In a personal note to McLean News readers, Patman expressed her appreciation to them and their support over the years.

"I hope that you and your readers will understand, I am sorry to leave the McLean readers, for they are the ones who initially encouraged me to write the column on a regular basis. And The McLean News was the one paper to give me a

start, and to continue that support for six years. I will miss you all," stated Patman.

Mrs. Patman was employed at the McLean News for five years. She served there as the associate-editor to owner Linda Haynes' editor. She syndicated her popular column in June, 1983-carrying more than eight weekly, semi-weekly, and daily papers, and several Texas magazines.

Before syndicating her column, Mrs. Patman received several area, state, and national awards for "Loose Marbles," including a first place in the Panhandle Press Association Contest, Texas Press Association Contest, West Texas Press Association Contest, and the National Newspaper Association.

Mayor Terry Writes Open Letter To Citizens

(Editor's Note: The following is an open letter from Mayor G.W. Terry to all citizens of the city of McLean.)

Dear Friends,
There seems to have been several questions raised recently by various people in McLean concerning things the city is involved in. By addressing this letter to all of you, I hope it will straighten out some of the misconceptions involved.

There has been a misunderstanding among some of you concerning the ribbon cutting ceremony and luncheon that

followed at the Country Club on July 27, 1984, in connection with the official opening of I-40, to which all of you were invited.

The ceremony was not intended as a celebration on the part of McLean due to I-40 bypassing our town. Instead, it was merely a way of saying good-bye to our own special stretch of Route 66, as we have all known it for so many years, and hello to I-40.

Countless hours were spent by your mayor and city councilman, assisted by many other interested parties, in planning and carrying out the plans involved. This ceremony would have been held whether or not McLean participated, since we all know this was a history-

making event and as such news worthy.

We chose to have McLean represented by its elected officers, merchants and citizens in order to obtain as much publicity for the City of McLean as possible.

We received good newspaper and television coverage of this event and we feel the publicity will be of immeasurable benefit to McLean in the future.

In joining the highway officials and other dignitaries who saw fit to grant us the favor of being in McLean on this occasion, together with Mr. Ted Simmons our County Commissioner, afforded us the opportunity of visiting and talking

Kindergarten Registration Scheduled 9:30 Monday

Registration for members of this year's kindergarten class has been scheduled for 9:30 Monday morning in the school cafeteria, according to principal Dorman Thomas.

Kindergarten students must be at least five years of age and under six years of age as of September 1, 1984.

A birth certificate will be required at the registration, and a written record of his/her immunizations signed by the doctor.

The immunization record should include:

Polio—at least three doses of oral vaccine is required, provided at least one dose has been received on or after the fourth birthday.

DPT—At least three doses of vaccine are required, provided at least one has been received on or after the fourth birthday.

Measles—One dose of vaccine.

The dose of vaccine must have been received on or after the first birthday, or during the calendar month of the first birthday, provide a physician's validated history of measles Members of the 1984 Tiger

illness.

Mumps—One dose of vaccine is required. In lieu of vaccine, a physician's written statement of mumps illness will be accepted.

A free shot clinic will be held in the elementary school shortly after school begins however, a definite date has not been set.

Thomas also wanted to stress to the parents of new students (grades 1-8 who have not attended school at McLean previously) registration and indoctrination will be held for them at 11 a.m. Monday in the principal's office.

Final School Bell To Ring 8:05 A.M. This Year

Teachers will begin work Monday morning at 8:30 with a faculty meeting in the cafeteria. All teachers will be required to attend the meeting. Teachers will then be involved in registering, attending meetings and workshops Monday and Tuesday.

Registration for Kindergarten students, new students, and high school students is sche-

duled for Monday. Registration of all other students will take place Wednesday, the first day of school.

Because of new rules made by the Texas State Legislature, school hours have been moved this year.

The first bell will ring at 8 a.m. each morning, and the tardy bell will ring at 8:05 a.m. School will dismiss at 3:40 p.m.

each day.

Buses carrying youngsters to school will arrive at homes approximately ten to fifteen minutes earlier than last year.

weighed in officially at 9 lbs., 8 oz. A picture of the same should appear elsewhere in the paper.

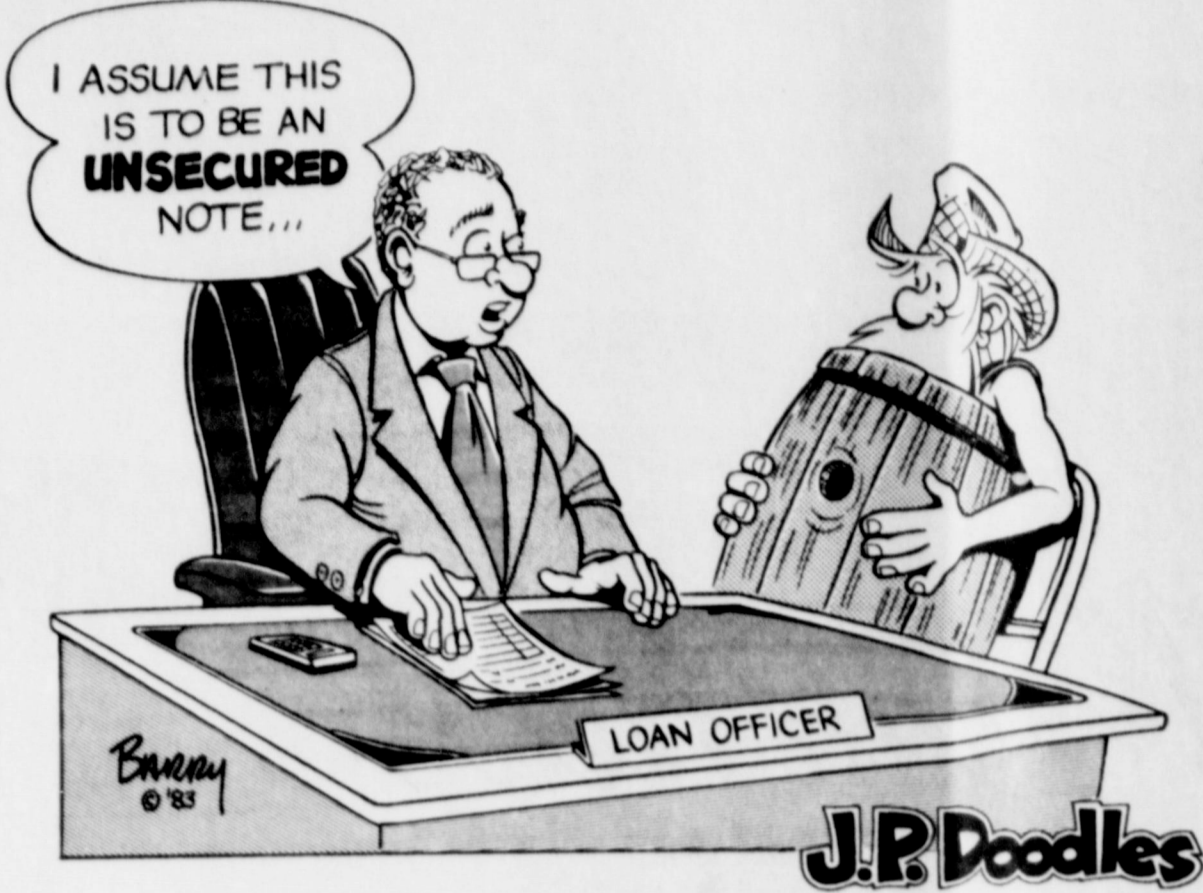

with Mr. Mark Goode, Engineer Director, State Highways and Public Transportation, Austin, Texas; Mr. John Butler, Texas Highway Commissioner, and State Representative Foster Whaley, among others. We discussed with them at that time the bottleneck that exists at the overpass near the Floral Addition in the south part of town.

These officials were very understanding of our existing problem and although they could promise us nothing definite, they did agree that if we will draw up a plan of what we want done, they will take it up with the Office of the Federal Highway Commission in Washington, D.C. in an effort to work out something in our favor.

This was most encouraging and if we can get this on problem solved, we feel it will be beneficial to McLean.

The luncheon served at the McLean Country Club was not paid for with our city tax money. Each individual attending this luncheon paid for his or her own ticket.

Complimentary tickets were paid for by funds contributed by the highway contractors and

construction companies involved in this project, together with contributions received by us for this purpose from other donors too numerous to mention

Questions have also come up concerning the rezoning of the City of McLean. This redistricting was done solely to accomo-

date the business people in McLean and will allow them the privilege of erecting signs along I-40, advertising their places of business.

For some 19 years, we have been cognizant of the fact that inevitably McLean, with a number of other towns would be eventually by-passed by I-40.

This does not mean the end of McLean per se. It does mean that all of us are going to have to make an concerted effort to attract the tourist trade to McLean, along with new business and population growth.

To do this, we must show people a reason for returning once they have been here. By extending a hand of friendship and cordiality to all who visit, we can truly be known from the

Carolinas to California as: "McLean, the friendly little town."

If we stand united in this common cause, we can help our town to grow. To sum up more succinctly, all that is needed to make McLean a bigger, better and more prosperous community in which to live is cooperation among ourselves.

As your mayor, I thank each of you for the help you have given me in the past and I earnestly solicit your support in the future.

On behalf of myself and our city council, I want all of you to know that we are always willing to listen to any suggestion you may have to offer us concerning the betterment of McLean.

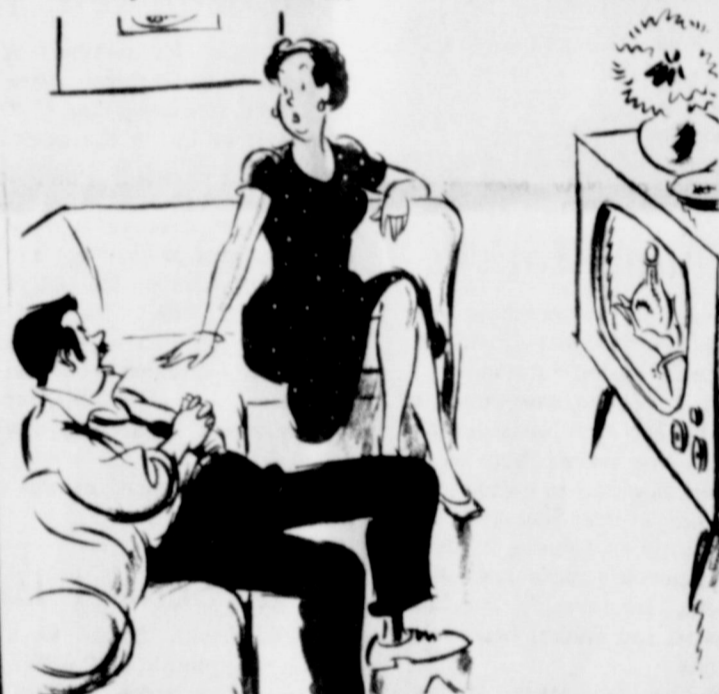

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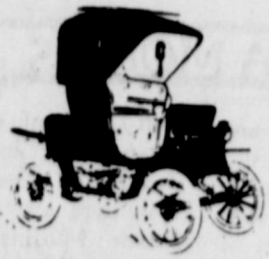

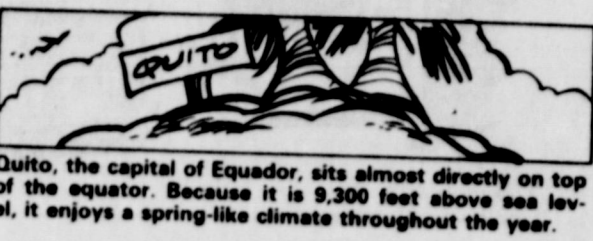
The church is located at 17th and N. Nelson Streets and the doors to the Fellowship Hall are located on the south side of the building.

Dear Parent or Guardian:

The McLean School Cafeteria serves nutritious meals every school day. Students in grades K-5 may buy lunch for 75c and grades 6-12 for \$1.00. Breakfast is 50c for all grade levels.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals at 40c for lunch and 30c for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out this application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: 1. the total household income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support etc.) OR your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, 2. names of all your

household members, 3. social security numbers of all household members 21 or older or the word 'none' for any household member who does not have a social security number, and 4. the signature of an adult household member.

Verification: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

Reporting Changes: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

Reapplication: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

Foster Children: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

Nondiscrimination: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington D.C. 20250.

Confidentiality: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used
