

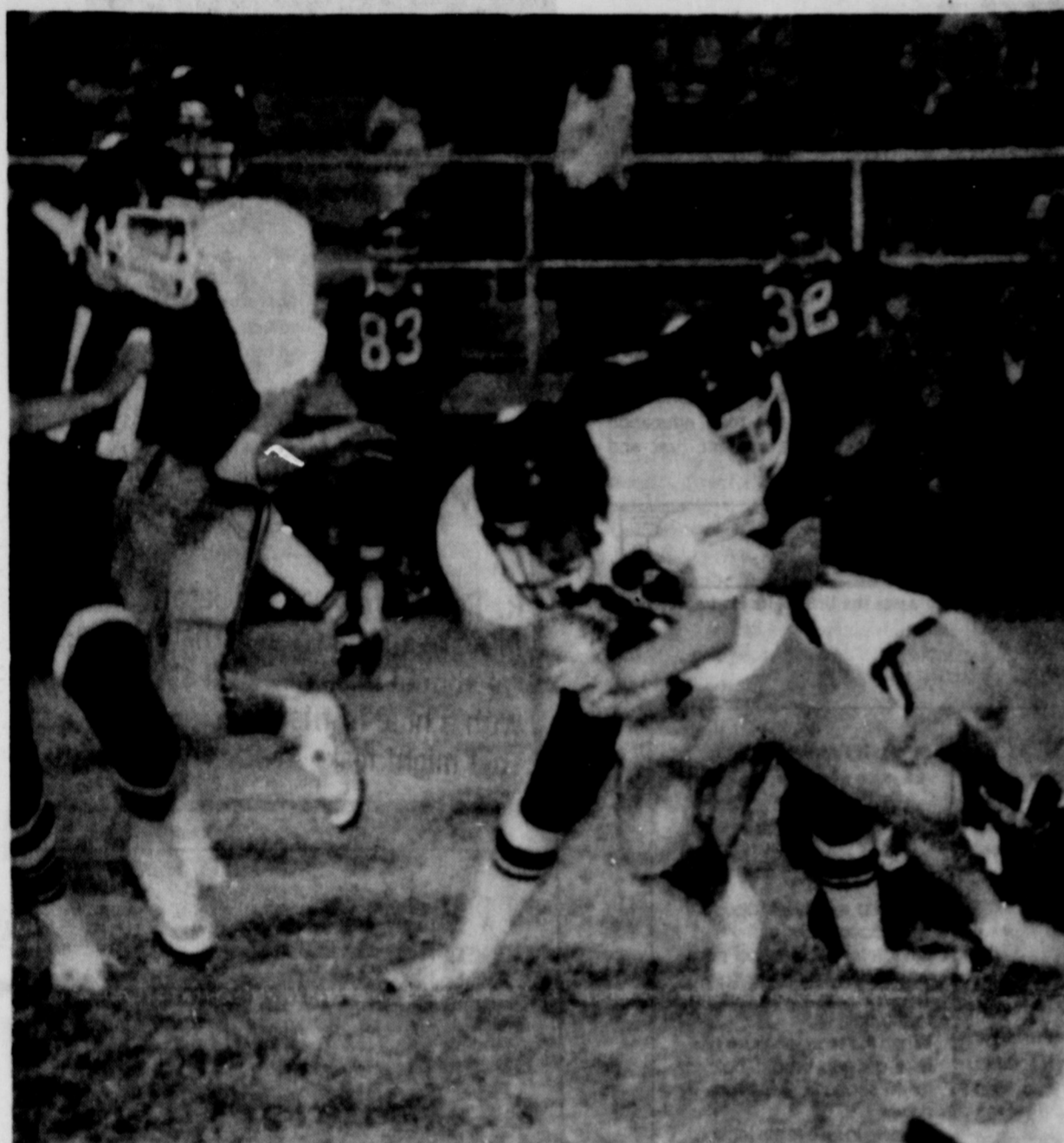

Tigers Roll Over Panthers; Prepare For Last Game

The McLean Tigers won their fourth game of the season Friday night in Follett, as they scored two touchdowns in the last three minutes, six seconds of the game to edge the Panthers 14-3.

The Tigers moved the ball well on the ground all night, with McDowell, Morris, Billingsley, Mann and Hembree all contributing to the Tiger total of 173 yards rushing. Penalties at crucial

times, five fumbles, and a pass interception all shut down potential scoring drives, and the scoreless contest continued until 1:22 of the third quarter when Follett scored on a controversial 34-yard field goal by Brett Laubhan. The ensuing McLean drive was killed by a fumble deep in Panther territory, and things looked dark until the sensational 69-yard pass from Rice to Mann

with about three minutes remaining on the scoreboard clock. Stovall added the extra point kick to make the score 7 for McLean 3 for Follett.

After the following McLean kickoff, Stubbs, who played his usual good game for the home town boys, intercepted a pass and two played later Craig Morris went 32 yards to score the last touchdown of the game.

Stovall again added the point-after kick, and the Tigers had won another conference football game. The Tiger defense, which has been its strongest point all season, came through again in this contest to limit Follett to a total of 118 total yards on offense. McLean's final game of the season will be at Duncan Field Friday night at 7:30 against the Wheeler Mustangs.

UIL Council Meets In Austin

Raising academic standards and restricting loss of school time were major issues addressed by the University Interscholastic League's Legislative Council, which held its 43rd annual meeting in Austin, Oct. 16-17.

The council voted to place on a referendum ballot proposals that would raise academic credit requirements and restrict classroom absences by those participating in golf and tennis. In addition, the council voted to allow speech students to miss no more than 10 days per year in order to participate in speech/debate tournaments.

The referendum ballot will be mailed from the UIL office to school administrators in Feb. Results will be announced March 3. A simple majority is needed for proposals to pass, and items approved will take effect during the 1984-85 school year, unless otherwise specified.

"The meeting had the largest attendance, the greatest participation and the most comprehensive press coverage of any in League history," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, UIL director. "I was pleased to see the increased interest. Those who may have questioned or doubted the League's rulemaking

processes surely were impressed by the openness and the free exchange of ideas."

think if they are trying to protect moose, they should by all means protest Lions, Elks, and perhaps even Kiwanians too....

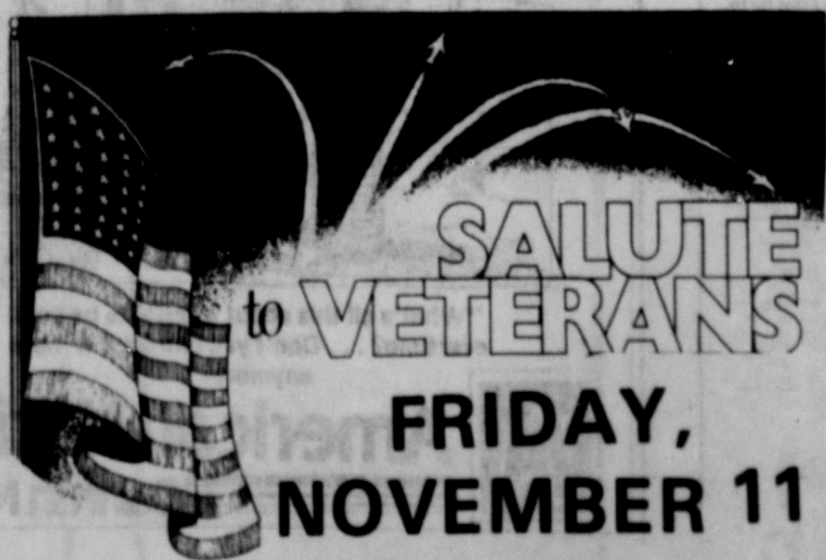

spectively. For instance, a tennis player may miss no more than 10 days in order to compete in tennis tournaments.

In addition, the council voted to place on the referendum ballot proposals that would relax summer basketball, football and volleyball camp rules. Summer camps would be open to athletes who have not participated in a varsity contest. Also, students may not be coached in a summer camp by a person employed by the students' school.

Revising the Five-Year Rule so that a child being retained in the seventh grade for competitive purposes would lose the final year of high school eligibility.

Placing the amateur restrictions on all students beginning in the ninth grade, regardless of the student's age.

Revising the college course enrollment regulations so that courses taught by a high school teacher during the regular school day and conforming to Texas Education Agency guide-

lines are not considered college courses, even though college credit is given.

Allowing athletes to sign a letter of intent and a college scholarship agreement that contains the conditions of the scholarship, provided the athlete receives no part of any valuable consideration until after all UIL eligibility is completed. If passed, the item would take effect in 1984-85.

Revising future basket-

ball starting dates, allowing basketball practice to begin on the seventh Monday following the first Thursday in September.

The council also voted to move the first day to play basketball games from November 22 to November 21, to allow baseball players to wear

metal cleats this spring, and to restrict music organizations to one non-League meet held on school time. The music restriction takes effect next year.

The council members did an outstanding job in considering the 50-plus items presented in public hearings Sunday as well as the multitude of pro-

posals they had previously heard," Marshall said. "They listened to, read and considered what each individual had presented. Though many of those addressing the council took conflicting sides, I believe all those attending truly are concerned with the total education of the student first and foremost."

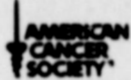

Congressman Jack Hightower Accepting Applications

Congressman Jack Hightower announced recently that his office is now accepting applications from young people in the 13th district for nomination to one of the nation's military academies. Under both law and tradition, a Congressman is allowed to nominate a certain number of qualified young people who are interested each year to either the Air Force Academy, West Point, the Naval Academy at Annapolis, or to the Merchant Marine or Coast Guard Academies.

"As I do every year, I'm inviting all interested young people, men and women, to apply to my office if they are interested in a career in the military. All nominees must be high school graduates by the time they would enter the academy, not over 22 years of age and single," Hightower said. "I also look for good character, a good academic background, and leadership potential."

Hightower has an Academy Selections Committee composed of citizens from the 13th District which reviews all applications and forwards recommendations to the Congressman. Applicants must have high gradepoint average, be in good physical condition and have high SAT/ACT

test scores. Those interested in a 1985 nomination should request a nomination packet in the spring of their junior year of high school.

All applicants are urged to make a formal written request for nomi-

nation to Hightower, complete with at least three letters of recommendation, and an explanation of why they believe they are qualified for consideration. Hightower has announced a December 1st deadline

for all 1984 nominations. Final decisions will be announced by the Congressman by the end of

January, 1984. Those nominated will enter their respective academy in the summer.

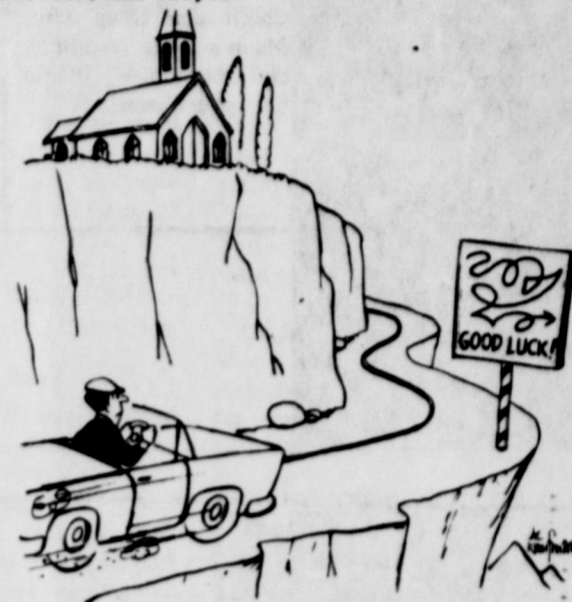
Angie Wilson Returns From Eleven - Day Tour

The group began their tour in New York City, where they visited the Rockefeller Plaza, St. Patrick's, Time Square, Greenwich Village, and attended the Broadway play, "On Your Toes". Other sites visited in New York included the Riverside Church, Central Park, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the American Museum of Natural History, and Al Fredo's.

Pampa Physicians Have Access To New Machine

Pampa physicians can now use a device similar to sonar to "see" the inside of the heart, according to Dwight Austin, director of cardio pulmonary at Coronado Community Hospital in Pampa. An Echo Cardiography/Phono Cardiography machine, costing more than \$30,000, was recently put into service at CCH, giving local physicians an advanced diagnostic tool.

Austin said that the therapist uses a transducer which is a small ice cream cone shaped device. The transducer is placed on different areas of the chest to show various planes of the heart. Two television screens on the machine are connected to a videocassette recorder so that the image on the bottom screen is recorded for the doctor to study. This screen actually shows the heart contracting. The top screen is the M mode, and shows the motion of the heart.

The procedure, which takes about 30 to 40 minutes, is completely painless, Austin said. The patient lies on his left side while the therapist does the recording.

The diagnostic procedure can determine a variety of data about the heart. The Irex echo cardiography can measure all the chambers of the heart and can determine the function of the valves. The machine can also determine if any tumors are present, and can give the doctor a look at the pulmonary arteries and some coronary arteries.

Austin is registered and certified therapist and has had training in basic cardiography.

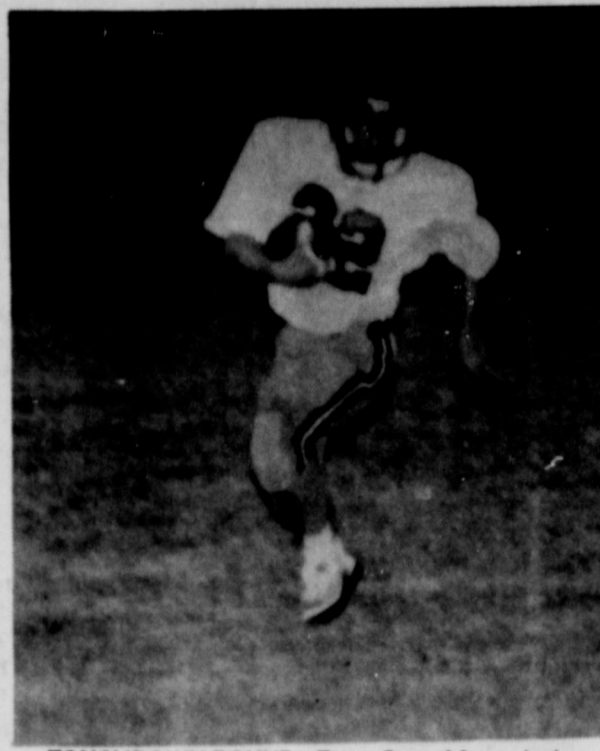

Countdown to divestiture
It's now less than two months away... "it" being the break-up of the Bell System. Facts On Fever

Fever is one of the body's major ways of reacting when something goes wrong. Besides fighting infection, it alerts us to take action to help the body relieve the problem.



If fever strikes, doctors say, go to bed and stay there.

If someone comes down with a fever, the best thing for him or her to do is to go to bed and stay there. Drink lots of liquid, but no alcohol. Light food is allowed, but don't force yourself to eat.

Often the symptoms that accompany a fever are important in finding out what's wrong. If the fever came on following a fall, if a rash develops, if the fever is over 101 degrees or lasts longer than a couple of days, contact your doctor.

For ordinary fever, bed rest, aspirin and lots of liquids should help. If the fever is accompanied by stomach cramps or nausea, aspirin might be harmful. Check with your doctor first.

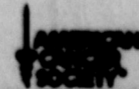

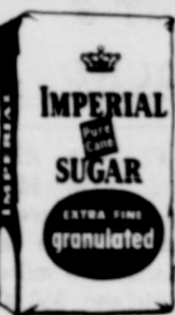
