## TSTI To Register Aircraft Mechanics By Hightower Students Nov. 21

Registration for evening classes in Aircraft Mechanics will be held at Texas State Technical Institute, Mid-Continent Campus, November 21.

According to Ralph Noel, program chairman, classes will meet for three nights

to fulfill the required 1900 hours of instruction and be qualified for FAA licensing as airframe and powerplant mechanic.

This course does not replace the regular day-time classes. Those sessions will continue. The evening training is being offered so that persons employed in parttime or full-time jobs may prepare for the airframe or powerplant license, or both.

Students will receive instruction in all phases of aircraft repair and maintenance, Grier 90; including hydraulics, fuel systems, metals and fabrics, welding and all types of aircraft engines.

Texas State Technical Institute is approved by the Federal Aviation Administration and all instructors are FAA licensed. A minimum of 12 students is required for beginning a class. Veterans' benefits and financial aid resources are available.

Soil Survey Brochures Available to metal pipelines; shrink-

How soil surveys can help you is the subject of a new of color brochures available from the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

The leaflets are designed to describe uses which can be made of soil surveys by nine different groups including homebuyers, builders, developers, land use planners, land appraisers, farmers, ranchers, construction engineers, and others.

District Conservationist, Perry Gruhlkey of Pampa said single copies of the leaflets are available free from his office.

Soil Surveys have been made on about 120 million acres of land in Texas as part of the National Cooperative Soil Survey. Additional land is being mapped at the rate of about 5 million acres per year.

The surveys are made by SCS soil scientists who examine the soil acre-by-acre. They record depth, percent sand or clay in each layer, acidity or alkalinity, wetness, director of the Tiger organflood hazard, and other features by soil name symbols on aerial photographs. After a county survey is completed, the survey is published for public use.

Gruhlkey said the survey for Gray County is published. Soil survey information for all land in Gray County is available at the Pampa SCS office.

Soil surveys can be interpreted to determine suitability of soil for home sites, building foundations, sectic tank filter fields, gardens, cropland, trees, parks, fill material, and other uses.

Gruhlkey urged anyone interested in soil surveys to contact his office for a free leaflet explaining how surveys can be used. If making your request by mail, specify your business or special interest so you will receive the leaflet designed for you. Also, Soil Surveys of Gray County are distributed on a request basis.

AUSTIN - Regardless of whether voters were steamed up about the November 5 general election, it cost the candidates a bundle to run.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe led the spending. His \$1.2 million in outlays topped that of his nearest rival, Republican Jim Granberry, two-to-one.

Granberry listed contributions of \$521,462 and expenditures af \$536,545.

Briscoe reported about \$1.3 million in contributions and loans, including \$645,000 of his own money.

Second highest spending was in the heated race for state comptroller. Democrat Bob Bullock said he received \$130,701 in contributions and spent \$129,369. His Republican opponent, Nick Rowe, itemized \$36,274 in donations and \$31,877 in spending.

Opposition from Republican Robert Holt caused veteran State Treasurer Jesse James to spend \$85,807 in a media campaign. James raised \$86,408. Holt spent \$32,-124 and raised \$37,032.

Even candidates with light opposition saw fit to put together sizable warchests. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, for example, took in \$117,-599 and spent \$101,420, although his Republican challenger Gaylord Marshall had only \$10,564 in donations and spent \$21,760.

Atty. Gen. John Hill reported spending \$92,415 of 199,822 contributed.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White spent \$57,810 and received \$58,643, while his GOP opponent, Zack Fish-

\$47,000 campaign and less than \$40,000 in donations and loans.

TEACHERS WANT RAISE -Texas State Teachers Association's legislative committee has voted to ask the legislature to raise the pay of teachers to about \$12,000

a year. Texas teachers want at least \$500 over the U.S. average beginning with the 1975-76 school year.

The U.S. average in 1973-74 was \$10,673, but TSTA officials calculate it will go up to \$11,761 in 1975-76.

Average teacher pay in Texas was \$8,967 last school year placing Texas in 37th place among 50 states.

Another committee legislative proposal was for a 75 per cent increase in state funds for school bus transportation.

DISCOUNTS PROMISED -Owners of 1975 model autos will get a 10 per cent collision insurance premium reduction due to better bump-

Three import cars were approved for even higher bumper discounts, according to the State Insurance Board.

Checker Marathon and Volvo models are eligible for a 20 per cent discount, and Saab 99 for a 15 per cent reduction.



CATTLE SALES in Texas were down extensively the past two or three months, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. In September, 449,000 head were sold through Texas auctions, 26 per cent below a year ago and eight per cent below sales in August. Sheep sales through auction barns were 67,000, compared to 75,000 a year ago and 74,000 the previous month; and goat sales in September in Texas auction barns were 23,000 head, which was 30 per cent below September, 1973 and 34 per cent below August sales. Hog sales were up to 43,000 in September, 1974, which was 16 per cent above the same month in 1973. During the three months of July, August, and September of this year, 755,000 head of cattle were placed on feed in Texas feedlots, and that was 29 per cent fewer than a year ago; and 933,000 head were sold from Texas feedlots during that time, 14 per cent below sales for the same period last year. On October 1, there were 1,599,000 head of cattle being fed for slaughter in feedlots, compared to 2,323,000 head at the same time in 1973, a decline of 31 per cent. During September, 1974, there were 131,848 head of cattle and calves shipped out of Texas and 98,122 head shipped in. Shipments out were 53 per cent below shipments out during the same period of 1973, and shipments in were 38 per cent below shipments in during the same period in 1973.

DESPITE SOME rainy weather, harvest of Texas crops continued during the last weeks of October. The harvest of the first crop of rice is complete and over a third of the second crop has gone to the dryers. Sorghum harvest is about two-thirds complete, despite the slow down on the High Plains due to rains and cold weather. Cotton harvest is about 26 per cent complete, soybean about 15 per cent complete, peanuts about 55 per cent, and pecan harvest is gaining speed. (Pecan prices are reported holding steady at 30 to 35 cents for natives and from 40 to 55 cents a pound for improved varieties.) In the Valley, picking of oranges and grapefruit continues, and planting of lettuce, onions and cabbage is going on. Harvest of lettuce and carrots resumed in the High Plains after the wet weather, and okra, tomatoes, beans, green onions, greens and collards are being harvested in North Texas.



The Tigers go to Wellingtor this week to play the Skyrockets in a district contest at 7:30 p.m.




