Governor John Connally warned Texans this week that failure to vote and attend precinct conventions Saturday, May 7, could re. sult in a takeover of the state Democratic party by a minority

"Frankly, a small, militant group of people is trying this year to take over the Democratic party of Texas for their own purposes,' Connally said. "The only way to prevent this is for conscientious citizens to turn out in mass at the polls and at their neighborhood precinct conventions to make sure that the voice of the majority continues to shape our party and government.

recently C.W. Harder pointed out that farm income in 1964 when total national income was \$509 billion dollars was \$21/2 billion less than 14 years previously when the total national income was less than half the 1964 level. Yet food prices are higher.

Or it can be stated another way. In 1948 wages and sal-aries accounted for 60.4% of the national income, and fringe benefits another 2.6%, for a total of 63%. By 1964 wages and salaries had jumped to 64.8% while fringe benefits had al-most tripled to account for 6.2% of the national income. This then totalled 71%, for an increase of 8%, of which about half is accounted for by fringe middle class is to be preserved, benefit increases.



The Things We Say

The word demagogue has a similar history. "Demos" meant people, so a demagogue originally was a leader of the people. In time, it took on a new connotation when leaders became corrupt or were evil. A demagogue then became an agitator, leading people . . . but in a different direction from the straight and narrow path.

TARDY TAX RETURNS

Early one April, leaving home on an extended business trip, a man handed his wife their income tax returns.

"Remember to mail these before the 15th," he said.

She did remember-two months later. When the government added a penalty for tardiness, the man protested that it had been "just an innocent mistake." But in a court test, the penalty was upheld. The court said tax returns are too important a duty to be so lightly overlooked.

There is good reason for the annual scramble by taxpayers to get their returns in before the deadline. The penalty can be stiff -5% per month, up to 25% of the total tax.

To be sure, some excuses are good enough to ward off a penalty. You will be forgiven if your tardiness was due to what the law calls "reasonable cause."

In one case, the tax collector had no record of having received a man's return at all. Yet, evidence proved that it had been deposited in the post office on time, in a properly stamped, properly addressed envelope. A court held that no penalty for tardiness could be imposed.

"This would not be the first time," observed the judge, "that a collector had lost a return."

In another case, both the taxpayer and his attorney—the only other party familiar with the situation-were totally incapacitated by illness at tax time. Again: no penalty

But lesser excuses won't do. For example, prior illness, not incapacitating as of tax time, does not justify a late return.

Nor does the mere fact that you don't happen to like the way the government is spending your money. Thus, penalties for tardiness were imposed on a businessman who resented Uncle Sam's "wasteful" habits, and on a minister who didn't want his money spent for war.

Why is the government so strict? That question was raised by a man who blamed his tardiness on the fact that other expenses had left him short of money. The court gave him this reply:

"True, such situations may require sacrifice, but the government ive, but taxes must be paid if governments are to endure."




