William J. Craig Seeks Re-Election As County Judge

County Judge William J. (Bill) Craig today authorized The McLean News to announce his candidacy for re-election to the office of County Judge of Gray County, subject to the action of the Democratic Primary May 7.

Judge Craig has served as County Judge of Gray County since 1959. He is a graduate of the University of Texas with degrees in law and business administration, and is a veteran of World War II. Judge Craig has been a resident of this area for the past 49 years. He is a former member of the Texas Legislature, serving in the House of Representatives from 1947 to 1952 representing the top ten counties in the Panhandle. He and his wife, Betty, and their five children reside at 2101 N. Russell in Pampa.

Judge Craig is an active member of the State Bar Association, Gray County Bar Association, the First Christian Church of Pampa, the Pampa Noon Lions Club, the Scouting program and many other civic organizations.

Judge Craig stated that he feels that he is well qualified by training, education and the experience gained from serving as County Judge of Gray County to better serve the people of Gray County as their County Judge.

Judge Craig stated that his conduct of the office of County Judge of Gray County has been at all times guided by complete impartiality, sincere devotion to state and federal constitution, a desire to have the law conform to plain justice and common sense, a dignified but courteous attitude to all who appear before him and a willingness to spend the necessary time and effort to arrive at correct decisions in all matters before the Courts over which he presides.

Judge Craig stated that his platform for re-election as County Judge would be his record of previous service as County Judge and a pledge to the voters of Gray County to work for the continued development and improvement of Gray County and to insure that full value is received for each tax dollar spent.

Judge Craig stated that he hopes to contact each voter personally, but because of his duties it would be impossible for him to see many of the voters. He asks that you please accept this announcement as a personal contact in the event he is unable to visit you.

Applications Being Taken at Pampa Nursing School

Highland General Hospital School of Vocational Nursing in Pampa is now accepting applications for students interested in the vocational nursing program. Classes will start on Aug. 29, 1966.

The requirements for applicants are to be between the ages 18 and 55, in good health, U. S. citizens and have completed the 10th grade in school or the equivalent (C.E.D. Test).

Applications will be accepted through April 15, 1966, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday at Highland General Hospital.

The vocational program is a 12 month course. Upon completion of the training, the students are eligible to take the state board exam in Austin.

Gray County To Get Cancer Survey

Gray County has been selected to be the site of a new, experimental Cancer Society Survey in conjunction with the annual Cancer Crusade Day, April 19.

"We're pleased that we were selected for this first year of the survey," Don Lane, crusade chairman for the Gray County unit, said. "This is gratifying recognition of the thoroughness with which we reach our neighbors with cancer's educational messages. Only eight counties in Texas were selected for this survey."

The volunteers have been asked to request each household—preferably both husband and wife in each home—to answer the appropriate brief questionnaire on a colored post card. The card, without any name or identifying mark, will be sealed in an envelope and returned to the volunteer. Questions asked include simply: "Have you had a physical examination in the last year?" and "Have you stopped smoking?"

Answers to these questions will help the ACS plan its educational programs more effectively. Although many films and pamphlets now in current use are popular and recognizably effective, there are still people who have never heard of Cancer's Seven Danger Signals, or who do not understand the warnings that early diagnosis saves lives.

"These are the people we must reach," Dr. A. B. Goldston, president of the Texas ACS has explained. "But first we must find out which of our messages are getting through, and most important, which messages are really changing people's health habits."

Full cooperation of the citizens of McLean is urged by every member of the American Cancer Society board of directors.

After six weeks of orientation at the Foreign Service Institute in Arlington, Va., Myatt will leave for Tehran, Iran. He will work in establishing a government-wide computer, capacity, primarily with the Iranian statistical center.

For the past 20 months, Myatt has been director of data systems for the defense documentation in Alexandria, Va., where he supervised a multi-million dollar computer complex.

Prior to this assignment, Myatt was in Europe for several years with the defense department activities.

Myatt is married to the former Ivana Libertini of Rome, Italy. Mrs. Myatt and their son and daughter, Audra, 17, and Diana Lee, 13, will accompany him to Iran.

Clarendon College Gets Federal Aid For Work-Study

The office of Education of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Washington, D. C., announced on April 1 the approval of funds for the Federal College Work-Study Program for the fiscal year of July 1, 1966, through June 30, 1967.

Clarendon College received an allotment of \$43,665 from the program which was created under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, according to Mr. Vaughan, president of the college. This figure represents more than a 100% increase over last year and will open up some 60 to 70 jobs for students at the college. Job categories range from office and secretarial personnel to that of maintenance and grounds, both on campus and off campus. Applications are now being taken for both summer and fall job openings. Students who wish to work while attending college should write or call: Student Work-Study Representative, Clarendon College, Clarendon, Texas, to obtain information and to ascertain their eligibility to work under the federal program.

4-H Machinery Sale April 30 at Claude

The Armstrong County annual 4-H Club farm machinery sale will be held April 30 at Claude. FIX-IT TIP

Copper rust in sinks often is caused by dripping faucets and sometimes can be removed with ammonia and soapsuds or 5 per cent oxalic acid. Rinse away immediately, because if acid remains on enamel too long it will etch it.

Light iron rust stains can be removed with a cut lemon, oxalic acid or a 10 per cent solution of hydrochloric acid.

New Tax System May Eliminate Need for Estimate

The Internal Revenue Service has advised employees who file declarations of estimated tax that the new tax withholding system may eliminate the need to file an estimate for 1966. For those who still must file, the estimated tax payment required may be reduced.

Estimated tax declarations are generally required to be filed only when the estimated tax liability for the year exceeds income tax withheld by \$40 or more.

The new graduated withholding rates, signed into law on March 15, range from 14 to 30 per cent in separate rate schedules, for single persons and married persons.

The new rates apply to all paychecks received on or after May 1, 1966. This means that tax will have been withheld at the old rates for the first four months of this year and will be withheld at the new rates for the balance of 1966.

Single employees who earn more than \$5,000 a year and married persons who earn over \$10,000 will be particularly affected by the change in rates.

These are employees who normally would not have enough tax withheld under the old rates to cover their tax liability at the end of the year. Under the new system, tax withheld would be more in line with their tax liability.

Document 5642, a fact sheet explaining the new withholding system, will be helpful in figuring estimated tax, the IRS said. The fact sheet will be furnished in bulk to employers by early April. They will in turn distribute them to their employees. The fact sheet will also be available at IRS offices at that time.

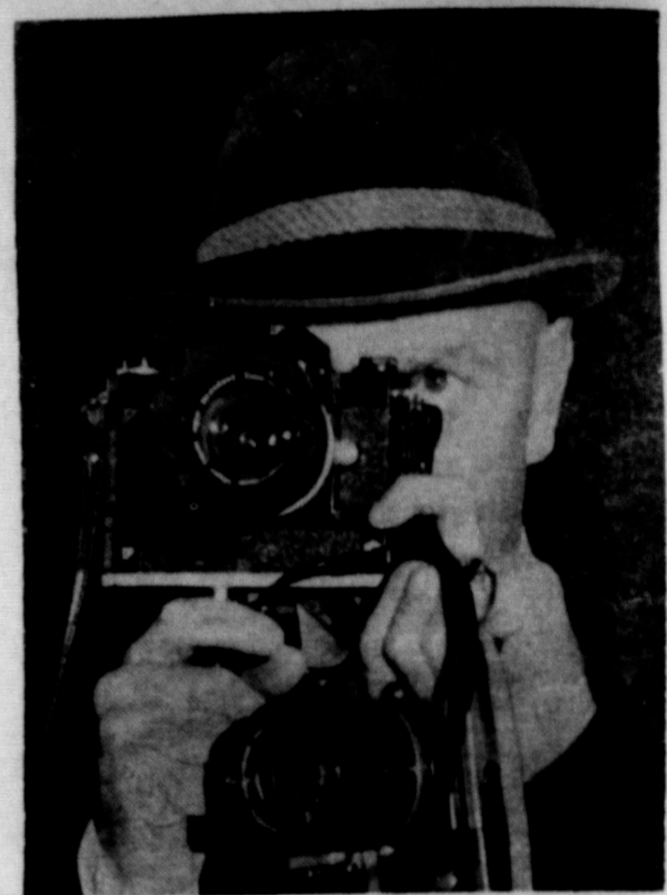
The fact sheet contains tables which show the amount of tax withheld on wages up to \$360 a week, under both the old and new withholding systems. It shows, for example, that a married man with a wife and two children who earns \$200 a week would have an additional withholding of \$2.40.

IRS suggested that those who have already filed estimates for 1966 and want to amend them should wait and make the change when the June 15 installment is due. The reverse side of the bill for the June 15 installment can be used to amend the estimate.

Accurate Returns Are Important

The automatic data processing of 1040 and 1040A returns for 1965 started on Jan. 1, 1966, in the Internal Revenue Service's Southwest Region, according to Ellis Campbell Jr., district director for IRS in northern Texas.

Campbell says the percentage of errors can be reduced if all taxpayers will see to it they file accurate and complete returns.

Be sure that you report your Social Security number correctly. It should be compared with your Social Security account card. Sometimes it is easy to transpose figures, thereby causing errors.

All taxpayers should read carefully the instructions in the returns package mailed to them and mathematical computations should be checked for accuracy.

A final check should always be made to assure that the return is properly signed. If a joint return is filed, both signatures must be

shown. All data in the return must be legible.

Automatic data processing of tax returns demands that accurate information be introduced into the system.

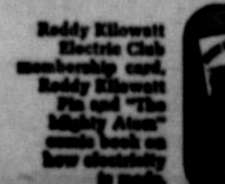

Last summer we completed a very intensive study of cattle feeding operations of different individuals that were feeding in both commercial feed lot as well as on farm feeding operations. We assisted several feeders in selecting equipment for on farm feeding. We made available to many prospective feeders information on feeding in both commercial feed lot and otherwise.

Recently we have visited with a number of these individuals that have gone into the cattle feeding business.

One of these individuals was Jess Coleman. Jess purchased a portable mixer-grinder to do his feeding. Recently I asked Jess the question, "What do you think of your mixer-grinder?" His reply was, "I paid for it on the first bunch of cattle I fed out."

We have had a tremendous increase in number of individuals that are feeding cattle for the first time. We personally thought last fall was a good time to load up with feeder cattle.

We still think there is no better place in the U.S. to feed cattle than in the Panhandle of Texas. We do not agree with many individuals when they say the best bet is the large commercial feed lot.

There are several on farm feeders in the McLean vicinity that are having excellent results.

Jimmy Allison has a very good demonstration on his father's place east of McLean. We believe there is room for many more such operations in the McLean vicinity.

Cost of the care, pens, water and windbreaks in a commercial feed

lot will run around \$3.25 per cwt. Feed cost varies depending on class of cattle and many other factors. Using the \$3.25 per cwt. cost for all services except feed, one could determine just what he could expect for his return on a 100 head operation.

Usually around 300 pounds could be put on most feeder cattle in 120 days. This would mean an individual would have a return of \$10.50 per head every 120 days just for care pens, windbreaks and watering facilities. In other words, when an individual that had cattle in a commercial feed lot, broke even on his operation, an on farm feeder would be getting a gross of \$10.50 per head for the services he was rendering.

I don't believe in signs, but if you do, I'd check my almanac very closely to see what it has to say about placing cattle in feed lot now. The long range trend is good in this area.

Presently the price of slaughter cattle doesn't justify the going price of replacement feeders.

In the next 90 days some observers believe there will be a \$2 drop in price of finished cattle.

I tend to agree with them after having reviewed a number of early year "cattle" on feed reports. Placements in January, February and March have been substantially above average.

The Things We Say

By Ruby Shannon

Probably the dirtiest name in the American language this year is "Jim Crow." With racial marches, sit-ins, and rioting—to say nothing of the civil rights laws being passed and enforced, to call a member of the Negro race "Jim Crow" would be like waving a red flag at a bull.

The term "Jim Crow" has been used for more than a century and until recent years it was a polite euphemism in Caucasian society. But like many euphemisms, the substitute word has become the thing, and the euphemism is now the dirty word.

The term "Jim Crow" came into popularity about 1830 because of the routine of a Negro dancer in a show. His act included a peculiar jump similar to a crow hopping, and soon the term was incorporated into a social game for children which went like this: "Wheel about and turn about and jump Jim Crow!" The dance was copied in minstrel shows, and before long, "Jim Crow" became a generic term for Negro.



By 1861, "Jim Crow" was in print on special railroad cars for Negroes. Later, this custom was replaced by special back seats on trains or buses and the word, "colored," but civil rights leaders have changed all that. "Jim Crow" was still printed on a car that ran from Boston to Salem as late as 1887.

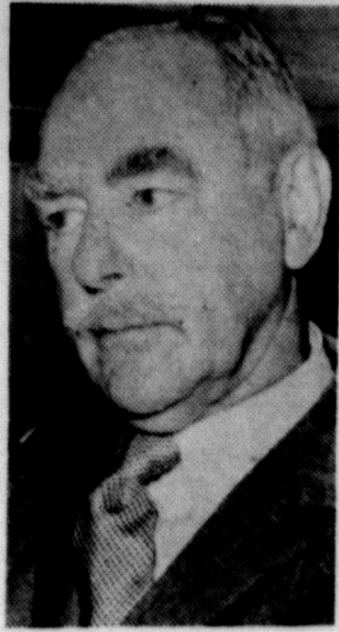

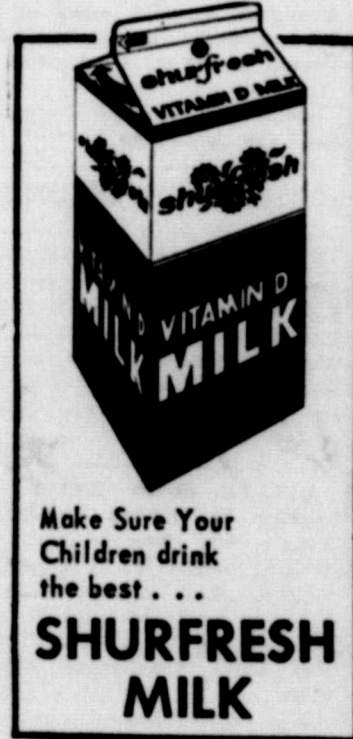
