who has pulled the teeth of many McLeanites for years.

Back to the building. We are in the process of taking possession and moving the fire truck in out of the weather. As the building is cleaned and made ready we will transfer some of our things from the over-crowded museum and promise the new annex will eventually be as attractive as the main building.

A project has been started to honor our area pioneers - anyone who lived in this area on or before 1925. A beautiful Mohogany plaque has been ordered. On it will be 40 metal plates. Anyone donating as much as \$25.00 may have the name of any pioneer couple and the date of their arrival in this area engraved on it.

The plaque has been ordered from Vance Hall at Amarillo and will be here soon. As an example the first order given will read: "A.W. and Jennie Haynes, 1909". Perhaps had ever seen. Let's keep people saying such nice things! Perhaps you will want to order a plate in honor of your par-

## ERASING THE SHADOWS

"For thou wilt light my candle: the LORD my God will enlighten my darkness" (Psa. 18:28)

There is hope for those who walk in the darkness of discouragement. True, the riddle of human existence is hard to solve. Three dark shadows fall across every human life.

1. THE SHADOW OF PAIN. Pain is the monopoly of no class. It attacks infant and elderly, ignorant and intellectual, rich and poor, good and evil. It comes in different forms. It may be physical pain...or, it may be mental and emotional distress. It may be sorrow...or, it may be loneliness. It may be an overwhelming feeling of despair...or, it may be self-pity. Regardless of its form, it casts a cold shadow over life. But, here is the light: "God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes... neither shall there be any more pain" (Rev. 21:4).

2. THE SHADOW OF SIN. Sin is not always an act. Often it is an attitude; a diseased disposition. It comes in many forms: anger, envy, slothfulness, or uncontrolled speech. But, always the verdict is the same: "The soul that sinneth, it shall die" (Ezek. 18:4). Every man walks in this shadow, for "all have sinned" (Rom. 5:12). Unless we find light for this darkness life is only a miserable anticipation of a more miserable eternity. But look! here is the promised light: "I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness..." (John 8:12). "...if we walk in the light, as he is in the light... the blood of Jesus...cleanseth us from all sin" (1 John 1:7).

3. THE SHADOW OF DEATH. The certainty of death causes some to constantly live in the shadows. Death is fraught with uncertainties: when will it come? How will it come? What will follow it? But, again God turns on the light:

"Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me... and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever" (Psa. 23:4, 6). Jesus said..."I am the resurrection and the life; he that believeth in me, though he were dead, YET SHALL HE LIVE" (John 11:25).

Perhaps you have been living in shadows which have eclipsed your happiness. Take heart! Turn to God in faithful obedience and He will light a candle to dispell the darkness from your life.

AUSTIN, Tex. — With the primary elections out of the way, the race for House Speaker is getting hotter by the day.

At least three candidates for the speakership claimed legislative races May 4 turned out in their favor, and they are now in the lead.

One, Rep. Fred Head of Troup, contended he already has the speakership won with 80 votes. During the last week, he released names of 19 representatives backing him.

Rep. Carl Parker of Port Arthur laid claim to having gained seven votes in the primaries — enough to give him a total of about 55.

Rep. Bill Clayton said his pickup in the primaries "clearly established" him as the leader.

Rep. David Finney of Fort Worth hit all the claims as "phony bandwagon publicity," and urged support of his candidacy as a modern compromise.

Rep. Jim Nugent of Kerrville said he doubts outcome of the first primary appreciably changed the order of the candidates, and he maintained the race remains wide open.

The big four candidates — Head, Parker, Clayton and Finney — already have received more than \$100,000 in contributions and spent about \$62,000 on their campaigns.

Head raised and spent the most, \$38,875 in contributions and \$32,045 in expenditures. Clayton is second with \$30,000 in donations and \$10,208 in expenditures. Parker has raised about \$20,000 and spent about \$10,000. Finney \$13,000 and \$10,000.

**INCUMBENTS FAVORED** — The May 4 Democratic primary was a great day for incumbents.

Not only did Gov. Dolph Briscoe win a landslide victory over Frances "Sissy" Farenthold (by nearly 70 per cent of the

disappointingly-light vote of 1.5 million), but there were no upsets of any officials in statewide or congressional primaries.

Further, only three state representatives and a single state senator were defeated in 77 House and eight Senate contests.

Republicans will make their most-determined statewide bids in the governor's race, with Dr. Jim Granberry, 41, of Lubbock as the nominee. Ex-Prisoner of War Nick Rowe is the GOP nominee for comptroller who will take on Democrat Bob Bullock.

**CRIME FIGHT PLANNED** — Gov. Briscoe announced a public information campaign to draw neighborhoods together to prevent burglary and other crimes.

The project is part of a continuing crime prevention program in Abilene, Amarillo, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Odessa and Waco. Goal of the pilot program is to reduce incidence of burglary by 18 per cent in each of six participating cities.

Publicity used in the campaign suggests that police crime-prevention specialists be invited into citizen's homes to demonstrate crime-prevention

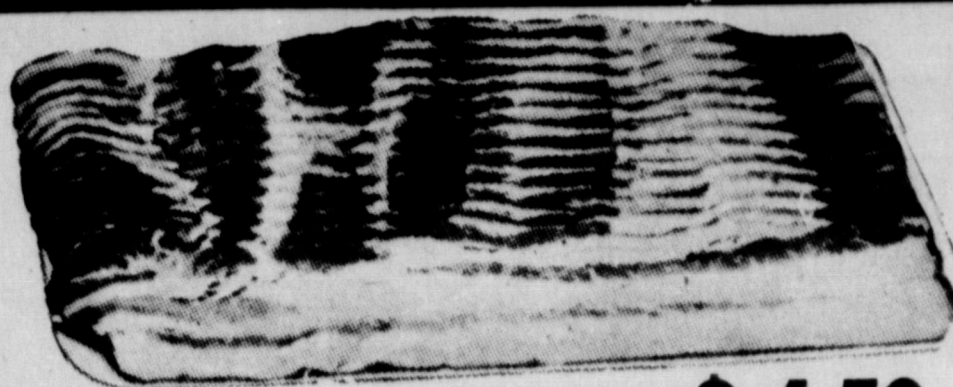

techniques and teach them to recognize potential criminal activities and report them to police. Texas ranks second in the nation in the number of trained crime prevention officers, with 57 graduates of the National Crime Prevention Institute.

About 220 officers will be trained in new preventive techniques about the end of the summer.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. John Hill held state funds can be spent to publicize the proposed new state constitution.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

\*The Parks and Wildlife Department can spend money to feed and house young people working in parks and contract for reimbursement with the Department of Community Affairs.

\*The Board of Pardons and Paroles has authority to recommend a prisoner for an indefinite medical reprieve, emergency reprieve or parole, though the conviction has not been reviewed by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

WHEAT CROP OFF — Texas wheat production will drop off 29.3 million bushels from 1973, Agriculture Commissioner John White predicts.

White said most of the decrease is due to failure of the dry-land wheat crop in the Texas High Plains. Recent rains came too late to help much, White said. Production estimates have been revised downward from 78.4 million bushels to 69.3 million. Texas produced 98.6 bushels in 1973.

## COTTON GIN SITUATION

Today Jimmy Allison and I  
 met with Dale McLain,  
 Manager of Elk City Gin and  
 in charge of the McLean Gin.  
 We regret to announce  
 that a decision was made to  
 close the McLean Gin by  
 officials of Elk City Gins.  
 This is the exact wording of  
 McLain's announcement,  
 "Due to regulation adopted  
 by the Texas Air Central  
 Board that has permitted  
 continual harassment by cer-  
 tain minorities to protect  
 the nuisance emission factor  
 from the McLean Gin in  
 McLean, Texas" end of  
 quote.

McLain has offered to sell  
 the Gin at a most nominal  
 price. Jimmy Allison and  
 others are presently working  
 to secure a buyer. There is  
 a good prospect McLain made  
 several additional helpful  
 proposals in an effort to coop-  
 erate with any new buyers.  
 To all those farmers and  
 businessmen that have worked  
 so hard to retain the gin  
 Jimmy Allison and others wish  
 to thank you.

The Committee and several  
 others that worked so hard  
 on this project feels as though  
 several accomplishments were  
 made. First, the Elk City  
 Gins have temporarily aban-  
 doned plans to start tearing  
 the gin down. They earlier  
 had set May 15th as a dead-  
 line date for starting to tear  
 the gin down. The commit-  
 tee will be of great assistance  
 in helping to find a buyer for  
 the gin. They can also be  
 helpful in pleading the case  
 of the owners of the gin to  
 officials of Texas Air Quality  
 Control Board. Closing of the  
 gin would put 700 cotton  
 trailers on the most troubled  
 Highway in the U.S. on a  
 25 mile round trip to Sham-  
 rock. Almost certainly some  
 rear end type accident would  
 cause death in many cases.  
 The question was asked of the  
 officials of the air quality  
 board, "which is worse a nu-  
 sance to a very small minor-  
 ity or an excellent chance of  
 death to many over the years  
 to come." An excellent and  
 appropriate question.

## CATTLE PRICES

Apparently the truck strike  
 is not having any serious af-

 told by packer buyers the  
 over fed cattle have since  
 gone to market. I believe  
 you will soon see some real  
 strength in the fat market.  
 This will be reflected to some  
 extent in the stocker market  
 but not like you have seen it  
 in the past. There are still  
 two crops of calves and steers  
 on outside of feedlots because  
 of low placements on feed.  
 Many feeders have left the  
 feedlot for good. Cattle  
 Feeders will not return to the  
 feedlots in big droves even if  
 cattle went to sixty cents a  
 pound; most need 52¢ to start  
 making any money.

There is a general belief  
 the last quarter of this year  
 could create another wreck  
 in cattle business.

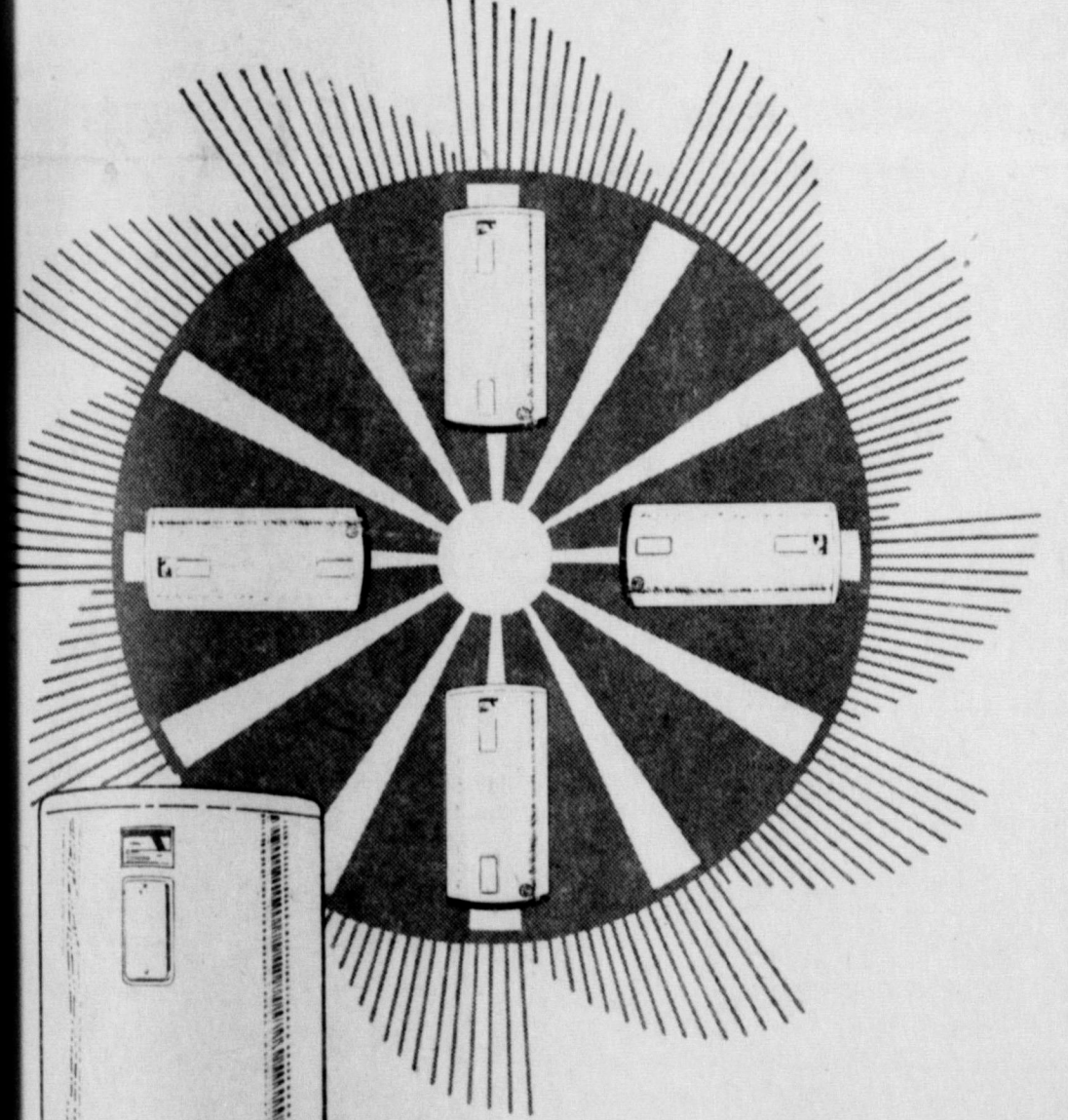

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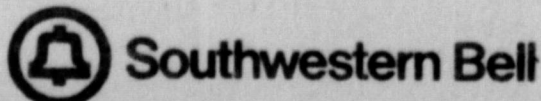
