

Local Food Bank Plans Food Drive Oct. 14-20

"Can Hunger!" That's the goal of the High Plains Food Bank. The food bank, which serves as a clearing house for donated surplus food, will launch a Panhandlewide canned food drive Oct. 14-20 to coincide with World Hunger Day, Oct. 16. with the church itself, and there

With the food drive, chairman Cherry Graham said the Food Bank hopes to kick hunger out of the Panhandle by rounding up 60,000 pounds of canned food.

Although the food bank has a wide range of food donors from farmers to feed-lots, the demand for canned food always exceeds supply.

The High Plains Food Bank is a private non-profit agency which receives a distributes about 60,000 pounds of food each month to 115 non-profit groups

Melody Wattenbarger serves as executive director for the food bank which is located in a donated warehouse at 100 S. Grand in Amarillo. A volunteer board of directors governs the food bank which provides food to both on-side feeding programs and emergency food pantries in agencies throughout the 26-county Panhandle area.

"We serve agencies which in turn serve hungry people. None of the food donated to the food bank may be bought or sold, but is distributed free of charge through participating agencies," Mrs. Wattenbarger said.

The food bank receives no government funds and relies solely on gifts from individuals, churches, and businesses for its support. Participating food bank agencies are asked for a 10-cents-per-pound share contribution to defray costs of food storage, handling and trans-

McLean's food bank is located in the United Methodist Church, where the dispersal of the food does not depend on ace, age, or religious affilia-
