First I would like to take this means of expressing my sincere thanks to everyone for the fine cooperation that you have given your Council and me. It makes our job a lot easier with your help. May we never have the trouble that so often is encountered in other communities.

It is my plan and desire to keep the citizens of this community posted on what your City Government is doing and is planning to do. This is your town and we are doing our very best to govern it as you would have us do.

As it appears now, there will have to be some adjustments made in some of our rates. We trust the rate changes will not be too drastic; but for instance, in our Refuse Department our income is about one-half of our expense. A new packer truck will cost about \$12,000.00, and we are in need of one now. Our gas wells are down in production to where we have to buy a large amount of gas during the winter months, and it may be necessary to raise the gas rates in the near future.

Harry Tate Competes At National Meet

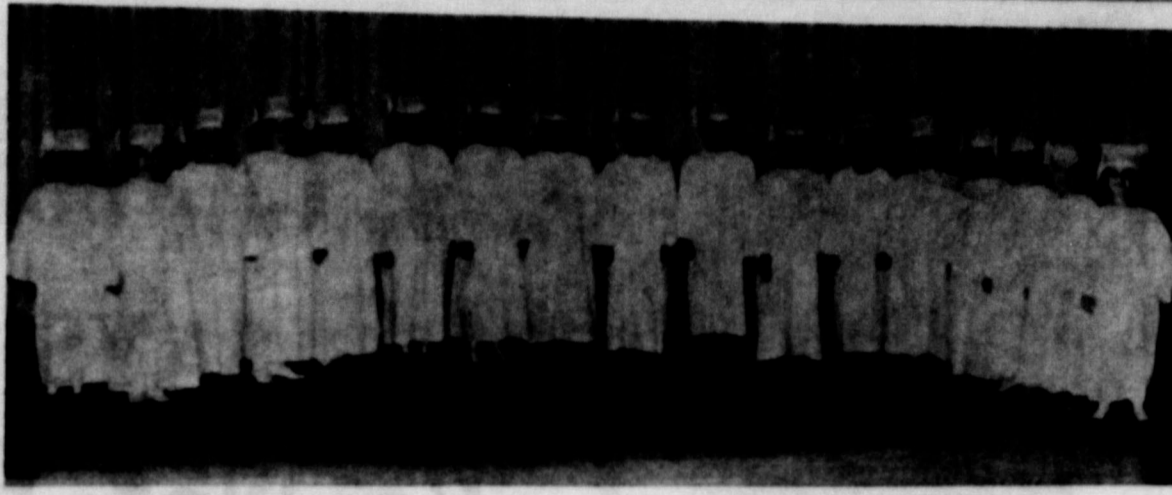
Harry Tate, a 1965 graduate of McLean High School, was one of 10 Lubbock Christian College track men competing in the National Junior College meet May 20, 21.

Statements By County Judge Candidates In Saturday Runoff

Two run-off races will be decided Saturday by Gray County voters.

Voters in this county will go to the polls to determine the race between Crawford Martin and Franklin Spears for attorney general, and for the highly contested race between incumbent Bill Craig and A. J. Carubbi Jr. of Pampa for Gray County Judge.

In McLean, the election will be held in the city hall, with the polls opening at 8 a.m. and closing at 7 p.m. Charles Cousins will be the election judge.

Two Graduate From Lubbock Christian

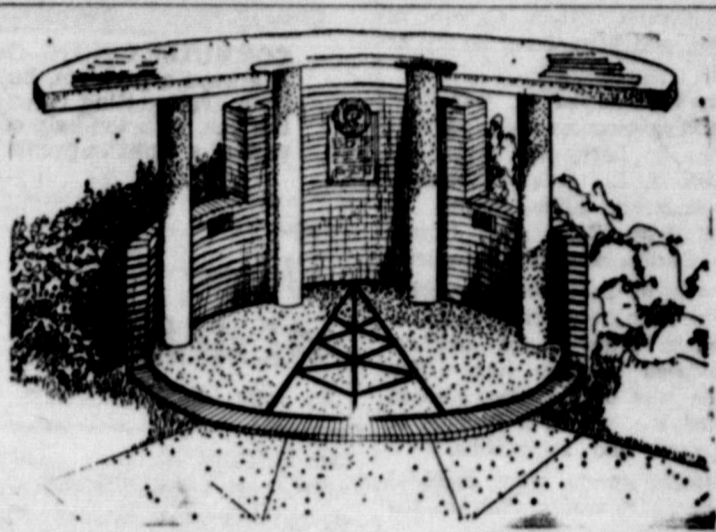
Two McLean students were graduated from Lubbock Christian College May 27 with Associate in Applied Arts degrees.

Graveside services for Archie McEachern, who died at his home in Mena, Ark., Saturday, were held at 11 a.m. Tuesday at Alameda Cemetery.

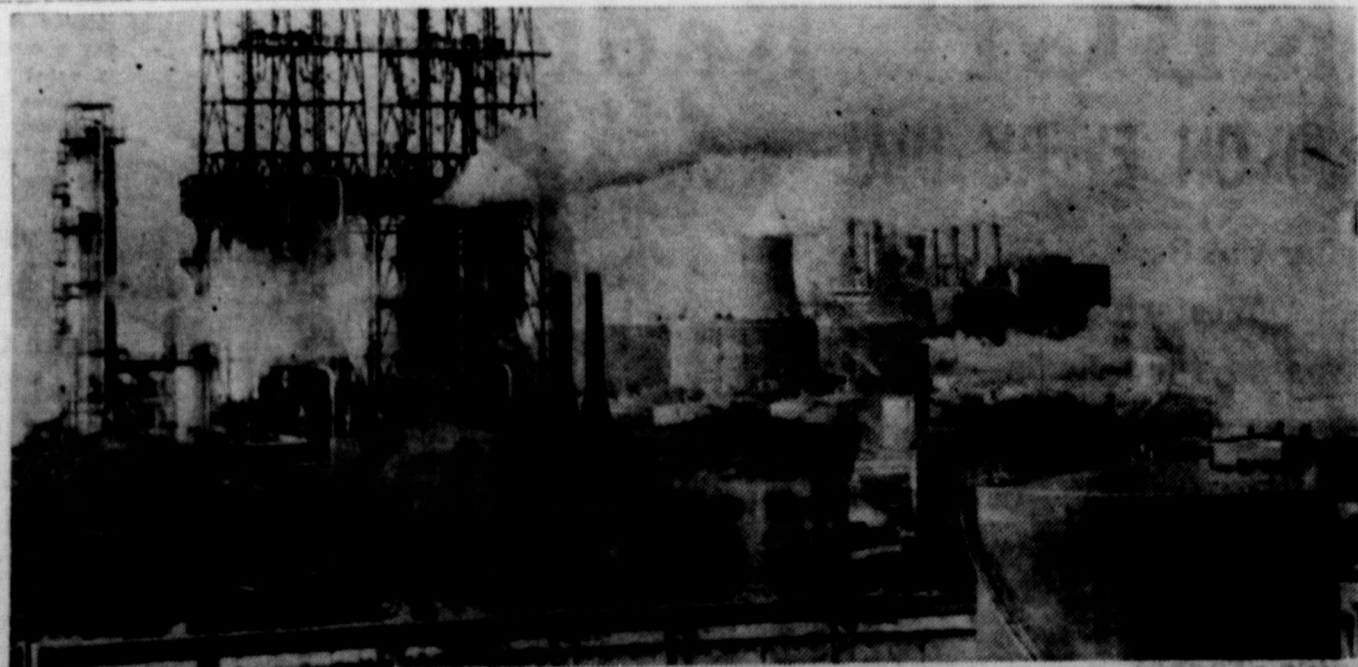
Officiating was Rev. David Thomas, minister of the McLean Presbyterian Church. Burial was under direction of Lamb Funeral Home of McLean.

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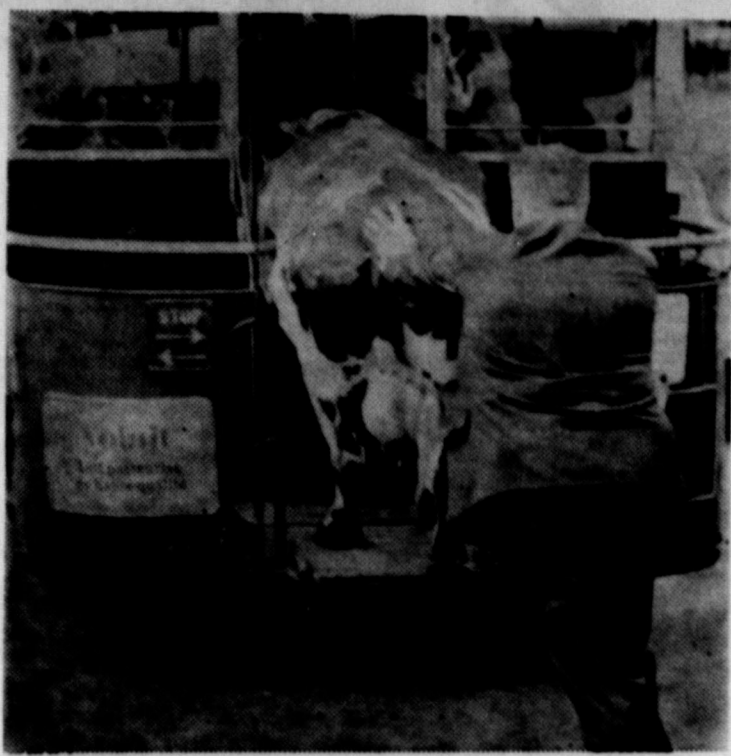

1. THE INCUMBENT COUNTY JUDGE HAS CONSISTENTLY IGNORED THE NEEDS OF THE PEOPLE OF THIS PART OF GRAY COUNTY. AS FAR BACK AS AUGUST 8, 1963, THE EDITOR OF THE McLEAN NEWS WROTE THIS:

Just Between Us—by the Editor
In this column last week, we noted that nothing apparently had been done to move the McLean hospital project toward the construction since Gray County voters approved the \$150,000 bond issue early in July.
Actually, last Thursday—the day the News appeared—the county commissioners court did, indeed, take action.
Our commissioner, Truitt Johnson, telephoned Thursday night to report that the court had set the sale of bonds for 2 p.m. Aug. 26.
Now if the court will hire an architect to prepare the final plans, the project can move right along . . . and we will be happy.
It would appear, however, that County Judge William J. Craig—with his customary "Pampa Yes, McLean No" attitude, will continue to force the McLean News to dig for any information it wishes to print on the subject.

the Pampa paper.
A legal publication also is required announcing the forthcoming sale of the bonds. You can easily guess where it, too, will be published, if it hasn't already been.
Then, when bids are invited on the construction of the hospital in McLean . . . not in Pampa . . . it is a safe bet that the legal publication will find its way to the Freedom Chain representative in Pampa, as well.

We don't like it, but that's the way it is with the Judge. He is quite consistent in his dealings for the county.

Almost since the day we came to McLean three years ago, we have attempted to get this point across to the Judge and other county officials: McLean is just as much a part of Gray County as Pampa.

In fact, the only visit we ever paid to Craig's office was to discuss this very subject. Why, we asked, are the business people of McLean ignored when county business is passed out?

There was the expected half-hearted denial, and pressing the point further was in vain.

We were advised to contact the individual county officers.

Knowing more about the lack of county business at the McLean News than anywhere else here, we wrote County Clerk Charlie Thut and later discussed the same subject with the veteran clerk over the telephone.

That informed us that he turns the list of printing, office supply

and office furniture needs over to the Judge, who—the clerk thought—asked for bids.

Truitt Johnson can never remember seeing any such bids opened in a commissioners court meeting.

So who is getting this thousands of dollars per year worth of business?

By law, bids are not required before the commissioners court purchases anything costing \$2,000.00 or less. Frankly, we don't approve of this figure, for this is one big wad of money for any county official to spend without letting the public know it is to be spent.

A limit of \$500 or less would be better, in our opinion. But the Texas Legislature has set the \$2,000.00 figure.

Back to the subject at hand . . .

After talking with the County Clerk, we wrote the Judge to advise him what Thut had said. In the letter, we wrote that we weren't begging for county business; we felt we were entitled to some consideration, and it was our intention to get that consideration.

This was possibly some two months ago. To this day we have not received an answer.

If Judge Craig doesn't desire to discuss the matter further with us, a letter to The McLean News addressed to the public would be welcome. We would be most happy to publish such a letter without charge.

Of course, if he doesn't feel an explanation is due, he can choose to forget the whole thing . . . but we won't!

HEY, WHAT'S GOING ON:

Newspapermen and the public begin to wonder what's going on when it becomes difficult to obtain news from taxpayer financed public offices.

Right now we are thinking about the Gray County Commissioners Court, headed by County Judge Bill Craig. Maybe nothing is going on, but it sure is rough for a news reporter to get information.

Maybe it was just poor reporting (we don't think so) that it took The News more than two months to learn that members of the commissioners court on Sept. 15 voted themselves nice little fat increases in salary and no mention of it was made.

The reason we don't think it was just poor reporting is because try-

ing to cover a county commission meeting is a little like trying to break the bank at Monte Carlo. The odds against you are too great.

Although there are set times for the judge and commissioners to meet, these dates are not always adhered to. If a newsman asks what's coming up at a meeting he happens to learn about, the stock answer usually is, "nothing except paying the monthly bills."

Nine times out of ten when a reporter attends a meeting, the bills are paid and the commission "adjourns." However, on many occasions reporters have dropped back later and found the commission in session again. That always is a bit puzzling.

The Pampa School Board and the Pampa City Commission both send news reporters an advance copy of the agenda for their meet-

ings. The county judge says this would be difficult to do because he doesn't always know what is going to be on the agenda.

Somehow or other one can't help suspecting that the judge and the commissioners would know in advance that they planned to raise their salaries at the next meeting.

The county judge says he has nothing to hide. But, neither has he any information to give out except under pointed questioning. Then the answers are not always crystal clear. There are others who wonder about the manner in which the county commissioners court is operated. The newspaper does have the judge's word that he will endeavor to keep the public informed. It is hoped it will be by advance word to reporters. This would give the public a chance to know what's going on, too.

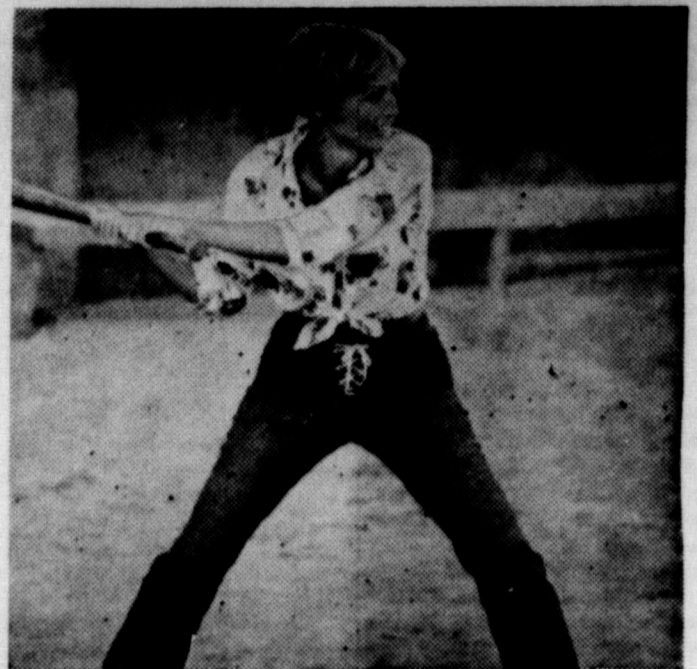

Spice CABINET

CHILI CON CARNE
1 pound ground beef
1 onion, sliced
2 cloves of garlic, diced
2 teaspoons chili powder or to taste
Salt and pepper
1 No. 303 can kidney beans
1 No. 303 can tomatoes
Brown ground beef. Add the onion, garlic and cook for a few minutes. Add tomatoes and beans and season to taste with chili powder, paprika and salt. Cook slowly for about 1/2 to 1 hour or until the mixture thickens. Stir occasionally to prevent sticking to the pan.

FIX-IT TIP

In refinishing painted wood furniture, be sure to countersink nails that have worked outward, fill nail holes with plastic wood and sand out rough spots and areas where the grain has swollen from dampness. Clean the piece thoroughly with a strong washing solution. After it's dry, dust and paint it. Use a hard gloss enamel, never an exterior house paint. The painted surface of your metal furniture may be scratched and chipped. Take off all the paint. Use a paint solvent and scraping tool to bare the metal, then follow it up with steel wool to remove all rust. Next put on a metal undercoat and gloss enamel.

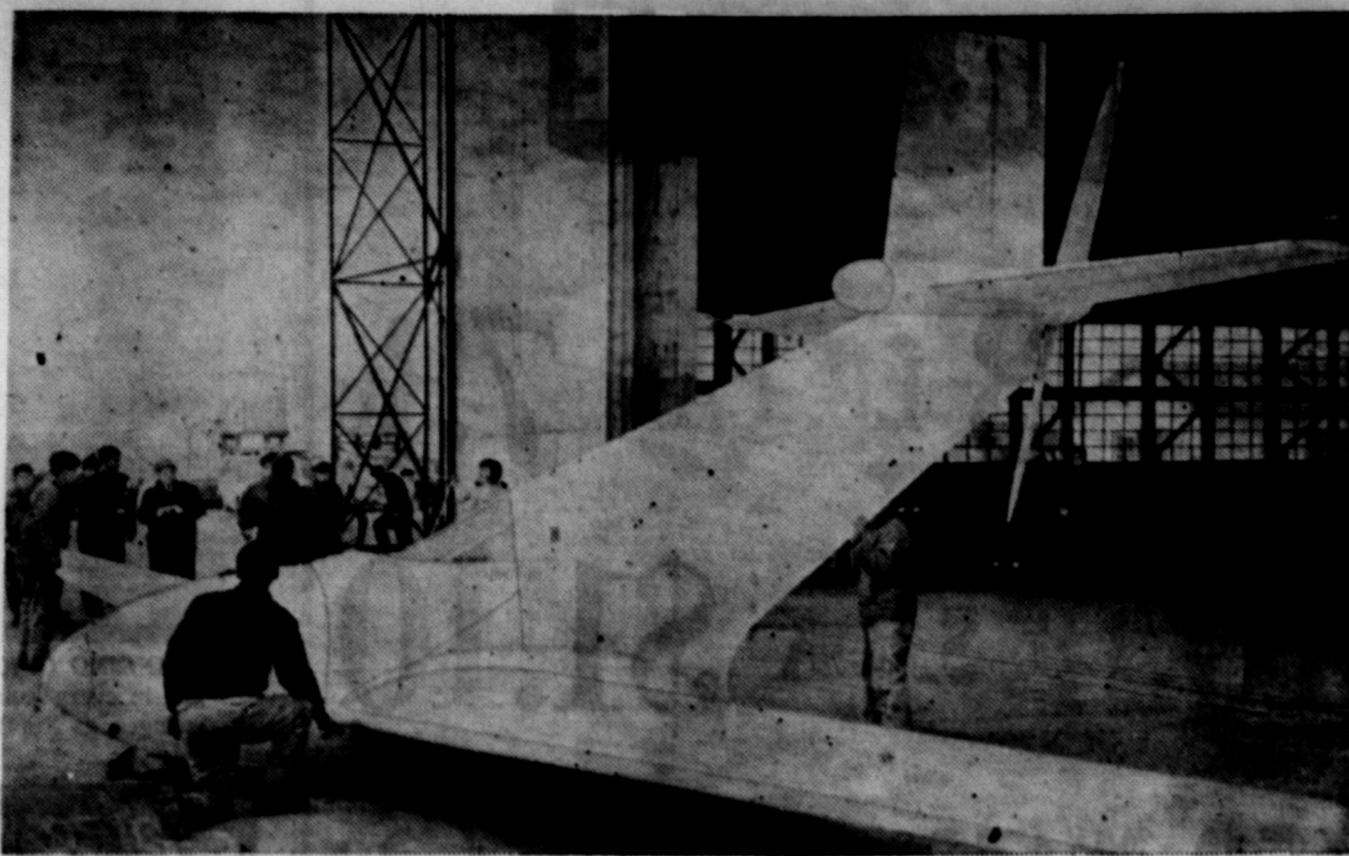

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

By LYNN McDANIEL

Many people think of conserving the soil by building terraces, ponds or other engineering practices. This is conservation, but the best conservation is management.

Deferred grazing is one of the best management practices for rangeland to increase the stand of grass and to allow the present grass to increase its vigor. Deferred grazing is the removal of all livestock for a period of time during the growing season. This could be for three months or for

the full growing season. One of the better systems is the deferred-rotation grazing system. Deferred-rotation grazing can be adapted to any ranch with two or more equal pastures and the pastures are deferred systematically during the year. Experiments have shown this system increases calf crop, weaning weights and carrying capacity of the rangeland.

Kent Philpott, S. W. Corbin and George Philpott are installing underground pipeline to aid in better distribution of irrigation water.

Harris King has been shaping several draws and blow-out areas on his farm north of McLean.

J. J. Railsback, George Philpott and Pete Seitz have been sowing grass.

Surveying progress on McClellan Creek is going at a good pace. We estimate that about 40% of the surveying has been completed and the plan is about 40% completed.

QUESTIONS & A

Q—I receive monthly compensation payments from VA for a service-connected injury. A portion of my payment is for my son who becomes 18 years of age next month. If he remains in school after 18, will I continue to draw this extra income for him?

A—As long as your child remains unmarried and in school, except for normal summer vacation periods, you will continue to receive an extra allowance for him until he is 23 years old. Payment of this extra allowance would cease, however, in the event your son completes his education, drops

out of school, or marries before reaching the age of 23.

Q—Do veterans need to attain age 65 before they are eligible for pension from the Veterans Administration?

A—A veteran of wartime service may be eligible for pension at any age if he can prove permanent disability and unemployment, subject to income limitations.

Q—My husband is a veteran of World War II and he has a service-connected disability of 100%. What benefits does he have when one of his family needs hospitalization?

A—The Veterans Administration does not provide hospitalization for the dependents of veterans.

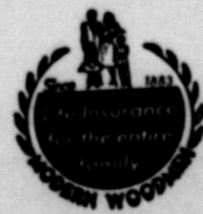
