Constable J.D. Fish was called in to investigate.



#### **Observe Early Warning** Signs Of Drug Abuse

An American tragedy which is occuring with more frequency is the death of a youngster because of drug overdose. Not only do many die, but an even greater number are condemned to the living death of the hopeless

When the victim of drug abuse is a teenager or young adult, parents universally utter the anguished cry "What did we do wrong?

Now researchers are trying to answer that question, and have studied some of the habits and problems that drug abusers have in common, according to a film called "Early Warning", distributed by the Amarillo Public Library.

According to the scientists in the film, some characteristics do not seem to be important in whether a child becomes an addict or not. Among those factors which are not important are divorced parents, race, social standing, or economic background

Youngsters who become drug abusers do seem to have several things in common, however. According to the scientist, children who begin to drink alcohol before the age of 15 have a greater chance of becoming drug abusers. Another early warning sign for parents is to watch for the child who begins to smoke cigarettes before the age of 15. These youngsters are also more likely to become addicted to

One early warning sign which surprised me was children who drink coffee! The scientist explained that coffee contains caffeine which, while not very strong for adults, is a very strong drug for children, and that research had shown that youngsters who begin to drink coffee on a regular basis before the age of 15 are high-risk to become drug abusers.

According to the researchers who produced the film, if a parent finds that his child is drinking alcohol, smoking cigarettes, or drinking coffee, the parent should firmly tell the child that the habit must be broken, and get the child help if necessary to break the habit.

Two factors seem to be prevalent among youngsters who do not become drug abusers as adults and these are that the youngsters were given moderate discipline, and they were given religious training. The researchers noted that about 25 percent of drug abusers reported having extreme discipline while chidren, and 75 percent reported have no

According to the statistics presented, very few children who were taken to church and trained in their family religions become drug abusers in later life.

If you are a parent with young children, watch for the early warning signals of drug abuse: do not allow the child under 15 to smoke, drink coffee, or drink alcohol. Give your children loving, moderate discipline, and take your children to church.

If you do all these things, you are giving your child an excellent chance to grow up healthy, happy, and drug-free.

The Alanreed News exist-ed until about 1930. J.D. Reavis was my mother's cousin. They left here about 1929 and ran a newspaper at Texola, Okla. for several years and finally went

John (J.D.) sold the Alanreed Herald to C.C. Warford, a Baptist minister from some place in Oklahoma. Warford closed the paper here and was at Lefors several years and then went back to Stigler, Okla. where he lived to be 94 years of

Surprisingly, Alanreed did grow along about that time you were writing about. Not only did those business you mentioned exist, but there were two more cafes, a drug store, at least five service stations, two groceries. The bank closed in 1929 but the town did not start going down till much later. Foxworth-Galbraith put in a large lumber yard and oil activity was lively for awhile. The drug store continued until the death of W.J. Ball in the late Fifties. There were three churches, a cotton gin. The proprietor of Roselium Cafe is living in Panhandle and was a barber for years. S.T. Greenwood was in the grocery business till his death in 1968. His wife continued for a short time but health forced her to quit. Their children and numerous other names mentioned still come to Homecoming every





CLEAR UP "FOG" BETWEEN 779-2591 SLIDING DOOR PANES: Do-it-yourselfers can remedy "fog" between the two panes of double-glazed sliding

glass doors. Usually, dead air space between the two panes of glass serves to insulate the glass area and the home against heat loss and heat gain. However, prefabricated doubleglazed doors are subject to condensation between the two panes of glass. The most common type of double-glazed door is two panes of glass separated by a hollow aluminum mullion. Usually the mullion is filled

panes is continously dried. Problems with condensation generally occur after long-time use of the unit. Breaking of the seal causes the desicant to be

with a desicant, such as silica-

gel granules so air between the

water-logged and conden-sation forms between the panes of glass. Do-it-yourselfers can correct the problem for the cost of a tube of sealant and about two hours of actual labor. Solving the problem involves

taking the unit apart, drying out the silica granules and putting the unit back together with new scalant. To disassemble the

then the sliding section of the door by turning screws to relieve tension on rollers. Pry the door up and, with a helper, lift the heavy panel out. Place on a flat surface resting the unit on the metal edges rather than the glass. Remove metal edging from the sides, top and bottom by tapping gently with a mallet and wood block. Carefully remove the rubber or vinyl gasket and save for reuse. To cut through the old sealant, run a

glass and the million. Then, lift off the top glass. To dry out desicant, cut loose the mullion containing the desicant, remove end caps, and pour silica into a baking dish. Avoid contact with silica gel. To drive off moisture and to restore moisture-absorbing properties, heat the granules in a 400 degree F. oven for at least

three hours. Clean old sealant from glass and mullion by using a razor scraper and solvent-saturated cloth. Clean and polish the glass. Then, pour the dried desicant granules back into the mullion and resemble.

To reassemble the unit, place a thin bead of clear sealant around inside edge of the bottom sheet of glass, and position the mullion onto the sealant. Press down lightly. Run another bead of sealant on the top side of the mullion and lower the top sheet of glass onto it. To reset the vinyl gasket, run a medium bead of clear sealant around the edges of the slides and top of the glass. Positioning the gasket so the splice is at the top, press the gasket into the still-wet sealant. Finally, replace metal edges of the door


