Memphis Cotton Office Classes 277, 600 Samples

Cotton ginning reached the clean-up stage at all but a few gins over the Memphis area this week, according to W. E. Cain, in charge of the USDA, Agricultural Marketing Service, Cotton Classing Office at Memphis. "This office closed on Feb. 15, and the remainder of the cotton crop will be classed in Altus, Okla, " said Cain.

The Memphis office classed 277, 600 samples this past season, the largest total classed since the office has been in operation 15 years. The office classed 12, 12, 300 samples this week to bring the season total to 277; 600 compared to a sea son total of 215, 600 classed last year.

The predominant grade classed this week was grade 32 with 51 percent followed by grade 42 with 24 percent and grade 41 with 10 percent

The predominant length classed this week was staple 32 with 59 percent followed by staple 31 with 34 percent,

Micronaire readings showed 70 percent miked in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.1 9. 11 percent miked 3.3 to 3.4, and 13 percent miked 3.0 to 3.2

Pressley tests showed 96 percent tested miked t percent tested 75,000 psi or higher. The average for the week was 81,000 psi.






Wedding Plans



A new plant, near Gladewater, which is designed and built by a engineering company in Tulsa, Okla, is near-ly completed. When completed the super-modem, fully automated facility built at a cost of some \$4 million. will produce an average of 250,000 gallons of "natural gasoline mixture" and ethane propane gases a day with virtually no pollution of any kind. This kind of production makes quite a dent in any energy crisis.

There is no similar plant more modern than the Warren plant. Plant manager. J. Marvin Hindman, pointed out that the actual production process can be operated by only two workers.

Sources indicate that polydrug abuse is an increasing phenomenon in America. Senator Abraham Ribicoff's Senate Subcommittee on Reorganization, Research and International Organization has reported that 17 times as many Americans are involved in polydrug use patterns as use heroin alone.





Check Your Fishing Gear

Austin -- While many fishermen brave the cold winds of winter, most wait for warmer

It's no wonder, then, that they are surprised to find some beautiful spring day that their fishing tackle is a mess.

If you're one of these fairweather fishermen, the last chill days of winter are a good time to put that fishing tackle in order.

Reels should be taken apart (if you know how), cleaned and oiled. If the bearing soon a bit rough, you should replace it as well as other wom parts,

Ferrule and line-guide winc ings are other weak points in fishing gear. They take a beating and sometimes get worn or frayed. Repairs are simple with heavy thread coated with fingernail polish,

You'll probably find after testing the hooks of your favorite bass plugs that some are dull and rusty. You can clean them up and sharpen them, but it is easier just to replace them. You could lose the fish of a lifetime due to a dull or rusted-through book.

Don't be too sentimental about that old fishing line you've had on your reel for several years. Nothing lasts forever, not even monofilamen It becomes kinked and loses some of its strength after a couple of years. It ages faster if it is used a lot or if it is left in the sun. Bad line can lose you lots of fish, so invest couple of bucks and rewind your reel.

Now all that remains to be done is to clean out the tackle box (it's amazing how much crud collects there) and sharpen your fishing knife, and you're ready to enjoy that first sunny and warm day.

Look Close To Home For Outdoor Fun

AUSTIN -- High prices and the gasoline shortage might discourage many persons who normally enjoy outdoor recreation.

You shouldn't let these factors spoil your fun, accord over 30 pounds. ing to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

The shortages and the high prices are disouraging, but they should alter rather than stop outdoor recreation efforts.

Recreationists should look closer to home instead of driving many hours looking for a good time.

For example, state parks as are within short drives of Texas' metropolitan areas, offering camping, picnicking swimming, hiking and fishing

Remember too, say department officials, that you don't have to drive 100 miles to get a change of scenery. You can find it under a tree or along the stream bank in

The great thing about finding your recreation close to home is that you can spend more time having fun and less time driving.

Fishermen can find some action in their metropolitan area. True, a town lake probably won't be a great black bass hotspot compared to that one 300 miles away. but then, black bass aren't the only fish in the stream .

Most town lakes offer at least two excellent but generally ignored fish species which can give you plenty of action -- carp and sunfish, according to department offi-

The carp is regarded as a trash fish in this country, but this prejudice stops at the borders. In Europe and

oriental countries carp are more highly regarded, both as a sporting fish and as a table fish.

When hooked, carp put up a battle which some fishermen claim rivals the more popular game fish, and carp grow much larger than most of Texas' native game fish,

Sure, sunfish are small, but they are easy to catch, and this is a big plus when you take the kids fishing.

The great thing about fishing for sunfish and carp is that it is almost impossible to overfish the species. Carp are considered undesirable, so you catch as many as you like. Thinning out the sunfish population will actually result in better fishing and bigger fish.

According to department officials, using local facilities has a side benefit. As the demand increases for these facilities, public officials will look to more recreationa opportunities to meet these demands.

The result will be more parks and more recreational programs, a condition which will make your area a better place to live.

At this time of year, for the past two years, Texas has been near the peak of an epidemic of influenzalike illnesses, similar to Type B influenza cases in other states, are being reported in small towns . throughout Texas. Most of the victims are school chil-

Normally, the metropolitan areas are first to report outbreaks to the State Health Department. Often an increase in illness is reflected in an upswing in visits to emergency rooms of big city hospital clinics.

The State Health Depart. ment is informed of many diseases through a weekly reporting system employing city and county health officers.

So far in Texas for the 1973-74 winter season, reports of influenza-like discases have been about normal for the season. During January, for instance, the weekly average of reported influenza-like illnesses was just under 2, 560, building to a high of 3, 370 cases the last week. Then, for the if fifth week of the year, the number increased to 5, 140

While the rise may be significant, it is far below the more than 25,000 cases at the end of January, 1972. Wnether the cases move to the big cities cannot be fore. seen, but health authorities hope that they won't.

Outbreaks of influenza, predominantly Type B, have been reported by the Center for Disease Control in Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, Tennessee, Georgia, Minn., Iowa and Oklahoma. The characteristic symptoms are fever, sore throat, cough and headache.

Outbreaks in Texas were first reported following school closings in Brady, Plainview, Mineral Wells and Meridian. Higher than average school absenteeism was reported in more than a half-dozen other commu nities at about the same time. The number of aftected schools has increased.

The prevailing symptoms in Texas have been fever, coughs, sore throat and runing eyes. Some nausea, vomiting and diarrhea have accompanied these res piratory complaints, says the State Health Department. Symptoms have persisted for two or three days.

There may be more cases occuring in Texas, but with symptoms that aren't severe enough for a physician to be be reported to health author - it?" ities.

Typically, these charge accounts permit customers to purchase goods or services on credit at no charge if the purchases are paid in full with in 30 days of the billing date. If the customer doesn't make full payment within 30 days, the seller adds a charge to the customer's account based on the unpaid balance at the beginning of the month.
