Councilmen Raise Salaries 5%

City fathers met in a called session, Nov. 27, to hold a public hearing on Community funds, discuss the Tax Increment District, and to discuss the salaries of full-time city employees.

Attending the meeting concerning the Tax Increment District were mayor George Terry; councilmen W.A. Bentley, June Suggs, and H.F. Fabian; Shirley Johnson, Don Crockett, F. Jake Hess, J.D. Bernard, and VicRi Jacobs.

Councilmen then held a public hearing on Community Funds, and there were no complaints or suggestions as to the use of this money. There will be a second meeting held concerning the funds at 7 p.m. December 11 at City Hall.

Councilmen went into executive session at 7:45 and conducted individual interviews with each of the full-time city employees.

Employees for this part of this meeting were Red Easton, Martha Parker, Donnie Basham, Chester Bohlar, Harlan Pool, Stella Lee, and Bob Glenn.

Red Easton's gas allotment was increased from 20 gallons to 25 gallons permonth. Employees Donnie Basham and Chester Bohlar received a 5% increase in salary.

Martha Parker also received a 5% salary increase and an allotment of \$5 per trip for workshops concerning the library.

Action on Harlan Pool's salary was tabled until social security requirements and limitations could be confirmed.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:55 p.m.

The mayor and city council rejected the idea of a raise for themselves.

And I know all about dies, and powder, primers and presses.

My sister-in-law and I can sit around for hours and tell hunting stories. We can compare quail hunts, pheasant hunts, elk and deer hunts, and even sheep hunts.

We all have our horror stories, and sharing them definitely helps to make things easier.

I have a friend whose husband dried out a coyote hide in her dryer...and another whose husband tried to dry out one in her microwave!

You have no idea how difficult it is to walk outside in the dark of night knowing there are five coyote hides, sewn and stretched, hanging from the trees, waiting to pounce on you.

And how many of you have ever taken a sack out of the freezer thinking it was last year's turkey, only to discover

instead it was last year's hide waiting for this year's buyer?

I think that, after seven years, I've adjusted fairly well. I've accepted my husband's way of life, and am now trying too many hours too late that

to jump in with it, get involved with his hobby...and help him enjoy it to the fullest!

I still must be doing something wrong-everytime I ask him for a recipe for coyote stew, he turns green!
