Trustees Table Action On Tax Increment District

After reading the break-down of the voting polls last week, I wondered how soon we would be run out of town for our stubborn, unwaivering support of Jack Hightower.

It was with much sadness (and almost physical illness) I experienced when I awoke Wednesday morning and finally heard the awful truth that Hightower was out.

My family has had many, many opportunities to meet with Hightower and have always been impressed with his openness, his willingness to help McLean, and his fairness.

Hightower has always been receptive to our suggestions and helpful with our questions, and has visited McLean several times to preside over various local functions.

I hope that Boulter lives up to the expectations of the majority of Texans that put him in office.

If he lives up to my expectations of him...we're in trouble!

MISD trustees decided to take no immediate action on a proposal presented to them by the City of McLean and Vicki Jacobs, representative of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

Miss Jacobs and the City are asking the school board to sign a waiver, allowing the City, if necessary to create a Tax Increment District by the City on property currently owned by F. Jake Hess.

Hess' property is adjacent to the new interstate and, according to Jacobs, is prime property for development which will bring added businesses, employment, and sales tax to McLean.

The City is interested in supplying utilities to the property, and unless they can obtain a grant from the state, the City would have to resort to the Tax Increment District Funding, because the City has no available funds.

Estimated expense to take city utilities to the Hess property are: water, \$22,935; sewer, \$28,380; and gas, \$12,628. In addition to these estimates would be engineer's fees, etc. Ms. Jacobs estimated that on a \$75,000 bonded indebtedness with an interest rate of 14%, the annual payments due would be \$11,191.68.

At the present time, a grant application is being made for 100% funding, but there is no prediction on the chances for approval. It is estimated that the Tax Increment Fund would be set up for approximately \$75,000, and would be financed from taxes on the improvements built upon the property designated in the plot. The taxes would come from the taxing entities of the school, city, and county, and would be paid into this fund until the bonds for the project are paid. The taxing entities would continue to receive the present taxes that are now being paid, but any new taxes generated by new improvements would be designated for the Taxing Increment Fund until all bonds are paid in full.

Ms. Jacobs stated that based on the present project plans, the taxes generated from the new improvements at today's rates would be, McLean ISD \$21,341; City of McLean, \$5,794; and Gray County, \$4,834.

The bonds, under state legislation, cannot be extended for more than 20 years, and according to Ms. Jacobs, the

bonds should be paid off within four to five years.

After those four to five years, the school and the county would be able to collect the taxes. However, if something were to happen to one of the businesses, making the tax increment fund payments smaller, it could take longer before the school, city and county could begin collecting their taxes.

Board members wanted some type of assurance that if the bonds were sold for a 20-year period, there would be no penalty for early pay-off if the businesses were so able.

Members were assured by Mr. Hess and Ms. Jacobs that it

would be understood about the options on the bonds for early payoff before the bonds were sold.

Ms. Jacobs also told the board that there were some drawbacks to the Tax Increment District.

The City of El Paso had created a TID, and was presently being sued by the school. The case has been tried by district court, and the City of El Paso was upheld; however, it is believed that the case will be appealed, and no other tax increment district will be approved by the Attorney General

until the litigation is settled. Board members pointed out that if the bonds could not be sold until the pending litigation is settled, this could be a long period of time before work could be done here.

The Tax Increment District has to be set up by January 1, 1985, but bonds cannot be sold until the litigation is settled.

The City of McLean is presently asking the other taxing entities to grant a waiver of 60 day notice in order that the Taxing Increment District may be created and in place by January 1.

The Board agreed to have legal counsel investigate the legality of granting the waiver.

They also agreed to meet with the Commissioner's Court of Gray County November 15 for further discussion of the TID and then meet back at the business office to make their decision.

In other business, trustees approved the minutes of the October meeting, and after listening to the presentation of Gordon Maddox, CPA of Memphis, the 1983-84 audit was approved.

Also approved were the October checks, the October financial statement, the October tax assessor's report, and the October cafeteria report. Delinquent tax collections were also discussed, and the sale of old light poles and structures from the football field was discussed.

Councilmen decided to sell. Trustees decided to sell the old lighting equipment from the football field at the best prices offered.

Mr. Rutherford informed the Board that the school had had two state audits this year in the vocational department and the cafeteria. He said that they had not heard from the vocational audit. One discrepancy was noted on the cafeteria audit to a policy statement of 1980. At the present time, administrators are in the process of acquiring the needed policy from the state.

The Board also discussed the problem of alcohol and drug abuse and agreed to try to find ways to better disseminate information on this to the students and general public.

The board also agreed to deduct \$25 daily from the salary of Konye Guthrie for excess of sick leave of present policy, for days

absent in excess of accrued leave at the present time.

Attending the meeting were trustees Lloyd Hunt, Thacker Haynes, John Holland, Jake Hess, James Hefley, and Darryl Herndon. Member

absent was Joe Magee. Others present were superintendent Jim Rutherford, business manager Shirley Johnson, and Mr. and Mrs. Ted Simmons, George Terry, Gordon Maddox, CPA, Vicki Jacobs, Tony Smither-

man, Kathy Carter, Mr. and Mrs. George Green, Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Hess, Dr. H.F. Fabian, Don Crockett, and Cathy Spaulding. The meeting was adjourned at 8:02 p.m.

McLean, Gray County Give Boulter Big Support

Results from the Nov. 6 elections are ancient history now, but *The McLean News* has been asked to publish how McLean, Alanreed, and Gray County voted.

In Alanreed, Reagan had 26 votes to Mondale's 11. Phil Gramm received 28 votes to Doggett's 13, and Hightower received 24 to Boulter's 19.

In McLean, Reagan had 428, Mondale received 140 and La-

Rouche received three. Phil Gramm defeated Doggett soundly with 381 votes to Doggett's 169, and Boulter carried McLean with 302 while Hightower received 268.

As a whole, Gray County tallied 2003 votes for Mondale, 8955 for Reagan, and 30 for LaRouche; 2454 for Doggett, 8408 for Gramm; 3652 for Hightower and 7425 for Boulter.

Wheeler County came in with a showing of 805 for Mondale, 2251 for Reagan and six for LaRouche; 954 for Doggett, 2029 for Gramm; and 1426 for

Hightower and 1589 for Boulter. More than 77 percent of the registered voters in Gray County cast ballots Tuesday, and Wheeler County had more than 70 percent of their registered voters vote.

A Problem Of Addiction...

Thursday marks the time set aside in Texas for the annual "Great American Smoke-Out."

That is the time when the American Cancer Society will be asking Texas smokers to give up their cigarettes for just one day...November 15.

Last year according to a Gallup Poll, almost 36 percent

of the 52 million American smokers nationwide did try to quit for that one day. Eight percent, according to the poll, actually made it through the full 24 hours without a cigarette, and about four percent were still not smoking one to 11 days later.

That's not a very great batting average, percentagewise, but when translated into actual numbers, it is a significant gain. And translated into the possible saving of lives from cancer, it becomes even more significant.

But most significant of all is the percentage of failures. If more than 18 million Americans tried to quit smoking for one day during the Smoke-Out last year, and only a million and a half of them actually made it through one full day without a cigarette, and only half of those succeeded in staying off the weed for at least a week, that is certainly an indication that we are dealing with an extremely serious problem of addiction.

If even half a million smokers managed to kick the habit as a result of that one day exercise in willpower, that's great...and

it's certainly worth trying again...and again...and again.

But what of the more than fifty million who tried and failed, and of the other 150 million who didn't even try? Cigarettes obviously are addictive, as much so as many other dangerous drugs...and all scientific evidence points to the fact that that addiction is creating a serious health problem for those millions of Americans.

Smoking does cause cancer...there can be no doubt of that any more. And cancer is extremely costly, in terms of health care, money and lives, to our nation.

Legislation can't cure the problem...but continued public pressure and persuasion can help. And smokers themselves, because they are addicted, must attack it like the alcoholic...one day at a time. Let next Thursday...the "Great American Smoke-Out day...be the first day of that one-day-at-a-time. Non-smokers, and those of us who have licked the problem, should be ready to help...every day of our lives.

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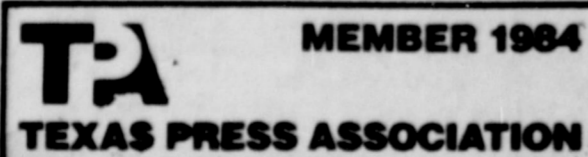

He is a 1984 graduate of McLean High School.

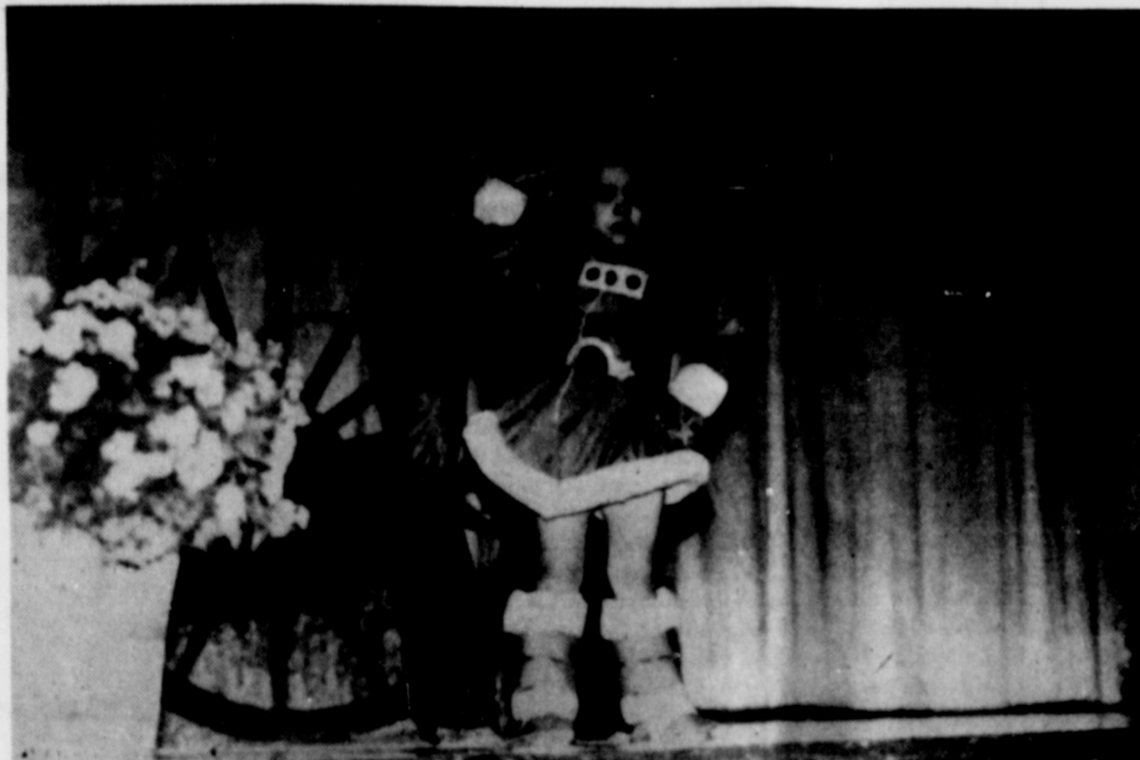
Services Held Monday For Leslie H. Jones

Hospital Closer To Re-Opening

The McLean General Hospital, closed since 1980, came closer to a possible reopening Friday as a scheduled public hearing was waived for lack of protests.

The Texas Health Facilities Commission scheduled the hearing for Friday morning in Austin to hear comments on an application for a certificate of need to relicense the hospital. But the hearing was waived when nobody came forward to protest, said THFC hearing officer, Steve Dickman.

The application will now be sent to the Commission for their approval. Dickman said the Commission may approve the application as early as their next regular meeting Dec. 13.

Closed since 1980 because of a lack of doctors, the hospital was owned by Gray County until 1983, when the county deeded the hospital to the city of McLean. The city is working with Futura Health Care Services, a hospital management firm based in Drumright, Okla., to reopen the building.

Earlier this year, Futura executive vice president G. L. Tipsword submitted the application for the certificate of need.

"If someone had contested the application, we would have had a hearing on it," said Dickman. "But nobody contested it."

Based on the information on the application, Dickman feels the application may go on to the THFC. He added that THFC bases its application approval on eight points, including the availability of medical and administrative personnel, the need in the community, and the impact on existing facilities.

Tipsword said he is waiting on final approval from the THFC to go ahead with opening the hospital.

"Even after it is approved, there's more to be done," he said, listing such procedures as

inspection and personnel screening. As a result, he could not say when the hospital could be re-opened.

"It depends on the Commission," he said.

Like many small towns, including neighboring Groom, McLean has problems keeping doctors who are willing to operate a hospital. The hours are long, business is unstable and pay is generally low, the doctors say. Dr. Harold Fabian, who operates the McLean clinic, said he would not be willing to commit himself to operating the hospital if it is opened.

Despite the conditions, Tipsword feels confident the city can support the hospital.

"Many people don't realize that there are a lot of doctors who don't want to work in a big city," Tipsword said, adding that a community can keep a hospital "if you make the right picture that the community is supportive."

He added that, despite a changing economy, McLean can support the hospital. The town's proximity to Amarillo is a plus, he said.

Gray County Commissioners turned the hospital over to the city with the stipulation that the county repair the roof and that it will receive \$200,000 if the hospital is ever sold.

Futura Health Services also operates Groom Hospital, which reopened May 26 only to close again July 6. Tipsword said then that the hospital was not making any money.

"We had to close the doors in order to regroup and take care of our accounts payable," he told the Groom News in July. Officials with Southwestern Public Service, Producers' Utility Gas Co., and the city said the hospital was as much as a month late in paying utility deposits.

Groom Hospital board members say they are not aware of any progress being made to reopen the facility, which closed in 1980.

Tipsword said that several people, including some physicians, have come into the community to look at the hospital, but no commitment has been made.

Lefors led the Tigers 10 to 9 in first downs and 177 to 160 in total yards gained.

McLean's final game of the season will be Friday night at Claude against the Mustangs at 7:30 p.m.

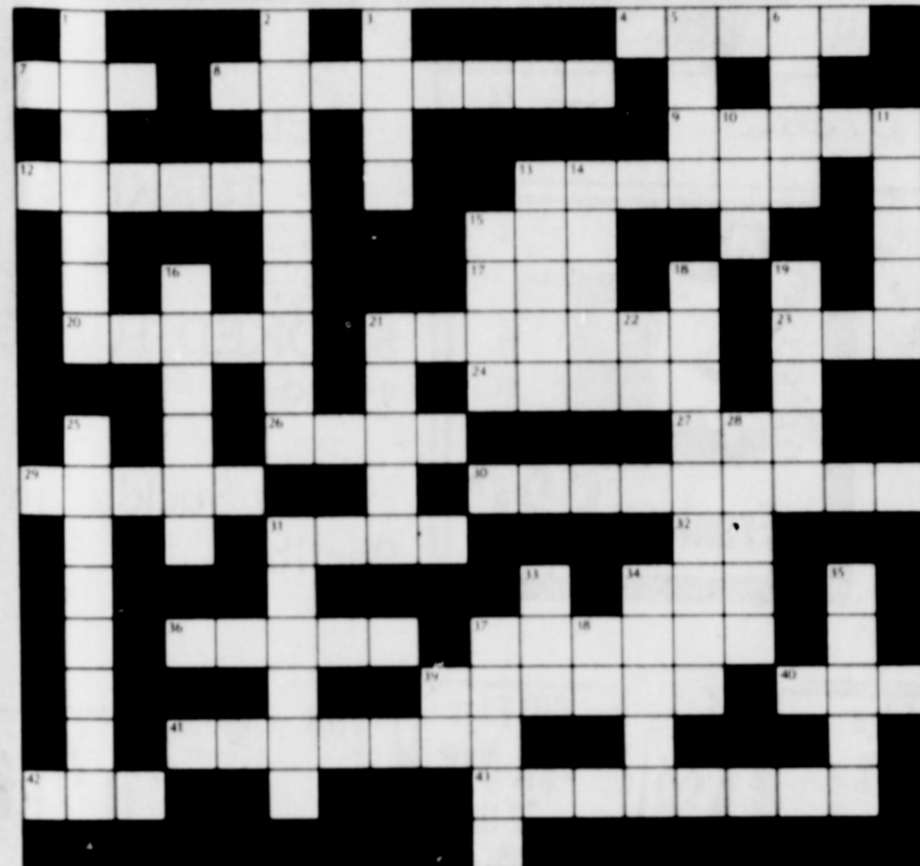

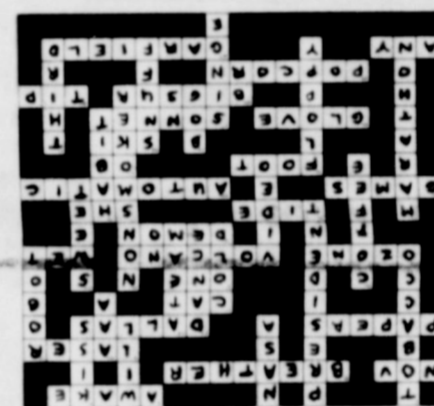

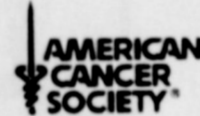
