

Drumright, Okla., asked for several changes in the contract which had been prepared by the City's attorney, Don Lane.

Tipsword asked that a 90-day provision on obtaining the Certificate of Need be eliminted. "The usual time is about six to eight months," he said. He also asked that a provision relating to the lease of the clinic section of the hospital to Dr. Harold Fabian be eliminted. The world "yearly"

was inserted in one sentence to show that the annual rental payment would be paid yearly in advance.

Tipsword also said that there was no provision in the contract for an option to buy. Gray County Judge Carl Kennedy explained that the hospital,

The contract discussed was the one which the City will sign with Futura. Judge Kennedy said that any contract from the County to lease the hospital to the City would "lean heavily on maintenance, and no expense to the county." Kennedy also said that the county wants the



6. Announce any hospital stay in the newspaper. You should also give a phone number for the curious to call for further and complete information about your illness.


7. Don't talk to tourists. You will only be offended when they look puzzled and say "What do you ever find to do in a place like this?"
