Of course, the "light" bill is no longer just for lights. We have electric air conditioning, television sets, radios, kitchen appliances, electric water heaters, and many other items in addition to our lighting.

I don't believe the energy crisis really hits home until you see a bill like that. We promptly turned off the central air conditioning unit, and lectured the children on saving electricity.

The next morning when I went to check with Pat Durham, SPS' very efficient secretary in McLean, I discovered that there was an error in my bill, which she had already caught and

corrected. But I'm glad the incident happened, because I learned two things: first, that there may come a time when our lifestyle will have to change because of creasing energy costs, an

Irish Stun Tigers With 40 Point Win

Shamrock's Fighting Irish stunned McLean with five firsthalf touchdowns Friday night and went on to hand the Tigers their second straight shutout of the young season, 40-0, at McLean's Duncan Field.

The Tigers fell to a 0-2 record as Shamrock denied them their first score of the year. The speedy Irish claimed their first victory of 1979 after losing to Class B Wheeler 25-7 in their opener. McLean was edged by Chillicothe in its first contest,

Although the Tigers' 151 yards total offense almost doubled their output against Chillicothe, they were unable to reach the Shamrock goal. Mc-Lean's passing attack was particularly ineffective against the Irish, as the Tigers completed an astonishing one aerial in 16 attempts, that a 15-yarder from Randy Suggs to Timmy Killham.

The McLean defense, which had been stingy in two scrim-mages and held Chillicothe to 78 total yards, was porous in the first half as Shamrock's speed took its toll. Clark Pritchard's 10-yard touchdown run in the initial period was followed only a few minutes later by a 30-yard scoring pass from Stewart Miller to Terry Sims.



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




Cubs Romp Over Miami

Foreign-Owned

Since March foreigners have bought 53,002 acres of Texas farmland valued at nearly \$27.3 million, according to a U.S. Department of Agriculture report.

Five of the transactions ranged from \$1.2 million to nearly \$3.5 million.

During the last session the Texas House of Representatives narrowly rejected a proposal that would have required more accurate registration of foreign-owned agricultural land in the state.

Garcia Named

Last week Speaker of the House Bill Clayton named San Antonio representative Matt Garcia to the Appropriations Committee. Garcia, a member of the Mexican-American caucus, replaces former State Rep. Jim Clark who resigned in the spring to become mayor of Pasadena.

but early diagnosis and treatment are helping to lengthen lives. Today, 50 percent of C/F patients can be expected to live past age 19, where once few survived to school age.

He made the statement in announcing the fourth annual Postal Consumer Protection Week which is being held nationwide and in the McLean area, September 24-29, to increase public awareness of fraud and misrepresentation by mail.

The promotional material of most mail-order companies is above board," Simpson said. "But we want to know about those who, intentionally or unintentionally, make less than accurate claims that confuse and falsely raise the hopes of many people." One of the most vicious

home-cure schemes this year involved the Midwest Health Research Clinic at Kansas City, Mo., which peddled by mail all over the nation a "Health Bible Handbook" and "colonic treatment kit.

Postal Inspectors found Midwest did not really operate a clinic, nor did it do any health

What it did was make some wild claims for its so-called health handbook. "In this book you will find a cure through scientific preventive solutions for the forty diseases and illnesses listed on the next page ... " The handbook sold by mail for \$9.95.

The investigation by Postal Inspectors traced Midwest to a rundown one-room office across from a massage parlor where the book--actually a 25-page pamphlet--was readied for mailing. The primary purpose of the pamphlet was to induce the reader to make a second purchase of a "colonic treatment kit" for \$29.95.

Moving swiftly, Postal In-spectors and Postal Service attorneys obtained a Federal Court order under their civil jurisdiction stopping the delivery of mail containing thousands of dollars in orders addressed to Midwest until it could be determined if the products were misrepresented. At the same time, the results of their investigation were turned over to a U.S. Attorney, who decided that the operator of Midwest had criminal intent in defrauding consumers and business taken in by the scheme.



Bicyclist Visits McLean On Cross Country Journey

Riding a bicycle from San Francisco to New York might seem like the adventure of a lifetime, unless you are Kevin Kelly of Westfield, N.J.

Kelly stopped in McLean Thursday night on his 5000 mile trek by bicycle across the country, and because of rain all day Friday, wound up spending two nights in the town and attending the McLean-Shamrock game Friday night.

Although riding a bicycle that far is a unique experience, Kelly has undertaken nothing but unusual experiences for the last several years. By trade a graphic artist and photographer, the 27-year-old man has spent four years traveling in the Himalayas, where he shot over 30,000 slides with the idea of writing a book about the region.

He began travelling after attending a year of college at the University of Rhode Island, following his 1970 graduation from high school.

His travels have taken him to England, where he took a month-long walking tour. to Japan, Korea, Afghanistan, India, and Iran in addition to his stay in the Himalayas.

While in Iran, he worked as a graphic artist for Bell-Helicopter, helping with the company's newspaper which was published for the Americans in Iran.

He said that he originally worked strictly as an artist, but as the war in Iran progressed,

He was among the group of Americans who were taken to the Tehran Hilton for their final night in Iran, and he was on the last plane out of the country.

Kelly said he never actually feared for his life until the last night in Iran, when the American Embassy had fallen and the large group of Americans were gathered in the hotel.

We slept on the floor away from the windows, because someone kept shooting through the windows all night," he said. During his travels in foreign countries, he has witnessed many unusual events, including a Tibetan funeral. He was also one of the few foreigners who witnessed the gathering of 13 million Indians for a high holy day in India. According to Kelly, it was the largest crowd ever gathered in one spot in the

history of civilization. He also watched a game of 'goat ball'' in Afghanistan.

The players, mounted on thicknecked horses, try to carry a goat carcass stuffed with sand around a pole and drop it into a circle. The game is played with as many as 250 horsemen, all riding full speed. The winner of the game is usually rewarded with money by a rich sponsor. Kelly said that men have been killed playing the game, although there were no serious injuries during the game he watched.





WINDBREAK SEEDLINGS:

The Texas Forest Service has announced that they are accepting applications for windbreak seedlings. Interested applicants should send orders in early because the tree species are limited and are sold on first come, first served basis.

This year, seedlings for this area will come from a new tree nursery at Lubbock. Therefore, they will be better adapted to our climatic conditions.

Because of the new facility, they encountered some difficulty in their equipment and their bare root hardwood species are very limited. Bare root trees available include Honeylocust, Native Plum, Russian Olive and Sawtooth Oak. You need to order 100 bareroot trees, but they are available in multiples of fifty. Their conifers Austrian Pine, Ponderosa Pine and Redcedar did good and they are available in styrofoam containers, in multiples of thirty

The trees you order will picked up by you in Amarillo, March 18th, 1980 at the Soil Conservation Service, 1416 W. Eighth.

The conifers are priced at \$30 per 30 trees and the bareroot hardwoods are priced at \$20 per 100.

Application blanks are available in the County Extension Office, Courthouse Annex, Pampa.
