There are many duties that come along with my job as editor here...some of them are pleasant, some time-consuming, some frustrating, and truthfully, some are quite disgusting!

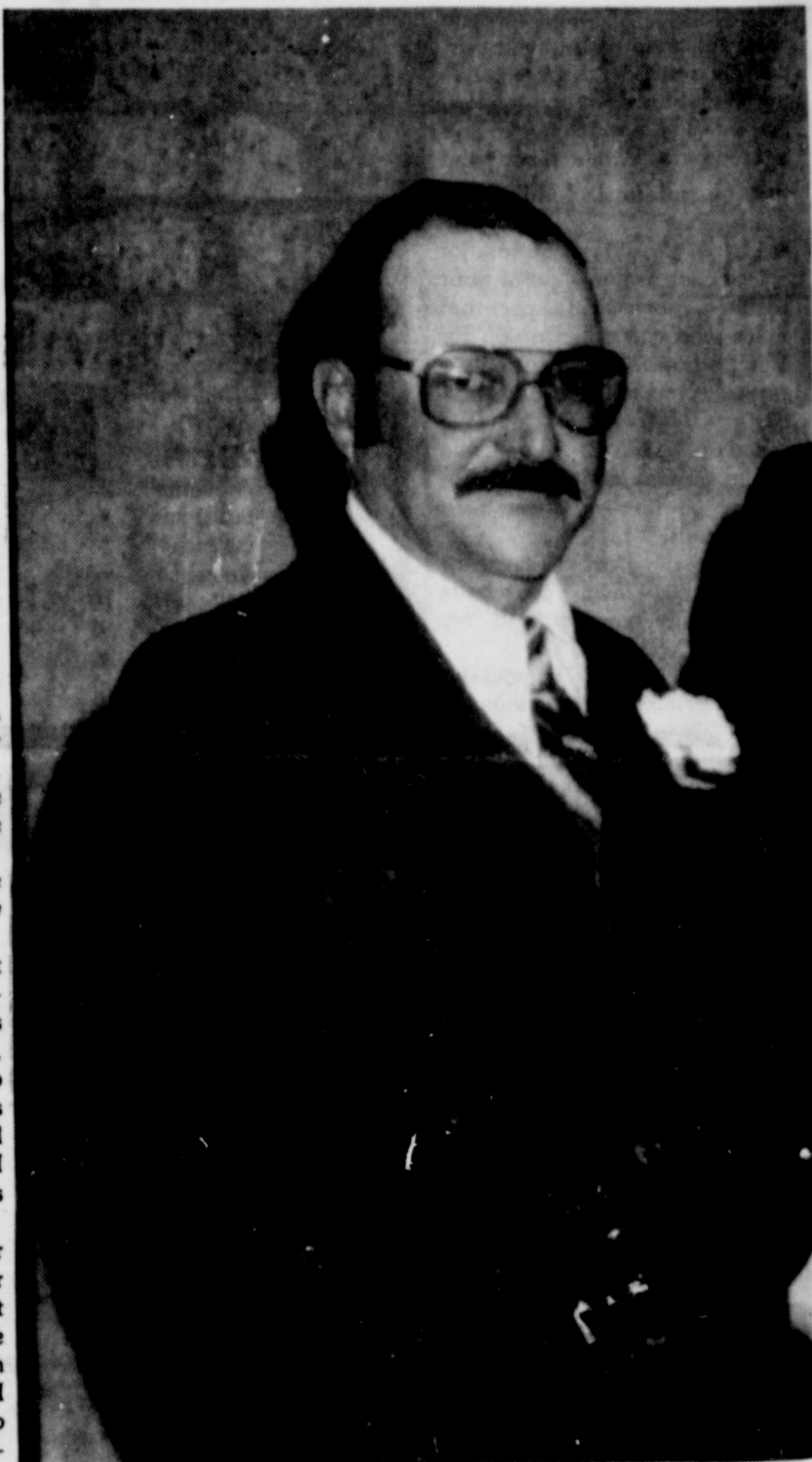
One of the many jobs I have to tackle on Tuesday nights is the dark room, and the developing of pictures.

A scholarship fund in the memory of Carl Lee Henley has been established at the Bank of Commerce, according to bank officials.

The fund was started in the hopes that people would donate to it, enabling a graduating McLean High School senior to receive funds to further his or her education.

"Carl Lee was one of the biggest supporters of McLean's youth. He was always concerned about the future a youngster would be able to have, and he always tried to influence and support the youth in every way he possible could," said scholarship founder Randy

Stalls. "We hope that by establishing this fund, the citizens of McLean and surrounding areas will donate, and enable us to continue Carl's support of local youth."

Donation cards and memorial cards are currently being printed, and will be available to send to families when donations are made in memory of a loved one that has passed away, Stalls continued.

"We have had several friends of Carl Lee's that have wanted to do something in his memory that would benefit others. We can't think of another area in which Carl would want money given in his memory."

Specific guidelines for awarding the scholarship are being set, but Stalls stressed that the scholarship would not be limited to students who participated in rodeo.

"Carl Lee was interested in all of McLean's kids, and would want the money to be put to use by someone who needed and deserved it," Stalls explained. "We are also hoping we will receive enough money to eventually make the scholarship large enough to present the award to more than one deserving student," Stalls said.

Councilmen Discuss Dog Ordinance and Budget

City Councilmen gathered for a called meeting October 23 at city hall. Present were mayor George Terry; councilmen W.A. Bentley, June Suggs, and Harold Fabian; city secretary, Stella Lee; and Jerry Don Cook, Linda Cook, Lisa Patman, Jo Ann Durham, and Kathy Carter.

The invocation was given by councilman W.A. Bentley.

Ordinance 213, setting the effective tax rate was read and approved for the second time.

Ted Simmons' petition for annexation was withdrawn. The council is currently working on a new petition concerning the land surrounding I-40.

Jerry Don Cook then read a statement concerning the dog problem.

Jerry Don Cook then read a statement concerning the council's actions taken towards solving the dog problem. The council discussed writing letters to citizens to McLean to get their opinion of the dog ordinance, and voted to enclose the following questions in the bills to be mailed: Are you in favor of the continuance of the enforcement of City Ordinance No. 133 pertaining to the impoundment of dogs in city limits? Please check one and return to the Mayor or City Secretary. For- Against-

Kathy Carter, from the Mc-

Lean News, advised the council that she would also put a questionnaire in the paper concerning and the councilmen decided to compare the responses given by the two groups.

Councilmen then went into executive session at 9:20 to discuss the 1984-85 budget.

They returned to regular session at 9:50, and the city fathers decided to leave the city

employees' salaries as they currently stand, except to allow \$5 for water, and give the sewer and garbage costs to the employees on their bills.

The motion was made and unanimously voted on to approve the budget, excluding the 10% salary raise for employees. This is the second year city employees have received no raise.

Councilmen adjourned at 10:30.

One could perhaps even stand a wallow in the mud

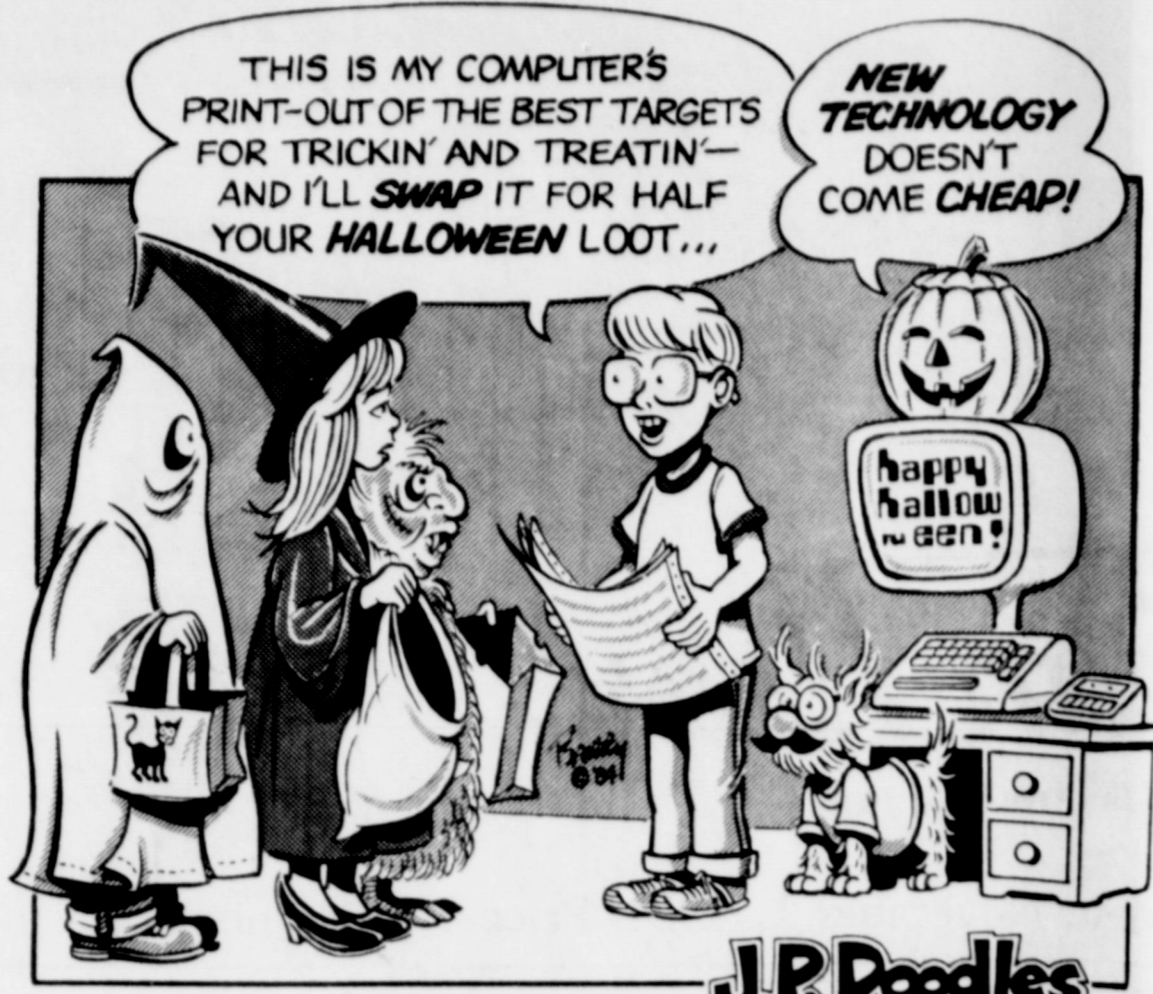
rather than hear it slung day after day by the "sincere" candidates. My sincere hope is that all Americans who are able will not "dog it" in their efforts

Dear Editor:

As a former member of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System and past and president of the Ex-Students Association of The University of Texas, I strongly urge passage of Proposition 2 on November 6.

This Amendment is vital to the future if higher education in Texas for two principle reasons:

First; a constitutionally dedicated tax fund of \$100 million annually will be set aside by the Legislature. This will provide urgently needed dollars to the twenty-six state colleges and universities not included in The University of Texas and the Texas A&M Systems. Schools such as West Texas State University will be assured the funding for buildings, libraries, and other specified academic pursuits.

Second; The University of Texas System and The A&M University System will be permitted to include all of their component institutions as beneficiaries of The Permanent University Fund. Currently, not all members of the University and the A&M Systems are permitted to share in income from PUF. The bonding capacity of the Fund will be increased, and the use of the income from the Fund will be expanded. Having serv-

ed on the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, I assure you this would greatly assist both Texas A&M and The University of Texas Systems.

Passage of Proposition 2 would be extremely beneficial to all public universities and colleges in Texas.

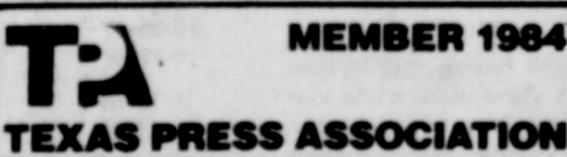

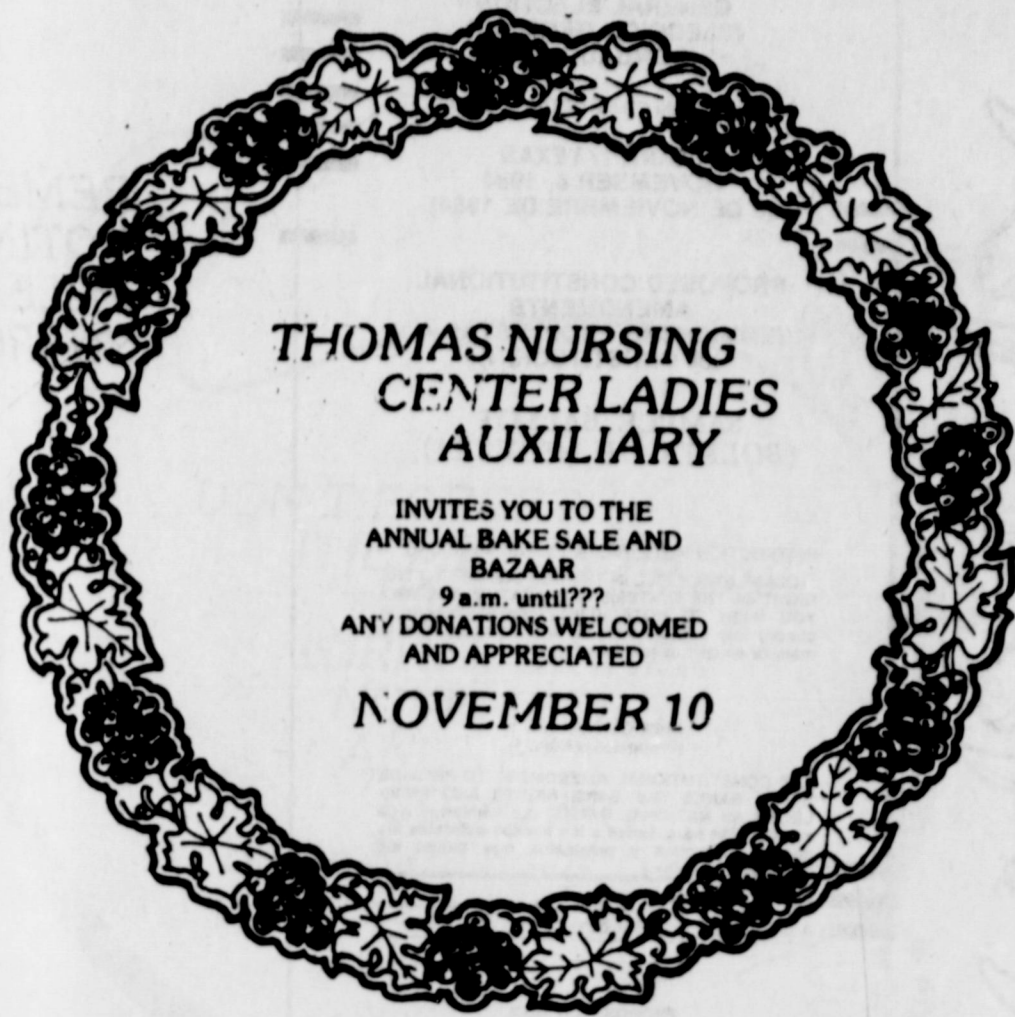
The Isbells, consisting of the mother and father and six children, ranging in age from 8 to 22 years, have become widely known for the singing ministry.

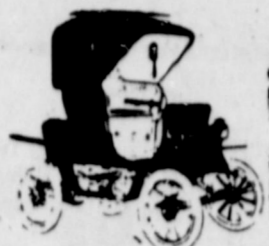

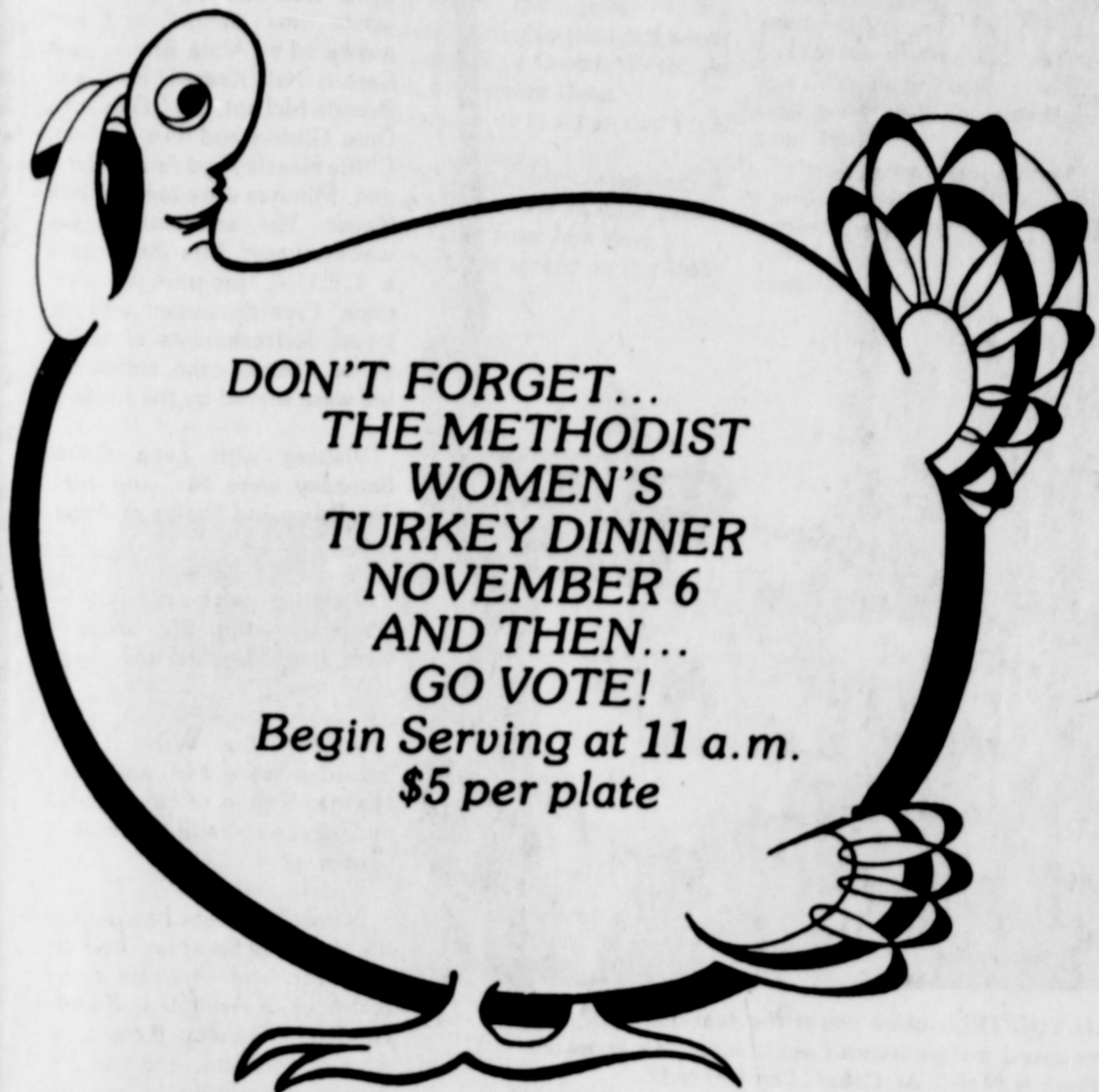

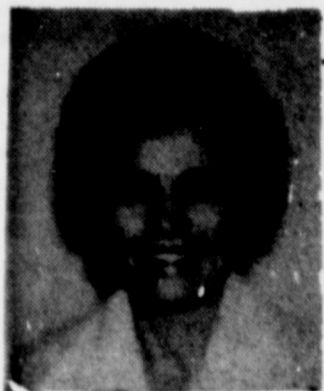

ORDINANCE #215
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 5 AND 7 OF ORDINANCE NO. 133 SETTING IMPOUNDING FEE AND AILY CHARGES; PROVIDING FOR TIME OF IMPOUNDING AND DISTRIBUTION OF ANY ANIMAL IMPOUNDED; PROVIDING FOR UNCONSTITUTIONALITY; REPEALING CERTAIN ORDINANCES; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY; AND PROVIDING PUBLICATION AND PENALTY.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF McLEAN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That section 5 of Ordinance no. 133 be, and the same is hereby amended to provide as follows: The owner of any dog impounded may redeem such dog at any time prior to destruction by the payment of \$25.00 for first offense and \$50.00 for each offense thereafter and \$5.00 per day or part of day such dog shall have been impounded, and providing the dog has been vaccinated with antirabies vaccine by a licensed veterinary within the last twelve months, if the dog is over six months of age.
SECTION 2. That Section 7 of Ordinance No. 133 be and the same is hereby amended to provide as follows: The owner may redeem any animal placed in pound by paying all charges with in three (3) days after the animal has been picked up. If animal has not been redeemed within the three days then it will be destroyed.

SECTION 3. That if any section, part, or provision of this ordinance is declared unconstitutional or invalid, then in that event, it is expressly provided, and it is the intention of the City Council in passing this ordinance that all other parts of this shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect.
SECTION 4. That any owner who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined any sum not to exceed Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each and every day of violation shall be deemed a separate and complete offense.

SECTION 5. The fact that a large number of dogs are running at large within the boundaries of the City of McLean causing a manace and hazard to the health and well-being of the public creates an emergency and necessity, and the rule requiring said ordinance to be read on two separate occasions is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall be passed and shall take effect and shall be in full force and effect after its passage and publication.
SECTION 6. Notice of the enactment of this ordinance shall be given by publication in the official newspaper of this City; and this ordinance shall become effective upon passage **UNANIMOUSLY PASSED APPROVED AND ORDERED** published by the City Council of the City of McLean, Texas, on this 9 day of October, 1984.

There is hereby levied for the year 1984, upon all real property situated within the corporate limits of said City of McLean, Texas, and on all personal property which is owned within the corporate limits of said City of McLean, Texas, on the first day of January, A.D. 1984, except so much thereof as maybe exempt by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, a total of \$2661/100 (\$2661) dollars on each One hundred and no/100 Dollars of assessed valuation of said taxable property is hereby levied for the year 1984 for the purpose of providing revenue for the General Fund in the City of McLean, Texas, for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1985, and such tax when collected, shall be appropriated and deposited in and to the credit of the General Fund of the City of McLean, Texas.

SECTION 2. An advalorem tax of and at the rate of \$2661/100 (\$2661) dollars on each One hundred and no/100 (\$100.00) Dollars of assessed valuation of said taxable property is hereby levied for the year 1984 for the purpose of providing revenue for the General Fund in the City of McLean, Texas, for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1985, and such tax when collected, shall be appropriated and deposited in and to the credit of the General Fund of the City of McLean, Texas.

SECTION 3. All taxes herein levied shall be due and payable on the first day of October 1984. Such taxes not paid in full by the 31st day of January, 1985, shall bear penalty and interest as provided in Article 7336 R.C.S. of Texas.
