Scholarship Fund Begun In Memory Of Carl Lee Henley At Bank Of Commerce



The fund was started in the hopes that people would donate to it, enabling a graduating McLean High School senior to receive funds to further his or her education.

"Carl Lee was one of the biggest supporters of McLean's youth. He was always concerned about the future a youngster would be able to have, and he always tried to influence and support the youth in every way he possible could," said scholarship founder Randy

Stalls. "We hope that by establishing this fund, the citizens of McLean and surrounding areas will donate, and enable us to continue Carl's support of local youth."

Donation cards and memorial cards are currently being printed, and will be available to send to families when donations are made in memory of a loved one that has passed away, Stalls continued.

"We have had several friends of Carl Lee's that have wanted to do something in his memory that would benefit others. We can't think of another area in which Carl would want money given in his memory."

Specific guidelines for awarding the scholarship are being set, but Stalls stressed that the scholarship would not be limited to students who participated in rodeo.

"Carl Lee was interested in all of McLean's kids, and would want the money to be put to use by someone who needed and deserved it," Stalls explained. "We are also hoping we will receive enough money to eventually make the scholarship large enough to present the award to more than one deserving student," Stalls said Donations made be made at


have given their lives to make it possible for us to do so. See you at the polls.




The Isbells, consisting of the mother and father and six children, ranging in age from 8 to 22 years, have become widely known for the singing ministry.

ORDINANCE #215 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 5 AND 7 OF OR 71-NANCE NO. 133 SETTING

IMPOUNDING FEE AND AILY CHARGES: PROVIDING FOR TIME OF IMPOUNDING AND DISTRUTION OF ANY ANI-MAL IMPOUNDED; PROVID-ING FOR UNCONSTITUTION. ALITY; REPEALING CERTAIN ORDINANCES: DECLARING AN EMERGANCY: AND PRO-VIDING PUBLICATION AND

SECTION 1. That section 5 of Ordinance no. 133 be, and the same is hereby amended to provide as follows: The owner of any dog impounded may redeem such dog at any time prior to destruction by the payment of \$25.00 for first offense and \$50.00 for each offense thereafter and \$5.00 per day or part of day such dog shall have been impounded, and providing the dog has been vacinated with antirabies vaccine by a licensed veterinary within the last twelve months, if the dog is over six months of age.

SECTION 2. That Section 7 of Ordinance No. 133 be and the same is hereby amended to provide as follows: The owner may redeem any animal placed in pound by paying all charges with in three (3) days after the animal has been picked up. If animal has not been redeemed within the three days then it will be destroyed.

SECTION 3. That if any section, part, or provision of this ordinance is declared unconstitutional or invalid, then in that event, it is expressly provided, and it is the intention of the City Council in passing this ordinance that all other parts of this shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force

SECTION 4. That any owner who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined any sum not to exceed Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each amd every day of violation shall be deemed a seperate and com-

plete offense.

SECTION 1. There is hereby levied for the year 1984, upon all real property situated within the corporate limits of said City of McLean, Texas, and on all personal property which is owned within the corporate limits of said City of McLean, Texas, on the first day of January, A.D. 1984, except so much thereof as maybe exempt by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, a total of \$.2661/100 (\$ 2661) dollars on each One hundred and No/100 dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation on all said property, which said total is levied in the protions hereinafter sit forth in this SECTION 2. An advalorem tax of and at the rate of \$.2661/100 (\$.2661) dollars on each One hundred and no/100 (\$100.00) Dollars of assessed valuation of said taxable property is hereby levied for the year 1984 for the purpose of providing revenue for the General Fund in the City of McLean, Texas, for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1985, and such tax when collected, shall be approriated and deposited in and to the credit of the General Fund of the City of McLean, Texas SECTION 3. All taxes herein levied shall be due and payable on the first day of October 1984.
