Several people have been asking if there will be a CAP (Long range Soil Bank) program for 1967. If so, on what basis? Authorization for such a program was passed some two years ago for a four-year sign-up program. Originally 200 million dollars was authorized for 1967. The sign-up period would start some time during 1966 and would be for up to 10 years. The House of Representatives has appropriated 90 million dollars for 1967 in their appropriation bill. The Senate has appropriated 50 million. Speculation is that a compromise of around 75 million will be arrived at in the final appropriation blil. It is also believed by some observers that a decision will be reached within some two to three weeks.

The Secretary of Agriculture will, to a large extent, determine the basis on which the program will be offered.

With nationwide attention being focused on the world-wide food shortage, some observers are wondering if there is a further need for the Soil Bank type program. No doubt this has had its influence on Congress to reduce the appropriation. It might have efffect on Secretary Freeman in drafting the terms of the program. We, personally, feel that it should. It would pay those that are interested to study closely the provisions of the new program if one is offered. Compare it with the annual program being offered.

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

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
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
