June means a lot of things to a lot of people, and to the cotton industry, June is the month for the first bale df 1975 cotton to be ginned. The bale is produced in the Lower Rio Grande Valley during the month of June. And while Valley farmers are waiting for the first bale of cotton other cotton farmers throughout the state are planting their 1975 crop.

Cotton farmers are also looking for signs to better days for cotton. And some cotton industry spokesmen are seeing rays of hope ahead. For example, they point to reduced cotton acreages in this nation and abroad, which they say will lower the projections of carryover for cotton. But the best sign is the economic recovery.

Some economists believe the re eision has bottomed out, and that the economy-includ ng zotton-will begin showing improvements during the latter part of this year. The textile industry has been especially hard hit by the recession, but indications are that better and brighter things are in store in the coming months.

Meanwhile, cotton planting for the state is now more than 50 per cent completed which compares favorably with last year's schedule. Some fields, as usual, will have to be replanted due to hail and floods.
