## Councilmen Discuss New Cemetery Requirements

Members of the City Council of McLean met in regular session October 9 at 7 p.m. in the City Hall. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Terry.

The meeting was with the following members present, June Suggs, H.F. Fabian, W.A. Bentley, Stella Lee and Bob Glenn.

Others present were L.L. Rodgers, Mr. and Mrs. F.L. Fennell, Mr. and Mrs. F. Jake Hess, Eva Emmert, Vicki Jacobs and Don Crockett.

The minutes of the August meeting were read and approved.

Councilmen decided to add the 15% penalty to delinquent taxes to help degray the cost of collection.

The 1984-85 budget was tabled for further study.

The Mayor informed the group that the auditor would accept \$3,000 payment for the

1982-83 audit instead of the \$5,700 as billed.

Discussion was held concerning curbs, grave covers, and chert on cemetery lots. The

Cemetery Association requested the City to pass a Resolution prohibiting the placement of these items on any lots sold from this date forward. This was tabled for next meeting.

Superintendent Glenn reported to council that the old water meters sent for repair were not satisfactorily worked over and he believed the City would save money to buy new meters rather than have any more repaired.

Councilmen agreed to purchase 50 new water meters.

Vicki Jacobs, PRPC representative, met with council to discuss and explain the necessary requirements for utility extensions to projected new

development along I-40. She explained the Tax Increment Finance District, the necessary action to be taken, etc.

In further action, the council voted to replace the sign advertising the City of McLean that was located east of McLean.

They also decided to enforce Ordinance No. 90 for building permits, fees, and applications by builder for council review and approval.

Ordinance #213, setting the 1984 tax rates was read and approved on its first reading.

Petitions by Tony Smitherman and Ted Simmons requesting that an area of their property be annexed into the city limits. Councilmen read Ordinance #214, setting the time and date of a public hearing on the property to be annexed. The ordinance was

Letter To The Editor

OPEN LETTER TO THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL:

This is one woman's protest of your inhumane dog-in-trapment policy. As long as there has been a "City of McLean", dogs have run loose here. As soon as this latest fiasco runs its course, they will run loose again. I think the majority of us who live in McLean, understand it is a small town and "big city rules" don't usually apply.

If you are truly concerned about the stray dog problem, may I ask why the majority of the dogs that have been caught in your "raw meat" baited trap, have been pets in their own neighborhood?

Today, after paying a \$25 fine to get my 30 lb. 20" tall, Irish setter, (who was trapped in the alley he has considered his territory for the last eight years) out of your illegal dog pound, I observed within a six block area, two dobermans and two other large dogs freely roaming the streets!

The point I'm making is that your solution isn't solving the

problem. I, and several others, have been told "we aren't trying to catch your pets, we only want to catch the dogs that are roaming the town, turning over trash barrels, etc." Yet it is our pets, which are not doing these things, that for the most part are trapped.

If you want to so diligently enforce City Ordinances, have you overlooked the ones pertaining to livestock inside the city limits, unmowed weeds on

vacant lots and in alleys, junk, etc.? How about some of the dog-catching money and time being spent to make some much needed "clean outs" of city sewer mains, and doing some street and alley repairs?

Potentially dangerous skunks are increasing in number all over town - they should be of much more concern than the majority of McLean dogs.

I would be interested in hearing from other dog owners. Individually we don't have much clout, so let's try it collectively.

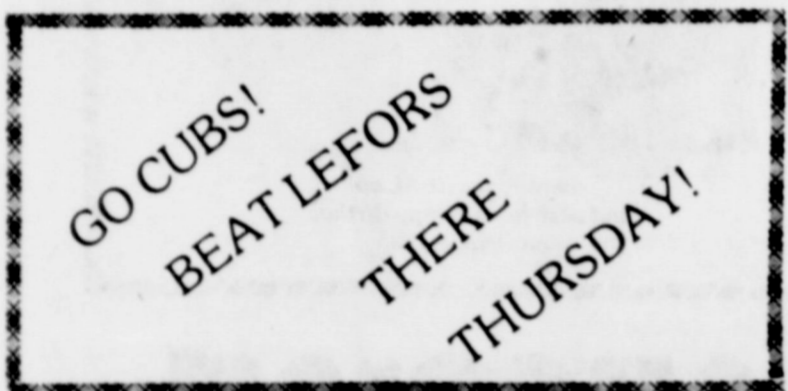

The PAT was unsuccessful, as the Kiowas blocked Ander-

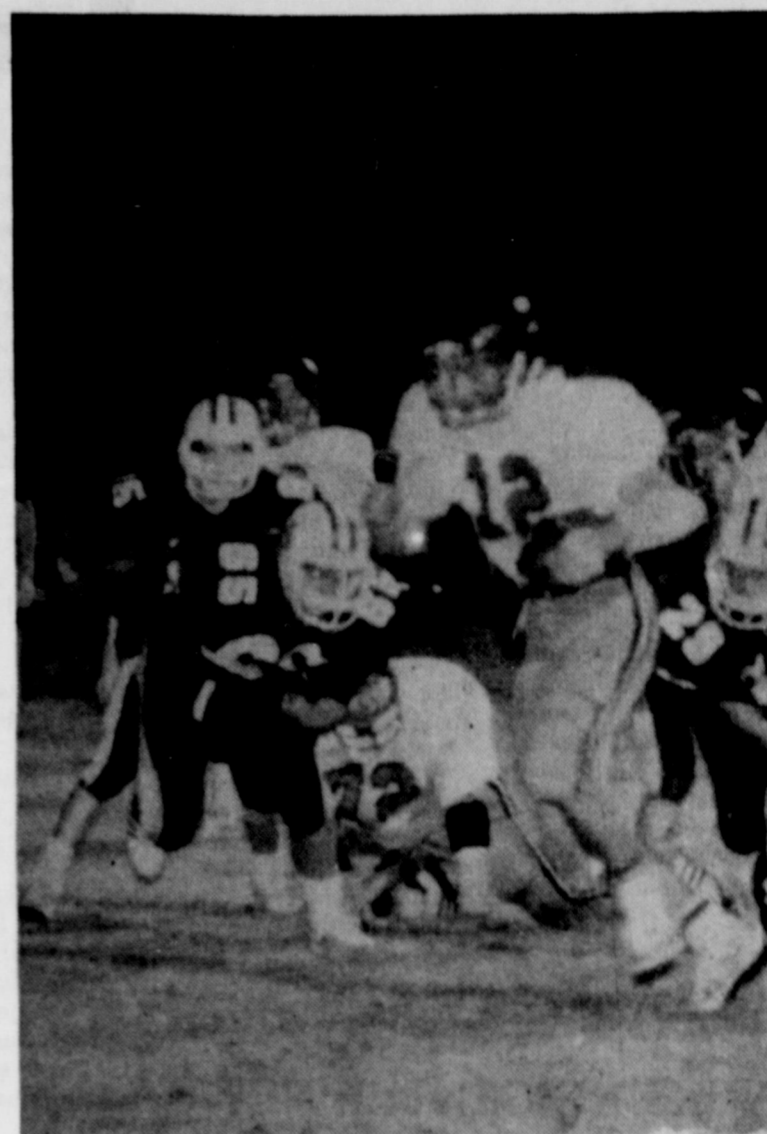
son's kick attempt, and with 8:22 left in the game, the score stood 41-6.

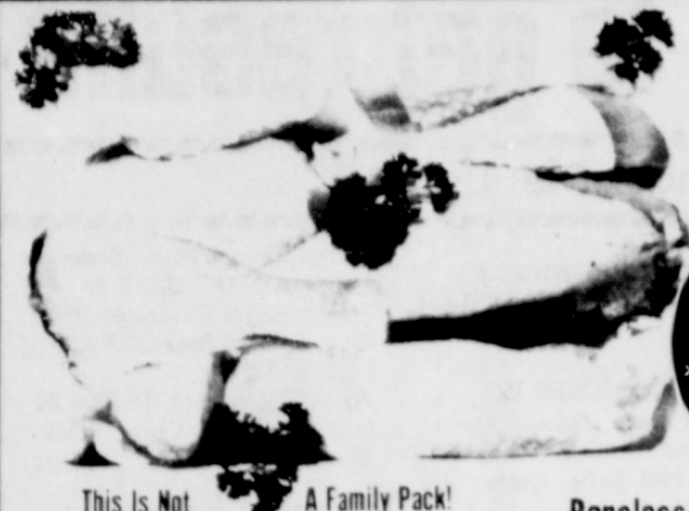
She was called "Little Miss Poker Face" because of her coolness on and off the court. However, many sports experts agree that Helen Wills Moody was probably America's best woman tennis
