1-40 Construction Continues

Construction on Interstate 40 should be complete and McLean bypassed by early next summer according to a press release from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

According to the release, Mica Corporation of Ft. Worth is the apparent low bidder at \$210,738 on a contract for signing and delineation on the 4.7-mile section of I-40 beginning one mile west of McLean, going east to the Wheeler county line.

The contract calls for installation of all highway signs and delineators (reflective road edge markets) and all necessary pavement striping.

This work, once under way, should take about six months to complete.
