## Savings Bond Reached

Releasing Treasury figures, County Bond Chairman, F. Watson, announced that sales of Series E United States Savings Bonds in Gray County during the same period of the year totaled \$22,268, for the nine-month period were \$318,370 for the yearly sales goal of \$300,000. September sales in Texas totaled \$19,110,753 compared to \$17,149,206 for the same period of the year, an increase of 11.5 percent. Year-to-date sales totaled \$81,964 for 73 percent of the \$110 million goal achieved.

## TSTI To Register Aircraft Mechanics Students Nov. 21

Registration for evening classes in Aircraft Mechanics will be held at Texas State Technical Institute, Mid-Continent Campus, November 21. According to Ralph Noel, program chairman, classes will meet for three nights a week for eight full quarters. A student will be able to fulfill the required 1900 hours of instruction and be qualified for FAA licensing as airframe and powerplant mechanic.

This course does not replace the regular day-time classes. Those sessions will continue. The evening training is being offered so that persons employed in part-time or full-time jobs may prepare for the airframe or powerplant license, or both. Students will receive instruction in all phases of aircraft repair and maintenance, including hydraulics, fuel systems, metals and fabrics, welding and all types of aircraft engines.

Texas State Technical Institute is approved by the Federal Aviation Administration and all instructors are FAA licensed. A minimum of 12 students is required for beginning a class. Veterans' benefits and financial aid resources are available. ## Soil Survey Brochures Available

How soil surveys can help  
you is the subject of a new  
set of color brochures available  
from the USDA Soil Conser-  
vation Service.

The leaflets are designed  
to describe uses which can be  
made of soil surveys by nine  
different groups including  
homebuyers, builders, devel-  
opers, land use planners,  
land appraisers, farmers,  
ranchers, construction engi-  
neers, and others.

District Conservationist,  
Perry Gruhlkey of Pampa  
said single copies of the  
leaflets are available free  
from his office.

Soil Surveys have been  
made on about 120 million  
acres of land in Texas as  
part of the National Coopera-  
tive Soil Survey. Additional  
land is being mapped at the  
rate of about 5 million acres  
per year.

The surveys are made by  
SCS soil scientists who exam-  
ine the soil acre-by-acre.  
They record depth, percent  
sand or clay in each layer,  
acidity or alkalinity, wetness,  
flood hazard, and other fea-  
tures by soil name symbols  
on aerial photographs. After  
a county survey is completed,  
the survey is published for  
public use.

Gruhlkey said the survey  
for Gray County is published.  
Soil survey information for  
all land in Gray County is  
available at the Pampa SCS  
office.

Soil surveys can be inter-  
preted to determine suitabil-  
ity of soil for home sites,  
building foundations, septic  
tank filter fields, gardens,  
cropland, trees, parks, fill  
material, and other uses.

They can also be used to  
predict depth to bedrock; lo-

cation of sand, gravel, or  
caliche deposits; corrosivity  
to metal pipelines; shrink-  
swell hazards; and dozens of  
other features.

Gruhlkey urged anyone in-  
terested in soil surveys to con-  
tact his office for a free leaf-  
let explaining how surveys  
can be used. If making your  
request by mail, specify your  
business or special interest so  
you will receive the leaflet  
designed for you. Also, Soil  
Surveys of Gray County are  
distributed on a request basis.

Livestock are animals that  
are being bred and raised on  
the country to keep the pro-  
ducer broke and drive the buy-  
er crazy.

Livestock are born in the  
spring, mortgaged in the sum-  
mer, pastured in the fall, and  
given away in the winter.

They vary in size, color,  
and weight, and the man  
who can guess the nearest  
weight and market grade is  
called a livestock buyer by  
the packer, a robber by the  
rancher, and a poor business  
man by the banker.

The price of livestock is  
determined in Hereford, and  
goes up after you have sold,  
and down after you have  
bought.

One packer sent a buyer  
to Hereford to watch the live-  
stock market in action and  
report back. After a few days  
of penetrating study he wired  
back to this effect:

"Some say the market will  
go up, some say it will go

*Highlights*

AUSTIN — Regardless of whether voters were steamed up about the November 5 general election, it cost the candidates a bundle to run.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe led the spending. His \$1.2 million in outlays topped that of his nearest rival, Republican Jim Granberry, two-to-one.

Granberry listed contributions of \$521,462 and expenditures of \$536,545.

Briscoe reported about \$1.3 million in contributions and loans, including \$645,000 of his own money.

Second highest spending was in the heated race for state comptroller. Democrat Bob Bullock said he received \$130,701 in contributions and spent \$129,369. His Republican opponent, Nick Rowe, itemized \$36,274 in donations and \$31,877 in spending.

Opposition from Republican Robert Holt caused veteran State Treasurer Jesse James to spend \$85,807 in a media campaign. James raised \$86,408. Holt spent \$32,124 and raised \$37,032.

Even candidates with light opposition saw fit to put together sizable war-chests. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, for example, took in \$117,599 and spent \$101,420, although his Republican challenger Gaylord Marshall had only \$10,564 in donations and spent \$21,760.

Atty. Gen. John Hill reported spending \$92,415 of \$99,822 contributed.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White spent \$57,810 and received \$58,643, while his GOP opponent, Zack Fisher of Memphis, settled for a

\$47,000 campaign and less than \$40,000 in donations and loans.

**TEACHERS WANT RAISE** — Texas State Teachers Association's legislative committee has voted to ask the legislature to raise the pay of teachers to about \$12,000 a year.

Texas teachers want at least \$500 over the U.S. average beginning with the 1975-76 school year.

The U.S. average in 1973-74 was \$10,673, but TSTA officials calculate it will go up to \$11,761 in 1975-76.

Average teacher pay in Texas was \$8,967 last school year placing Texas in 37th place among 50 states.

Another committee legislative proposal was for a 75 per cent increase in state funds for school bus transportation.

**DISCOUNTS PROMISED** — Owners of 1975 model autos will get a 10 per cent collision insurance premium reduction due to better bumpers.


Three import cars were approved for even higher bumper discounts, according to the State Insurance Board.

Checker Marathon and Volvo models are eligible for a 20 per cent discount, and Saab 99 for a 15 per cent reduction.

**PLAZA OFFERED** — The State Bar of Texas has offered to develop and give to the state a \$700,000 memorial plaza and underground parking facility in the capitol area.

The plaza will be located near the proposed new \$5

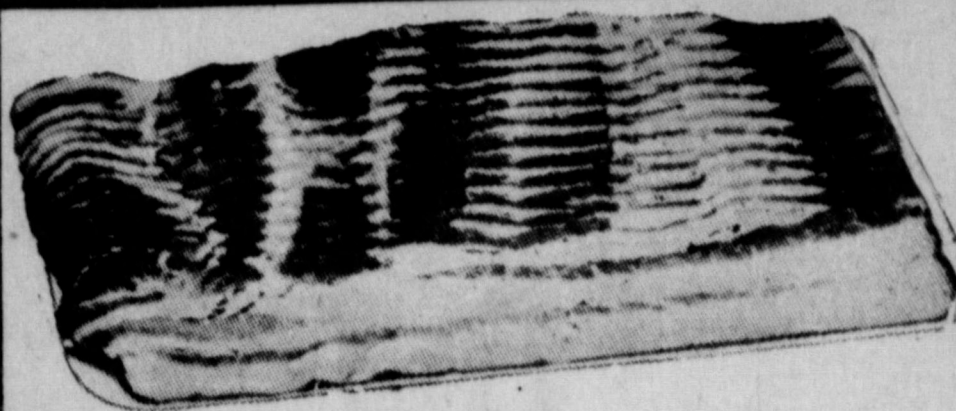

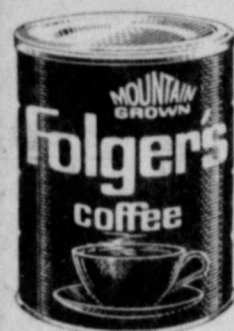

million Texas Law Center, the State Bar's future headquarters which is just about to be constructed.

Atty. Gen. John Hill, a member of the State Building Commission, recommended the legislature be asked to appropriate funds for two additional levels of parking under the scenic plaza in order to help relieve auto congestion in the crowded capitol area.

**COURTS SPEAK**—The State Supreme Court upheld removal of Wichita County District Attorney Jimmie Phagan after disbarment.

The high court threw out Nueces County law officers appeal of an injunction forbidding them from enforcing a new "handgun" law against an armored car service.

Supreme Court justices divided five-to-four in affirming action of a Randall County judge who set trial of a suit on promissory note without notifying the defendant.

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed and remanded revocation of probation of an Hidalgo County man because the prosecution didn't prove a violation "by greater weight of evidence".

The same court reversed and remanded life sentence of a Bexar County man for murder and a 35-year sentence of an Austin man who fired at a police officer.

**AG OPINIONS** — A woman has the right to decide at the time of her marriage whether she wants her married name or maiden name on her driver's license and other licenses, permits or personnel application, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: The security charge is an element of lowest airline fares used in computation of reimbursable expenses for use of a personal vehicle.

The legislature can enact legislation utilizing a formula of matching dollar-for-dollar all federal funds available for grants to Aid to Families with Dependent Children. But it has not given the Department of Public Welfare authority to prescribe policies by rules altering effect of state laws in conflict with federal statutes.

A student's records at a teacher placement service are to be made available to her or him on request.

Material supporting University of Texas regents' agenda for meetings is public information so far as it reflects factual matters.

Material on the performance of a state university faculty member is available under the open records act.

Federal office candidates do not have to file reports on campaign finances with the state other than copies of federally-required material.

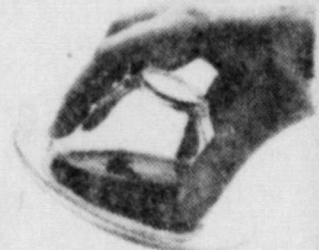
