Coffee Memorial Blood Bank Schedules Local Blood Drive

Representatives from Coffee's Memorial Blood Bank will be in McLean July 12 from 4 to 7 in the Church of Christ Annex for their blood drive campaign.

More than 63 citizens donated blood at the drive in January, and the bank was extremely appreciative of McLean's response to their

need. An article released by the blood bank, stated that less than 5% of Americans are blood donors.

Blood given during the drive may be given to individual accounts, or donated to an account already established and needing blood.

McLean News Wins Second In State Newspaper Contest

McLean was one of five Panhandle papers to win an award at the Texas Press Association's 1984 Newspaper Contest.

Previous owner Linda Haynes won second in the state editorials for her 1983 editorial on teenage alcoholism.

According to the judge's comments, Haynes was not far out from the first place winner, and entry from the *Ingleside Index*. Taking third place was the *Johnson City Record-Courier*.

McLean News and the *Lipscomb County Limelight* were the only two Panhandle papers

in division seven (small weeklies) to win awards. The *Limelight* took a 2nd place in advertising and a 3rd place in Feature Stories.

Other area papers receiving state recognition were *The Canadian Record* (Division six) - with a first place in Advertising and third in General Excellence; *Perryton Herald* (Division four) - with a second place in Feature Stories; and the *Hereford Brand* (Division two) - with a first place in Advertising.

This is the fourth consecutive year the News has won a state award.

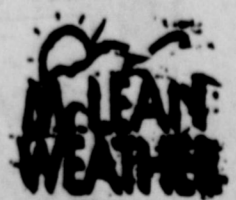

and patriotic holiday. I'll be out on the North Fork of the Red River engaging in washer pitch-

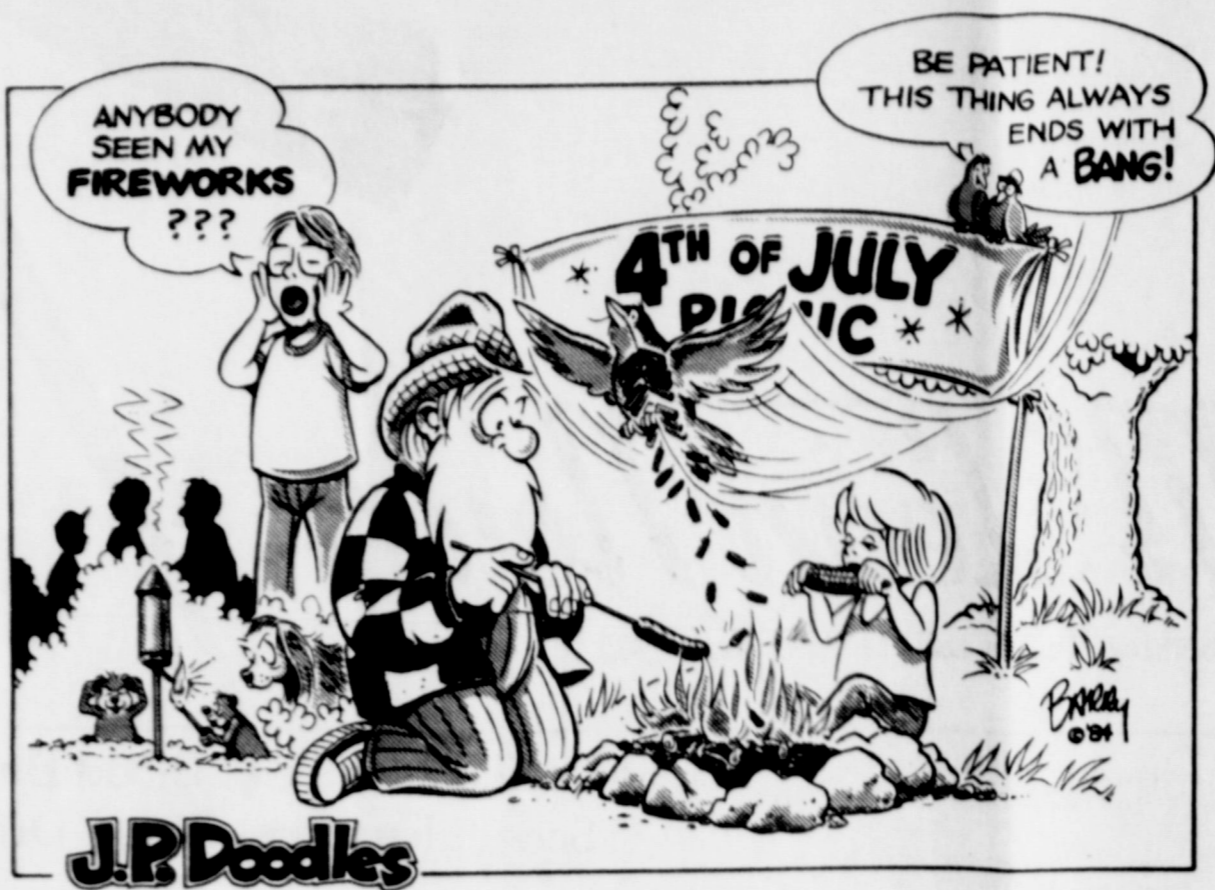
ing, volleyball, football, softball, much eating of hot dogs, etc., and a glorious display of

Cooking With...

The Texas CowBelles

Recently we published the winning recipe from the 1984 Texas CowBelles' Beef Cook-off, and received several comments on it.

This week, we're publishing the recipe that won second place. It's called "Margarita Fajitas" by Jean Connor of Palestine, and includes the use of a wok. We will publish the third-place recipe in next week's issue.

- Margarita Fajitas**
 1 1/2 lb. Round Steak, fat trimmed
 1/4 cup tequila
 1/2 cup lime juice
 1 cup cooking oil
 4 Tbsp. liquid smoke
 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
 1/4 tsp. pepper
 1/2 tsp. salt
 3/4 tsp. paprika
 1/2 cup green onions, with tops chopped

- 3/4 cup chopped green pepper
 1 cup chopped tomatoe
 8 to 10 6-inch flour tortillas
 Slice partially frozen Round Steak into long strips, somewhat thinner than a pencil. Marinate 2 hours in flat glass dish with mixture of tequila and lime juice. Drain.

Combine oil, liquid smoke, Worcestershire sauce, pepper, salt and paprika, beating with rotary beater until smooth. Heat wok over medium high heat, necklace with the oil mixture. When hot, add steak strips, stirring occasionally.

When three or four minutes from desired doneness, stir in onion and green pepper. When done, ladle onto hot plates, top with chopped tomato, let guests wrap in warmed flour tortillas. Serves 4.

Preparation time (excluding marinade) 35 minutes.

Applications will be available at The McLean News. Applications must be received by July 25.

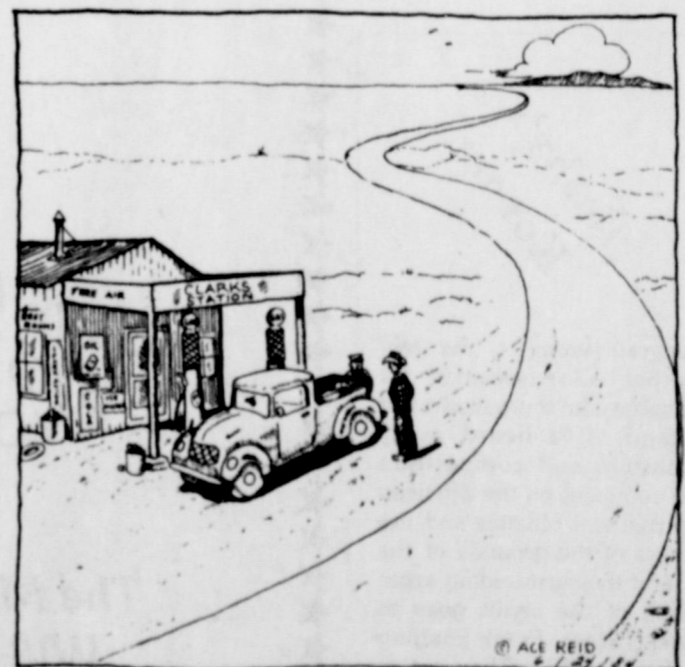

Senator Bill Sarpalius Reports



AUSTIN- Timing is everything is politics and the same is true for politicians passing legislation.

Had the present school reform activities of the Special Session been brought up in the Regular Legislative Session, those representing the rural areas of the State would have had more voice. We could have insisted that many of the elements that were included and

are to be a burden on smaller school districts would not have happened.

In a special session, it takes only a simple majority to pass legislation. In a regular session,

it takes a vote of two-thirds of the Senate.

The bare fact is, there is not enough representation from the rural areas to hold our own with the metropolitan areas of Texas.

And as a result, the school districts with a smaller number of children, with large areas to cover and with a number of disadvantaged students will have to tighten their belts even tighter because of the actions of the Legislature.

We can look for property taxes to increase as our school districts assemble a financial package to pay for the new programs mandated by the Legislature. The only place the school districts have to go to implement and increase a number of programs. There will be a need for more facilities, more teachers and an increased transportation system.

And, the teachers whom we went to Austin to help, will get a token raise from the State and it will be the local districts who will have to make up the extra dollars they were promised by the Legislature.

The network interface is being installed on the outside of most new homes, usually adjacent to the power meter. For others it may be found on the wall of a walk-in closet, a utility room or garage. Southwestern Bell Telephone began installing network interfaces in 1982, therefore, wiring installed prior to 1982 may not have a network interface. Unfortunately, not all of the older network interfaces are exact look-a-likes, but they are similar.

From the network interface, you have at least three options on how to handle installation and repair of inside wiring and jacks to your telephones:

- (1) hire Southwestern Bell Telephone to do it,
- (2) hire another contractor,
- (3) or save the money by doing the work yourself.

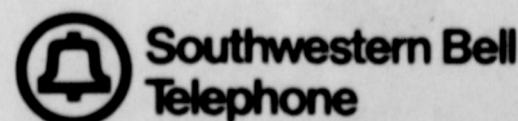

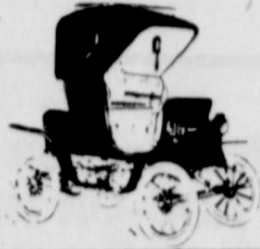
These charges are similar to those made by other service personnel for work performed on customers' premises. Remember, too, that while inside wiring and the workmanship required to install or repair it may be obtained from many sources today, we're still in the business, if that's your choice.
