Cotton ginning reached the clean-up stage at all but a few gins over the Memphi
area this week, according to area this week, according to
W. E. Cain, in charge of the USDA, A gricultural Marketing Service, Cotton Classing Office at Memphis. "This office closed on Feb. 15 , and the remainder of the cotton crop will be classed in Altus, Okla, " said Cain. The Memphis office classed 277,600 samples this past season, the largest total classed since the office has been in operation 15 years. The office classed 12
