Board Rehires All Teachers

The McLean school board met in regular session Monday night to approve the school calendar for 1980-81 and hire instructional personnel for the

Before going into executive session to discuss personnel, the board approved checks for February, the financial statement, the tax assessor's report, and the cafeteria report.

The board approved a calen-dar for the 1980-81 school year which calls for teachers to begin work Aug. 19 with the first day of school set for Aug. 25. Sept. 1 will be Labor Day vacation, and Nov. 7 will be a holiday for students and teachers.

Thanksgiving holidays are Nov. 27 and 28 with Christmas and New Years Holidays set for Dec. 22 through Jan. 2. The semester will end Jan. 15, and Jan. 16, Feb. 27, and March 13 have been reserved for teacher in-service days.

Easter holidays will be April 17, 20, 21, with the end of school May 22.

In other business the fee for driver's education was raised to \$50 per student. Joe Riley and Vester Joiner will teach the driver's ed program.

The board went into executive session, and then reopened the meeting to the public for the hiring of teachers.

The board discussed salary increases, and noted that in a three-year period, state salary increases for teachers have risen 14 percent while cost of goods and services has risen 33 percent and cost of items such as utilities has risen 48 percent. The board voted to give teachers who were receiving \$50 above the state pay scale an increase to \$250 above state

The board also noted that all teachers are hired subject to

assignment. all hired subject to assignment. They are Joe Riley. teacher and coach at \$2500 above state; Jerry Cook, as math teacher and assistant coach with \$500 above for math and \$1500 above for coach: Vester Joiner as teacher and coach at \$2500 above; and Jack Dorsett as teacher and head football coach at \$3000 above.

WINDFALL TAX UNFAIR!

Texans should join together in praying that someday the eastern and northern states will discover some sort of commodity or resource that will be in short supply in the rest of the world, because with the passage of the windfalls profits tax on oil almost a certainty, the power bases in the east and north have set a dangerous precedent.

The oil-producing states, the oil companies and royalty owners were finally told that the price of oil and natural gas would be decontrolled and allowed to rise to world levels. but with the carrot of decontrol. President Carter and the Congress are planning to institute the "stick" of the windfall profits tax.

For years Texans and residents of other oil-producing states have been pumping out their resources for the good of the country, and by law, have been selling their gas at cheaper prices to non-oil producing states than Texans have had to pay! The windfall profits tax just adds insult to injury as far as I am concerned.

Now United States oil producers will be able to charge the same amount the OPEC countries have been charging United States users for oil and gas, but our own countrymen will be changed anywhere from 60 to 70 percent taxes on their profits, while the OPEC countries pay no taxes whatsoever on their profits.

Sound unfair to you? It does to me, too, but the non-oil producing states are so afraid that Texas, Louisiana, and other oil states will gain a big advantage, that they are willing to impose this horrendous tax

Every new law sets a precedent, and this one is no exception. Today the oil companies and the oil states will suffer, but who knows who will be next?

With this kind of a law for a precedent, the Congress may omeday decide to place a huge

tax on homeowners who sell inflation, clear a large profit on them. Or Congress may decide to place a windfall profits tax on someone who gets a large salary increase

In the long run, everything usually balances out, sooner or later Texas will have the opportunity to remind the energy-hungry states of the north and east what they did to us on the windfall profits tax. Oil-states senators and congressmen were able to keep an exemption in the compromise bill which will exempt all state and local government royalties from the windfall profits tax, and some national columnists are already beginning to worry about what the oil states may decide to do with this huge

amount of money. The four largest producing states - Alaska, Texas, California, and Louisiana - will collect \$127.6 billion in new revenues over the next ten vears. Some fear that the oil states will form a new oil cartel and use their windfall to eliminate the state sales tax and provide new enticements to lure business away from non-oil

producing states

Of course, this can't happen in Texas without a constitutional amendment because almost all state royalty income is dedicated to public education. as is one-fourth of oil tax revenues. The other 75 percent of oil tax collections are earmarked for things like farm roads, medical and children's assistance, highways, teacher retirement, and general reve-

nue purposes. Although the state government may be helped by price decontrol, the oil companies and royalty owners will definitely be hurt. It will be interesting to see what decontrol and the windfall profits tax does to Texas over the next ten years. but you can bet that Texans will remember the travesty of the windfall profits tax.

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

Chicken Pox Is A Threat Now!

By mid-February 145 more chickenpox cases had been reported to the Texas Department of Health than during the same time last year. Since this heighly infectious disease usually occurs during winter and early spring. Texas may expect more cases before the outbreak subsides, the Texas Medical Association says. The asociation is urging parents to help control this problem by keeping the chickenpox victim isolated for at least six days after the first blisters appear.

People catch the disease during the infectious stage from virus in droplets from the victim's nose and throat or by contact with contaminated clothing. Although mainly a childhood disease, adults who never have had chickenpox can get it unless they have had the disease already. Having it once almost always makes a person immune. Symptoms may not appear

until two or three weeks after exposure to the disease. Then 24-36 hours before the first skin signs appear, mild headache, fever and fatigue may overtake the victim. The contagious stage starts at this time and lasts until about six days after the first blisters appear.

Early skin symptoms can imitate allergic rashes, insect bites or other skin problems. But in 24-48 hours they develop into the characteristic itchy, clear, often oozy chickenpox. Two to four crops of blisters appear within two to six days of each other and can show up anywhere on the body, including the inside of the mouth. Most appear on the chest and back.

Keeping victims isolated while they are contagious is important because there is no vaccine and nothing can be done to shorten the length of

Something can be done to relieve itching and possible side effects. Wet compresses and baking soda baths (add about 1/2 cup to a bathtub) will help relieve most itching. Gar-gling with salt water will soothe blisters in the mouth. Severe itching may require treatment by a physician.

A doctor also should be consulted if blisters become infected and run pus. Although other complications may occur occasionally, infected blisters are the most common complications of the disease. To prevent scarring from scratching and blisters, the patient's fingernails should be kept short clean. The patient also should be bathed regularly to decrease the possibility of infecting the blisters.

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

We urge the Commissioners Court to use its power and influence to urge these officials to coordinate their activities so that an officer is on patrol each night of the weekend.

We feel that if the officers are on patrol on a regular basis, and give some tickets with appropriate fines for repeat offenders, that our problems will be quickly resolved.
