### PRAIRIE DOG WORK

For many years the Rodent Control Service worked with county agents by supplying poison grain for the control and eradication of prairie dogs. A year or two ago certain policy changes prohibited the indiscriminate use of strychnine grain. Since this time Dr. Charles Deyhle at Clarendon started manufacturing this product. Quinn Easley, fourth place. Without restrictions or red tape, each individual rancher can purchase this material from him and treat his own prairie dogs. We 1st; Mike Haynes, 6th. encourage you to do this. The best way to approach it is by pre-baiting with about two tablespoonsful of clean untreated oats about four days before distributing a like amount of strychnine oats per den. Many times 100 per cent kills can be obtained.

We can secure for you small sulphur dioxide smoke bombs as a follow-up treatment on the dogs not killed. I am told % gallon of drip gasoline or regular gasoline per den is sufficient to kill the pest. Use a long rubber hose and funnel. It takes only 18 prairie dogs to eat and destroy as much grass as one cow will eat. Should you leave only a few dogs and not attempt to control them for four Robert Weaver or five years, they can pretty well spread out over one-half section of grass.



Proper grazing is the most im portant key to the productivity of

irrigated pastures. One thing to remember is that the proteins, carbohydrates and fats are produced in the leaves. The roots carry phosphorous, nitrogen, potash, calcium, water and other minerals to the leaves. The roots do not produce anything, they live off of food manufactured in the leaves The leaves take in carbon, hydro gen and oxygen from the air. These elements from the air make up 95 per cent of the weight of the plant. Minerals from the soil only make up 5 per cent of the




