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If you notice the advertisement in this issue of the paper concerning Gray County's finances, you may notice that the County ended the year with a whopping balance of \$4,251, 443.29. I called A.C. Malone, the very helpful Gray County auditor, to inquire about the reason for the huge balance. I don't like to see a governmental body with that much left-over money, when they could lower taxes or even give refunds to the taxpayers, but Mr. Malone explained that most of that large balance came from the leasing of Highland General Hospital which brought in over \$2 million to the county funds.

The county is keeping the funds on hand because the state has not told Gray County exact-

However, I think it is a good idea to keep an eye on the county budget. If the balance is as large next year as it was this year, we should begin pushing for a tax cut!

The voter registration in Texas can-vertainly be confusing to a newcomer to our state. Some of the changes in the law are even confusing to someone who has lived here a long time.

You do not need to register each year. Once you have registered in Texas, your registration is good from then on. HOWEVER, if you have moved or if you are in a different voting precinct because of the county redistricting effective in January, you'd better check on your registration.

About three weeks ago the County Assessor's office sent cards to all legally registered voters. IF YOU DID NOT GET ONE, CHECK WITH JACK BACK'S OFFICE IN PAMPA. You may not be registered to vote, and your vote is very important this year.

If you are new in town, yo may register to vote at the City Office with Pat Bailey. But you should do that as soon as possible so that all the necessary paperwork gets done in plenty of time to get your name on the rolls to vote in the



## ELECTIONS IMPORTANTI

One of the responsibilities of a newspaper is to keep the public informed on issues concerning government and politics. In this election year, it is essential that all citizens exercise their right to vote, and the citizenry should be well-informed about candidates and the offices for which they are running

In an effort to keep our readers informed, we thought you should know what salaries the offices pay which are up for

grabs in the coming elections. In Gray County, several offices will be filled, and the salaries for those offices are certainly not inconsequential. The district attorney (who is paid by the state of Texas) draws \$31,000 per year in salary. He also receives \$1,000 per county per year for office expenses, travel allowance and other incidentals. The District

Attorney for Gray County serves four other counties. The sheriff of Gray County recives \$16,884.60 per year plus

22 cents per mile for mileage. The current sheriff also lives in a county-owned apartment with the utilities paid by the county.

Commissioners in Gray County receive \$11,093.72 salary plus \$150 per month travel allowance.

The Gray County Attorney receives \$16,855.56 salary per

The Tax Assessor-Collector receives \$17,215.56 per year. Constables in Gray County receive \$9,348.96 salary per year, plus 22 cents per mile travel allowance. In 1979, the constable for precinct 4 received \$5,811 for travel allowance (or 2,200 miles driven per month based on 22 cents per mile).

The Justices of the Peace in Gray County receive \$9,803.14 plus 22 cents per miles travel allowance. (The current justice of the peace for precinct 4 rarely claims any travel allowance, according to county records.(

In addition to these salaries, some of the offices carry appointive privileges. For exam ple, the deputies in the county are appointed by the sheriff, with some deputies receiving \$12,000 per year salary and an additional \$4,500 to \$5,000 per year in travel allowance.

So county elections are im portant. You will be electing people who will receive large mounts of your tax money. It is your responsibility as a citizen of the county to investigate each candidate and elect the sent time. best possible person for each

Ballengee also said that based on existing rates being charged to all Texas retail customers, SPS projected re-venues for 1979 will be less than the cost of service to those customers by \$42,657,065.00.

The 14.78 percent increase is an average for all types or classes of customers. The increase will vary from one rate class to another. For example, a customer that uses 500 units of electrical energy per month would have an increase of \$5.43 per month.

The increase in rates would not affect the rates charged to wholesale power customers.

The last base rate increase in Southwestern's rates for retail service was based on 1977 costs and went into effect in October 1978 and amounted to about 7






#### **Turkey produces** quick turn-around


