Grades 1-3 To Dismiss At 3 p.m., Beginning Today

Students in the first, second, and third grades will no longer be dismissed from school at 2:40, according to a release from elementary principal, Dorman Thomas.

In the release, Thomas stated 'As a result of the requirements made manditory by the state, we have made many changes in the school this year. We are required to have a certain amount of time allocated each day for the different subject area."

According to Thomas, when school first started, officials tried to fit all necessary and required subjects that had to be taught daily, into their schedule "This was more difficult in the first three grades because they went fewer hours," explained Thomas. "Grades 1-3 have

been taught all of the subjects for the proposed amount of time that the state has mandated."
