You don't hear much about tabies in man because it But, says the State Health Department, the possibility of rabies is a continuing threat.
One reason is the existence of rabies in wild animals. Another is the unvaccinated pets which live with us and about us--and the strays around.
around
Last year's rabies report, Department' Bureau of Veter inary Public Health, showed a marked increase in the state's rabies totals. During 1974 there were nearly 400 laboratory confirmed animal rabies cases in Texas. This represents or a 46 per cent rise over the cases which occurred in 1973.
One big increase was in the While only seven dogs were found with rabies in 1973, his number jumped to near y 90 during 1974. In addi tion, nine cats were found we rabid.
With all the human expos ure associated with pets, is easy to understand why icials are concerned about having all pets protected against rabies.
Last year, to protect perons who may have come in contact with a rabid animal, the State Health Departmen over 1,000 series of antirabies treatments to people of Texas. This is one of the factors in the absence of rabies from humans. Health authorities are happy to point out that the last documented death due to natural exposure to rabies in Texas was in 1962. During 1972 one hum deabies virus but exposure was in a laboratory.
Of some 400 cases of rabies eported last year, over 200 cases were confirmed in exas wildife, nearly 100 cases were in pets and over 40 cases were in livestock. In wildlife, which showe a 24.3 per cent increase, skunks accounted for 132 35 cases and raccoons 10 cases. In addition, rabies was found in a bobcat, sum and ringtail. The oppo ssum diagnosed as rabid was the first case of rabies found in that species since 1965
when one case was diagnosed. Here 's something to consider about wildife. Often an animal widn the disease and come right up to them. and come right up to them. or picnicking should avoid any wild animals which act strangely. It could be rabic The 42 cases of rabies confirmed in livestock last year showed this breakdown cattle 26 cases, horses 12 cases, sheep two cases and goats two cases.
Rabies in livestock can be for both farmers and ranchers and for veterinarians. Some of the early symptoms of rabies may mimic other dis eases. Often in attempting to diagnose an animal's illness, a person will expose himself to rabies,
During 1974, rabies cases of the state, denoting its wide range from north to south and east to west.

Largest number of cases ty, where a large outbreak was repere a large outbreak was reported in canines. Of the 81 confirmed cases 75 were in dogs and cats. But that record was shattere last year despit ing program of picking up stray animals. During 1974 an average of 1500 unwante
animals per month were reanimals per month were re
moved from the streets. Rabies may be of little concern to the average per son these days, but to your State Health Department, local health departments and veterinarians it still re mains a serious matter. can do your part to insure the safety of your family an vaccinated against this dis ease.
