numerous terms relating to grocery products.

Many food stuffs come in several different forms - often with quite a difference in costs. One example is oat meal - a dehydrated cereal that comes "regular", "minute" and "instant." It takes five minutes to preparé regu lar oatmeal, 60 seconds to cook minute oatmeal and only the time needed to he water to prepare instant oat -
meal.
"Regular" and "minute" varieties in the familiar round box costs the same.
The savings in cooking time is approximately four minis ap.
Instant oatmeal, howeve s packaged individually with eight servings to a box - and costs several cents more than the medium-sized round box which contains some 20 serv
Consumers "buy time" when purchasing convenience food If the difference is great be«een the amount of time takes to prepare the regula
item and the convenience item and the convenience wise choice. If the two items and the convenience item, choice. If the two items are close together in preparation
time, we need to take another look at out purchase. Many convenience items are worth their cost in cer-
tain situations. Some-such as instant coffee - costs less
per serving than the regular variety.
Often we pay for more for convenience than our time
