School opened Tuesday morning in McLean with a total of 291 students enrolled in kindergarten through twelfth grade. Principal Dorman Thomas reported 192 students in grades K-8, and principal Ron Cummings reported a total of 99 high school students. Teaching in McLean

## City Will Pay For Paving Out Of Savings, Council Decides

McLean City Councilmen received good news from City Secretary Stella Lee at their regular session, Tuesday, Aug. 9. Lee informed the group that the city would not have to borrow money to pay for the recently finished street paving. According to Lee, \$81,439 of the \$86,015.85 due can be paid from the City's interest-bearing checking account. Mrs. Lee said that she had been depositing excess money from taxes and from the Water, Sewer, and Gas fund, saving for this expense. She said the deposits had accumulated over the last six months. The remainder of the bill, \$4,576, will be paid out of the Water, Sewer

council's last work session. City fathers then discussed the ordinance concerning trash rates delegated to business and residential areas and

decided the ordinance needs to be revised. All businesses whose trash is picked up each week day will be charged \$32.50, businesses whose trash is picked up twice a week will be charged \$15, and

other businesses will be charged \$10 and residents \$5. In other business, councilmen accepted a proposal from Sammons Communication of Pampa that would improve the

reception for households currently on the cable and supply them with three to four more channels while increasing the monthly basic rate only 50c. Sammons officials

explained that they wanted to take out the microwave dish currently in use and install an earth station.

After councilmen voted to pay current bills, they discussed the possibilities of a joint meeting with members of the City Council, the Gray County Commissioners Court and representatives of Futura Corporation concerning the hospital and contract negotiations. At press time, a meeting had been scheduled for Wednesday (yesterday)

at 7 p.m. Those attending the session were Mayor Terry, councilmen June Suggs, W. A. Bentley, Lovd Bybee, Jim Barker; Secretary Stelle Lee; City Superintendent Bob Glenn and Kathy Carter.

## County Officials Inspect Airport Improvements

Pampa-After a regular meeting of the Gray County Commissioners Court on Friday, county officials inspected recent improvements at Perry Lefors Field north of Pampa.

County Judge Carl Kennedy said the major improvement has been to electrical wiring on the north-south runway - a project he said will replace an obsolete system. A standby generator has been installed to operate landing lights in case of a power failure.

Another major improvement was accomplished through efforts of the airport board, which was responsible for providing a new paved entryway and additional parking areas at the airport.

New carpeting and linoleum have been installed in the airport lounge, and Kennedy said a number of large hangars have been built at the airport and some of the smaller hangars have been refurbished.

Additional improvements are planned, and an early start is expected on extension of the north-south runway by 640 feet, Kennedy said.

He said the project will

be performed in cooperation with the Federal Aeronautics Commission and grants will be used to finance the runway extension.

Kennedy expressed hope that work on the project can begin soon, noting that some bids have been taken and the

last is expected to be received within the next 60 days.

In other action, Tanya Morris of Vega was named to succeed Joanna Warminski of White Deer as Gray County Extension Agent for home economics. Miss Warminski's resignation will be

come effective Sept. 10, and Morris will assume duties of the position on Sept. 16.

After hearing that no bids have been received to supply new voting machines for the county, commissioners decided to readvertise for bids to be received by Sept. 1.

## Senior Citizens Resume Food Distribution

The McLean Senior Citizens Center is again distributing the free butter and cheese from the Texas Department of Human Resources, (TDHR) but under a new set of guidelines, according to club spokesman Lena Bailey.

Distribution of the free cheese and butter will be Wednesday and Thursday, Aug. 24 and 25.

An individual applying for commodities must complete a form provided by TDHR. The form requires the applicant to give the number of persons in the household, and the total income earned by residents. The form is then signed and given to the eligibility worker where the food is distributed.

The form must be filled

in each month for commodities.

The food will be distributed under a strict set of guidelines concerning

the income of the applicant and the number of people in the household. For example, a household with one member can earn no more than \$4,680

per year to qualify. A household with four members can earn no more than \$9,000 to qualify.

Each household will be given varying amounts of commodities, depending on the number of people in the family. For example, a single-member household can receive only 1 lb. of butter per month. A household with four members can receive four pounds of butter per month.

The distribution guide-

lines are available at the Senior Citizens building for applicants to see.

## DPS Reports Four Wrecks

McLean's Department of Public Safety troopers Ron Shank and John Holland reported four minor wrecks last week.

In one incident, a 1982 Ford tractor truck, driven by James D. Rehnhardt of Jonesville, N.C., was traveling east on I-40 and ran over debris laying in the roadway. Poles and signs at the intersection of I-40 and Texas 273 had apparently been knocked down earlier by an unknown vehicle. The truck was slightly damaged.

A 1977 Chevrolet van, driven by Lester Doughty of Bellflowers, Calif., veered off the road and struck the rear of an unoccupied truck which was legally parked 2.9 miles west of Alanreed on I-40. Doughty apparently had fallen asleep at the wheel, according to Shank.

Holland reported that Friday evening, between 9 p.m. and 1 a.m., Billy D. Simpson, driving

a 1981 Isuzu pickup, allowed the vehicle to move to the right of the road where it hit the guard rail of a bridge. The accident occurred six miles south of McLean on state highway 273. There were no injuries and minor damages to the vehicle.

Seven miles west of McLean on I-40, a 1980 Ford Jartran rental truck, driven by a Mr. Cisar of Brooklyn, N.Y., moved to the right of the road, jumped across a service road, went through a fence and about 200 yards into a pasture before it ran off in a ravine. The accident occurred early Monday morning. Holland said there were no injuries in the wreck.

Harry Tate, a former McLean resident, (and former member of Old Lady Haynes' fifth hour English IV class in 1965) sent me interesting tidbits last week that I would like to share with you.

## Appraisal Hearings Draw Several From McLean

The Gray County Appraisal Review Board hearings on property have concluded, and not much was changed. According to chief appraiser Charles Buzzard, 33 protests were filed, 23 taxpayers showed up for their hearing, and 11 of those were from McLean.

Of those 11, according to Buzzard, four adjustments were made. None of those adjustments pertained to land values, and only one change was on a house.

It seems to me that 11 from McLean out of 33 from the entire county is a disproportionately high number. I suppose there could be several explanations for that. In the first place, this is the first year that property values in McLean and the McLean School District have been raised to close to 100 percent. (The previous year's values were about 45 percent of true market value.)

Also, the use of ag use values on land is relatively new to most tax payers.

Or perhaps The McLean News is just an agitator, since we urged the McLean residents to check those appraisals, and appeal them if they thought they were unfair.

Whatever the reason, several McLean taxpayers

appeared before the board, and some of them were partially rewarded for their efforts. (In most of the cases given to me, the adjustments were on small items, like travel trailers, or personal property rather than on the large items like houses and land.)

Whether you were satisfied with the result of your hearing or not, at least you took advantage of the rights guaranteed to you under the law, and you tried to correct what you thought was an inequity. As taxpayers, we must always remember that the tax appraisers work for us, and that as voters, we have a direct or indirect way of influencing who is chosen to the various positions.

Those who appealed their appraisals followed the proper method of protest. Those who are still unsatisfied must resort to the final protest: the ballot box. If you are unhappy, or think you were treated unfairly, you should complain to the members of the Gray County Board (Lloyd Hunt is the representative from McLean.) Those members are elected by your school board and your city council. So you do have a voice. If you don't use it, then you have no right to complain when the tax bills come through the mail.

### In The Kitchen

by Linda Haynes

If you are a regular reader of this column, you know that as a cook I favor recipes which take little time to prepare, but are delicious. The following recipe fits that description, with an added bonus: it is also attractive!

Try this for a special party or company meal.

**Strawberry Roll**  
Vegetable oil  
1 (14.5 oz.) pkg. white angel food cake mix  
powdered sugar  
1 quart strawberries, sliced  
1/4 cup sugar  
2 cups whipping cream  
3 tablespoons powdered sugar  
Whole strawberries (optional)

Grease a 17x11 1/2 inch pan with vegetable oil, and line with waxed paper. Grease waxed paper with oil; set aside.

Prepare cake mix according to package directions; spread batter in prepared pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes or until firm to touch (do not overbake).

Sift powdered sugar on a linen towel. When cake

is done, immediately loosen from sides, and turn out on powdered sugar. Peel off waxed paper. Starting at narrow end, roll up cake and towel together; cool on a wire rack about 20 minutes, seam side down.

Combine the sliced strawberries and sugar;

set aside. Beat whipping cream until foamy. Gradually add 3 tablespoons powdered sugar, beating until soft peaks form.

Drain strawberries. Unroll cake and remove towel. Spread cake with half of whipped cream. Top with berries; reroll. Place on serving plate, seam side down; spread

remaining whipped cream on all sides. Garnish with whole strawberries. Chill before serving. Yield: 10 to 12 servings.

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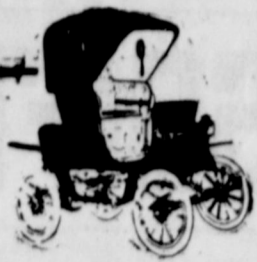

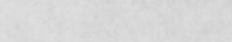

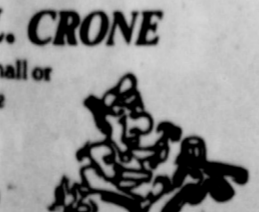
