I am planning as school gets underway, to impose on Debi and her husband Jay... so beware you two... and thanks, Debi.

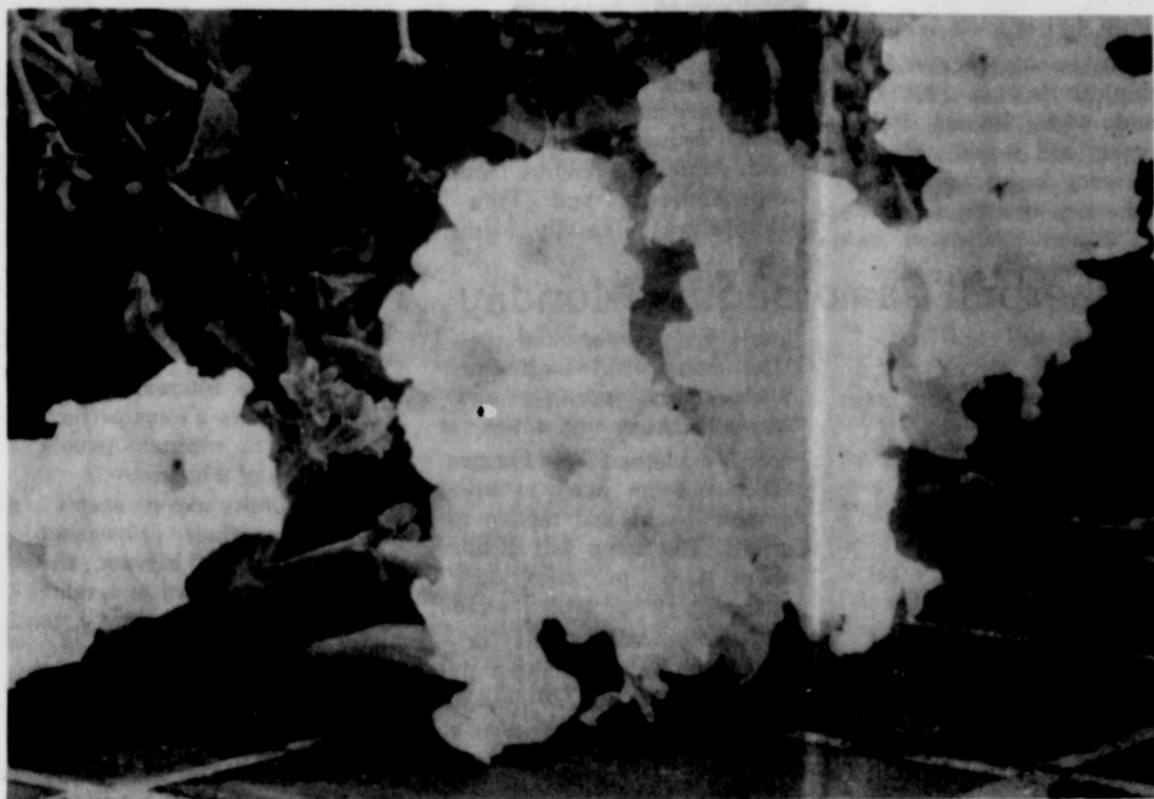

McLean City Council were scheduled to meet Tuesday night in a called meeting to accept the resignation of possibly two city councilman. Councilman Loyd Bybee tendered his resignation last week to the city council, and the council was expected to accept his resignation Tuesday night.

Although not confirmed, the resignation of councilman Wayne Bybee was also expected to be given and accepted during the Tuesday night action.

In an open letter to the citizens of McLean, councilman Loyd Bybee offered this explanation for his resignation: Attention: Citizens of McLean, I want to thank you again for electing me to be one of

your city councilman. I feel I owe you all a reason, for my resignation.

The reasons for my resignation, is the conflicts of interest law art:988A. I own a small business, I need all the work I can get. This law prevents me from doing my work, for the city, library, fire dept., any schools, county, state, government apartments or any government funding job. Also my concern for the city's liability and that of my own.

Ribbon-Cutting Ceremonies Schedules For Friday

Route 66, the ribbon linking Chicago to Los Angeles by way of the Texas Panhandle will officially be cut from interstate transportation at a ribbon-cutting ceremony 11:30 A.M. Friday at the westbound lane of its successor, Interstate 40.

The ceremony, which dedicates the last link of Interstate 40, will include a ribbon-cutting followed by a luncheon at the McLean Country Club. Feature speaker will be Texas Highway Commissioner

Mark Goode.

Goode is the chief administrative officer of the Texas State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

He attended public schools in Dallas and Graduated from Texas A&M University with a degree in civil engineering in 1947.

He joined the department after graduation and his first assignment was as a field engineer in the Dallas district.

Goode served as a resident engineer and senior resident

engineer, and became assistant district engineer in Dallas in 1964.

In 1970, he was named district engineer in Lufkin, Coordinating departmental activities in nine East Texas counties. In 1973, Goode was appointed assistant engineer -director/operations in the Austin headquarters with responsibility for coordinating the department's engineering operations. He became engineer-director in July 1980.

He serves on the Executive Policy Committees of the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials and the Executive Committee of the Transportation Research Board.

Also scheduled to attend the ceremonies is John R. Butler, Jr., who is a member of the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission of Texas, policy-making body for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

U.S. Congressman Jack High-tower is also expected to attend the ceremonies and is listed as a speaker for the noon luncheon following the ribbon-cutting ceremonies.

McLean mayor George Terry estimated that more than 450 invitations to the ceremony have been mailed out to dignitaries from Pampa, Amarillo, Shamrock and other Panhandle towns and to

officials from Energas, Pioneer Natural Gas, Southwestern Bell Telephone, Southwestern Public Service, Amarillo College and Texas State Technical Institute.

"I want to stress to the many, many interested citizens

of McLean that I have expressed interest in attending the ceremonies, that they are definitely invited to attend them, explained mayor Terry. "We were not able to issue personal invitations to the ribbon-cutting itself, but we want to make sure that all the citizens that want to attend the ribbon-cutting ceremony are invited. Also, tickets are now on sale for the luncheon following the ceremony," said Terry.

The interstate, which bypasses McLean to the south, was opened to traffic in June. It was the last link of historic Route 66 to be bypassed by the interstate.

Coy Palmer Buried Wednesday

Services for former Spearman mayor and Pampa radio pioneer Coy C. Palmer, 71, were at 11 a.m. Wednesday at the First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Lane Boyd, pastor and the Rev. Vernon Henderson of Lubbock, officiating, in Spearman. Burial was at 3 p.m. Wednesday in Alanreed Cemetery by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home.

Mr. Palmer died Sunday. Born in Lelia Lake, he grew up in Alanreed and began his broadcast career in 1930 when he played piano at KGRS in Amarillo. He continued working for the station after the station combined with WDAG to become KGNC.

A World War II Navy veteran he was a partner in the operation of radio station KPDN in Pampa from 1953 to 1960. He later operated an FM

station in Pampa before moving to Spearman in 1963 to 1978 and was manager from 1980 to 1983.

The composer of the Stinnett High School song, he was mayor of Spearman from 1972 to 1974, first president of the Spearman Rotary Club, a Mason, and a member of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce. He helped establish the Palo Duro Water Authority.

He was a Methodist. Survivors include his wife, Faye; two sons, Brice of Amarillo and Micheal of Chicago; three sisters, Willie B. Gull of Pampa, Jimmie Elms of Lubbock, and Neita McKee of Alanreed; a brother, Hersh of Borger; and six grandchildren.

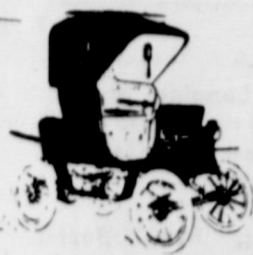

New "Premises Work Charges"

There has been an important change recently regarding telephone wiring. The change involves the installation and repair of jacks and "inside wiring."

Inside wiring is required from the point where our lines end in a "network interface." On most new homes, this interface — a large plastic box — is usually installed near the power meter. (In new apartments, it's usually located near the circuit breaker box.)

If you don't have a new home, you probably don't have a network interface (we just started installing them in 1982). Instead, you have a similar device called a "protector."

Like a network interface, the protector is the point where our line ends and your inside wiring begins.

Until recently, we did all the installation and repair of wiring inside our customers' homes. We will still perform that work if you ask us — but the way the work is charged has now changed.

If we do the wiring, we'll now bill you "Premises Work Charges." These charges are billed for each 15-minute period required on the job. Charges cover all costs associated with the work, including materials, but costs differ for installation and repair.

Here's how the charges break down if we do the work for you:

If you don't wish to have Southwestern Bell Telephone perform the work, you now have two other options. Those are hiring someone else (such as an electrical contractor), or doing it yourself (materials are available from many retail stores).

New rates — Small increase to you

By now, you are probably aware that Southwestern Bell Telephone received final approval for a rate increase effective June 1, which included the change in Premises Work Charges. I say you are "probably aware," because most customers will hardly notice it on their local exchange phone bill.

The rate award sounds like a lot of money — and it is, but the increase for residence flat-rate local exchange service is only 30 cents per month, or less.

Most of the increase (about 89%) was put on one group — Texas' long distance companies (who pay for access to Southwestern Bell Telephone's network).
